

PROVES BAILEY KEPT THE MONEY

Waters-Pierce Bookkeeper
Traces Payments to Him
Through Books.

WENT TO PROFIT AND LOSS

Draft of \$1500 "Account Texas Cases" Charged to Legal Expenses, Showing Bailey Got It as Fee.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 16.—The prosecution in the Bailey investigation maintains that the testimony of J. P. Gruett, ex-secretary-treasurer of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, against Senator Bailey has been fully corroborated and that the \$2500 draft charge against the Senator has been sustained.

A. J. Hutchinson, former head bookkeeper of the company, was on the witness stand during most of the session of the legislative investigating committee today. He supported the testimony which Mr. Gruett gave to the effect that the loans which H. C. Pierce made to Mr. Bailey were charged off the books of the Waters-Pierce Company to profit and loss account. He had with him two accounts payable voucher records, one journal voucher record, one general ledger and one private ledger and journal. He said he found the vouchers in Mr. Gruett's desk. Some four weeks afterward Mr. Gruett asked for them and he gave them to Mr. Gruett.

Traces \$3300 to Bailey.

Mr. Hutchinson then took the books and traced the \$3300 voucher referred to in the charges. On the voucher record it was entered in favor of H. C. Pierce, charged to bills receivable. The entry, "Account of Texas cases," he said, was in the handwriting of J. P. Gruett, Sr. He thought they had been placed there before the voucher record was complete. Mr. Hutchinson said he wrote "J. W. B." on the record to indicate whose note it was. The next entry of the \$3300 was in the journal voucher record. It was here charged to "Legal expenses" in the handwriting of W. H. Glancy, Mr. Gruett's chief clerk.

Charged to Profit and Loss.

From the journal the record of the \$3300 transaction passed to the private ledger, where it was merged into the sum of \$1585, a total amount of profit and loss. He said the profit and loss entry was made by J. P. Gruett, Sr., in January, 1903.

The \$1750 voucher, Mr. Hutchinson said, was entered by J. P. Gruett, Sr. The record ran: "January 11, 1903, J. W. B. Texas cases, \$1750." The \$1500 voucher, about which there has been so much mystery, was posted from the voucher and charged to legal expenses. In explanation, the words "Texas cases" were written. Mr. Hutchinson testified this was his handwriting. Mr. Bailey will be placed on the stand Tuesday or Wednesday.

TRAINS CRASH HEAD-ON

TWO FIREMEN KILLED; NINE PASSENGERS INJURED.

Wreck Takes Fire and Bodies of Dead Burned to Crisp—Portland Man Badly Hurt.

HELENA, Mont., Feb. 16.—In a head-on collision at 2:35 o'clock this morning at Holters Spur, 33 miles east of here on the Northern Pacific, two firemen were killed and their bodies incinerated, an engineer severely hurt and nine others injured.

The dead: B. BEACH, fireman, A. J. ORR, fireman. The injured: J. O'Byrne, engineer, chest crushed in head bruise. He is at St. Peter's Hospital. C. S. Shubart, confusion of right leg above knee. H. C. Broadstrom, brakeman, scalp wound, confusion of the knee. G. W. Currock, brakeman, confusion of the hip, laceration of nose. F. M. Kahn, brakeman, broken collar bone. Donald Chapp, Billings, scalp wound and other bruises. William Gallagher, Billings, neck wrenched, bruised on head. George A. George, a helper, Portland, back sprained, left leg bruised. Clyde Corby, Bozeman, head and head bruised.

F. L. Stiver, Helena, head cut. William Muth, Helena, ankle wrenched and body bruised. When the accident occurred, the engineer of the passenger train failed to get on the siding in time to allow the freight to pass.

The passenger was a special, made up at Logan and consisted of a boxcar, combination coach and caboose. The freight was a special stock train, running as second No. 12 on passenger schedule, and had the right of way.

When the crash came the cabooses were crushed like paper, and the two firemen smashed between the tender and the boiler of each engine. The flames immediately broke out and the bodies were burned to a crisp. The boxcar telescoped on the front end of the coach where the passengers were, the wreckage falling into the car. A number of passengers had to be dug out.

the floor in torture, frightfully burned from head to foot. With the crude appliances and means at hand the neighbors tried to make Mrs. Machette and her child as comfortable as possible until medical aid arrived.

The father, when called by telephone, and, stunned by the terrible news, he fled from his office in town, and resorted to the only expedient in the world that offered the least chance of saving his loved ones from death.

Impresses Big Automobile.

As he reached the street he saw a huge automobile standing in front of the building. Without asking whose it was, or where it might be going, he impressed it into service.

"It's a matter of life and death," he shouted to the chauffeur, and then in the same breath ordered him to hasten with all possible speed for his home. At Grand and Hawthorne avenues he stopped and picked up Dr. Clayton S. Seemann,

and then began the wild ride for his distant hills to the east.

The very birds of the air never flew with the speed at which that monster of steel and iron hurtled itself through space. Driven by a huge 60-horsepower motor, it thundered along the streets, sometimes seeming to rise from the earth in its onward rush. It crashed into rats and hurled over hummocks. It bumped, it lurched, it groaned. It snorted, trembled, careened and swayed till it seemed as if its very momentum would tear it to pieces, yet not for an instant did it slacken its frightful pace.

Father Cries for More Speed.

"Can you give her any more speed?" shouted Machette in the agony of despair.

"I'm sorry, sir, but she's in the last notch and I'm afraid she'll jerk to pieces if we keep this gait up much longer," answered the driver.

On they rushed. Fences, trees, houses, landscape and all hurled themselves in panoramic bewilderment rearward as they cleaved the wind. They seemed to be crawling like snails to the anxious man in the rear seat, but in 20 minutes the 14 miles' ride was ended.

They drew up at the Machette home and both mother and daughter were found to be suffering fearful agony.

Machette Almost Overcome.

At the sight of his loved ones so severely stricken, Machette nearly collapsed and Dr. Seemann had to support him while he regained his composure. The burns of the two victims of the unfortunate accident were dressed by the physician, who ordered them to be conveyed to the hospital as quickly as possible. Machette immediately ordered the chauffeur to prepare his machine to receive the two patients. Churns from the home were placed in front of the rear seats and mattresses and bedding placed thereon, forming a couch large enough to accommodate both, and they were tenderly carried from the house and placed in the big machine. The physician mounted the step on one side and the father took the opposite side and the ride for the hospital was begun with the same frightful speed of the outward journey.

The father, with tear-dimmed eyes, anxiously scanned the seared and pained, distorted faces of his wife and child as the big motor car speeded on its way to the haven where he hoped their lives might be saved. The physician, as to whether the victims would slowly be commencing to realize that hope was rapidly vanishing. The sure signs of the moaning child's coming dissolution were only too apparent to his trained eye. When within four miles of the city little Catherine gave a gasp, moaned feebly, there was a slight shudder, and then she ceased to breathe. The physician noted this action immediately and glanced hastily at the father, who was closely watching the features swathed in bandages for some sign of life.

Seemann Saves Him.

"My God, doctor, she is dead!" exclaimed Machette, and but for the timely and powerful clutch of the physician, the grief-stricken man would have lurched backward from the machine and pitched headlong into the road.

Mrs. Josie Machette, the stricken wife and mother, was taken to a private room at St. Vincent's Hospital and given every attention of which medical science is capable, but the physician and attendants were able to hold out little hope of recovery to the anxious husband. Later in the day the small chance held out at the time she was received was despaired of, and she was not expected to live through the night. The physician says that there is hardly a spot on the woman's body that is not burned or scorched.

The grief-stricken father refused to be interviewed last night, saying that Dr. Seemann would explain everything.

Only a Miracle Can Save Mother.

"It is the most pathetic case I have ever attended," said Dr. Seemann. "The poor woman undoubtedly tried to extinguish the flaming clothing of the child by merely using her hands, and while so engaged her own clothing caught fire. Both victims were terribly burned, and nothing but a miracle can save Mrs. Machette. Frank Machette was one of the best husbands I know of, and the blow will prove hard to him. Were he not a strong-minded man, I should have fears for his sanity after sustaining such a blow."

COMING NORTH FOR FAVORS

Steamship Agent Makes No Arrangement With Southern Roads.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 16.—S. Take-nouchi, manager of the Osaka Merchant Steamship Company, who has been in Los Angeles several days endeavoring, he says, to arrange for a Pacific Coast terminus for his company, with the ultimate purpose of putting on a line of freight steamships between this country and Japan, stated in an interview today that he had been unable to gain entrance for his company at San Pedro, and would return to San Diego to make a similar effort there.

He said the Salt Lake Railroad had refused to make a freight agreement with his company, such as is enjoyed by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha line with the Great Northern Railroad at Puget Sound ports. Later, he said, he intended to go to Puget Sound with the idea of making, if possible, a freight arrangement with the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, which he had been informed was building there. Take-nouchi stated that his company was building six large freight steamers for use in American trade with the Orient. Freight only is to be handled at first, but his company's boats are being constructed with the intention of utilizing them for passenger traffic also, in case it developed that they could get into that business.

MUST CLEAR NAME

President Will Call on Ailshie to Meet Charges.

TAKES THEM SERIOUSLY

Delay Means Action After March 4. Senate Passes Bill Giving Oregon Two Federal Judges.

Fate in House Doubtful.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 16.—Supreme Judge Ailshie will not be appointed to succeed District Judge Beatty in Idaho unless he can disprove charges that have been made against him. These charges have reached the President and are regarded as so serious that Judge Ailshie will not be appointed before March 4, if recommended by Senator Heyburn. In case the recommendation of Judge Ailshie is declined, the President will probably suspend action and order an investigation and, if the charges are not disproved, the President will ask Senators Heyburn and Borah to recommend another man.

Messrs. Heyburn and Borah called on the President today, but did not discuss the judgeship. They are waiting for Judge Beatty's resignation, which has not yet been received.

SENATE BACKS UP AILSHIE

Idaho Passes Resolutions Defending Judge Against Charges.

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 16.—(Special).—The contest for the Federal judgeship to succeed Judge Beatty is assuming some interesting phases. Charges have been made against Chief Justice Ailshie, of the State Supreme Court, supposed to be the leading candidate. Ailshie started for Washington today to meet the allegations, and the Supreme Court was adjourned for ten days, as only one justice is left here, Judge Stewart being now in a sanatorium at Portland.

In the Senate today, Senator Nugent, Democrat, of Gracerville, offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, According to the press dispatches, certain charges have been made against the Hon. James P. Ailshie, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court of this state, with a view of preventing his recommendation and while the Senate is in session, and reflecting on his integrity by alleging improper connection with his past with certain mining and smelting interests and making other charges against him; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Senate of the State of Idaho, that we most emphatically condemn and denounce the said charges as unfounded and false, and hereby express our high confidence in Chief Justice Ailshie's integrity and ability; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be telegraphed to the President of the United States and to Hon. W. E. Heyburn, and Hon. Fred T. Dubois, United States Senator at Washington, D. C.

One of the persistent rumors here is that Senator Warren T. Truitt, of Latah County, will be appointed to the Supreme bench in the event that Ailshie is named as Federal judge. He is an old friend of Senator Heyburn and enjoys the confidence of the latter to such an extent that it is understood he could have had the Federal judgeship had not his age been a bar. He is nearly 70.

BASED ON COTTON INCIDENT

Reported in Idaho Roosevelt Wants No Railroad Man for Judge.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Feb. 16.—(Special).—Lewiston attorneys are most interested in the story going the rounds to the effect that President Roosevelt has indicated that no railroad attorney will be named by him to succeed Judge James H. Beatty on the Federal bench of Idaho. The story, which comes from Washington, says the precedent is based upon the Cotton incident, the claim being made that when Judge Bellinger died, that Mr. Cotton, general counsel for the O. R. & N. was offered the judgeship, but that he was asked to resign, which he did, when it was brought to the President's ears that he was a railroad attorney. He is now then that Judge Wolverton was appointed.

According to attorneys here, Mr. Cotton was offered the position and declined it because he liked his railroad work better.

Express Confidence in Ailshie.

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 16.—(Special).—The following dispatch has been sent Senator Heyburn, signed by all the state officers, together with Justice Sullivan and Insurance Commissioner Leggett:

We desire that you convey to the President the fact that we denounce and condemn as unfounded and false the charges reported as made against Chief Justice Ailshie, alleging improper conduct with smelting and mining trust and other charges, and our high confidence in the Chief Justice's integrity and ability.

EMPHATICALLY DENIES STORY

J. W. Rowland Not Candidate for John D. Daly's Job.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 16.—J. W. Rowland, chief clerk in the Surveyor-General's office at Portland, who is known as a witness in the Hermann case, today emphatically denied the story published in Portland papers that he is here working to secure appointment as Surveyor-General to succeed John D. Daly, whose term expires March 18. Mr. Rowland said today that he is not an aspirant for Daly's position, has never applied for it and does not expect to. Senator Fulton said he had not considered the appointment of Daly's successor.

Rowland, since his arrival, has conferred with both Senators about Daly, to highly commended Daly's work, and urged for him another appointment.

MONEY FOR OREGON HARBORS

Bill as Reported to Senate Makes Liberal Appropriations.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 16.—As the river and harbor appropriation bill was reported to the Senate today it carries \$92,720,472, an increase of \$8,519,234 over the amount appropriated by the House. The appropriations immediately available is \$26,031,908, and the aggregate for projects authorized, \$52,538,564. The appropriation was made to create a deep waterway from Chicago to St. Louis. Surveys are authorized of Galveston Harbor for a channel of 25 feet, and for a ship canal between Gray's Harbor and Puget Sound, Washington.

The bill carries all Oregon and Washington items inserted in the House bill, and in addition carries the Fulton amendment appropriating \$100,000 for dredges for exclusive use in Oregon coast harbors. It also increases the appropriation for the Cowitz and Lewis Rivers from \$6000 to \$15,000.

SENATE PASSES JUDGE BILL

Allows Judicial Division of Oregon. Fate in House Doubtful.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 16.—Senator Fulton today secured the passage through the Senate of his bill dividing Oregon into two judicial districts. It is here a winning bill in the House, had it referred to a sub-committee and will follow it up in the hope of securing its favorable consideration before Judge Beatty's resignation, which has not yet been received. The fact that only two weeks of the session remain will militate against the bill, but there is still a possibility that it may go through. The bill creates one district out of that part of the state west of the Cascade Mountains, and another district of Eastern Oregon. The judge and officials of the District Court are assigned to the Western district, the Eastern district having a complete new complement of officials.

Tanner Thanks the President.

diplomats will be made to come to a formal agreement with the Japanese government that will insure the continuance of the present policy of that government withholding passports to America to Japanese laborers.

So far as the pending legislation is concerned, it is stated that there is every reason to believe that it will be acceptable to the Japanese government; at any rate, there has not yet been the slightest sign of disapproval in that quarter.

An interesting fact that has developed in the discussion of the respective rights of state and nation where treaties are involved is that, in at least one case, the California courts have taken the most advanced grounds in favor of the supremacy of the treaties, in one instance holding that the treaty rights of aliens to possess real estate could not be destroyed by a state law.

League Says Schmitt Surrenders.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 16.—Secretary Geeth, of the Japanese-Coraeon Exclusion League, stated this morning that he was very much surprised by the surrender made by Mayor Schmitt in the Japanese school matter as reported in the dispatches from Washington. He stated that before leaving for Washington the Mayor told members of the league that he would hold out for nothing short of absolute exclusion, and that it had been agreed that exclusion by treaty or by any other means than by definite statute would be unsatisfactory.

HEARST WINS THIS ROUND

Court Holds Jackson Had Power to Reopen Contest.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 16.—Supreme Court Justice Fitz, today handed down decisions sustaining the position of Attorney-General William S. Jackson in the matter of the proceedings in the interest of William R. Hearst to oust George B. McClellan from the office of Mayor of New York City. Justice Fitz decided that the Attorney-General had authority to hear the application of Mr. Hearst for leave to have quo warranto proceedings against Mr. McClellan, which was denied by Mr. Jackson's predecessor, Attorney-General Mayor.

MILLIONS FOR INSTITUTE

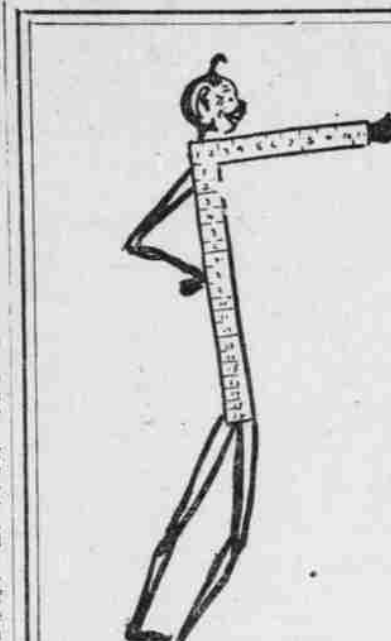

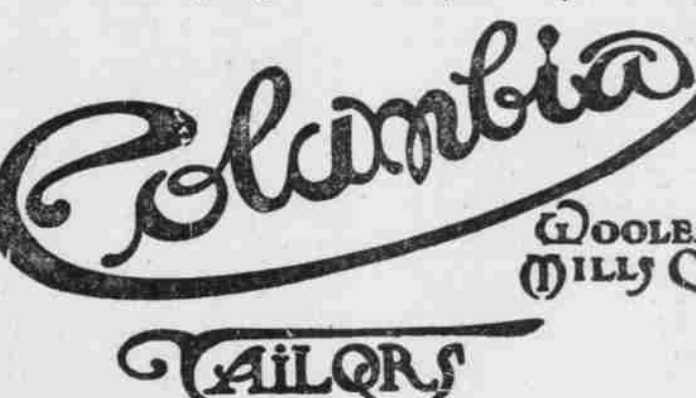
