"MISTAKE," SAYS DEVLIN

AUDITOR DISCUSSES BRIDGE CHARTER AMENDMENT.

Declares He Drew Up the Measure Only as a Courtesy to the East Side Push Clubs.

City Auditor Devlin denies that he made any mistake in drawing up the charter amendment providing for a bond issue of \$400,000 with which to build the new Madison-street bridge. He says that he prepared the measure solely as a courtesy to the East Side Push Clubs which started the movement for the new structure. Friday night at a meeting of the Initiative One Hundred, Frank J. Perkins made the statement that Mr. Devlin had promised him that the amendment would be so altered that it would allow a bridge to be built higher than the present structure. The amendment provides that the approaches to the bridges shall conform to the established grades on Hawthorne avenue and Madison street.

"I do not like to criticize any one," said Mr. Devlin yesterday afternoon, "but if there is any one to blame it is not myself. I have no interest whatever in the amendment and drew it up as a matter of courtesy. I don't remember of ever having talked with Mr. Perkins regarding the bridge. When I drew up the amendment I endeavored to embody the ideas of the East Side organizations, and it would have been changed at any time before it went to the Council. Last November the measure first came up and it contained the provision that the approaches to the bridges shall conform to the established grades on the streets the bridge will connect. Not a word was uttered against that provision so far as I know, although those interested had every opportunity to examine it and have changes made. That is why I am surprised that any complaint or accusations should be made now. "I first drew up the measure as an ordinance. The interested East Side Push Clubs were furnished copies of it. Later I drew it up as a charter amendment and more copies were sent out of my office to those interested. Mr. McNary went over the amendment for the last time and although there were no material changes in the measure, we sent out still more copies. In all of the three different forms the provision in question was embodied. "Was there anything more that I could do? As I said before, I drew up the bill to accommodate others and it was placed in their hands. I had nothing to do with it except to prepare it. Complaint was made to me by representatives of the O. W. F. that the company was charged too much for the use of the bridge. I explained to them that I had merely drafted the bill and that it was within the province of the East Side clubs to make any changes deemed advisable. Members of the East Side Business Men's Club also said that perhaps the charges were exorbitant, but no steps were ever taken to change them. I drew up the form of the bill and had expected that perhaps it would be changed in different respects. "I am not an engineer, and do not know whether it is advisable either to raise or lower the bridge. When I prepared the bill I followed the wording of the old Morrison-street bridge set as to the grade."

J. W. Cook, Retired Canneryman, Sends Flour to Starving Chinese. Four hundred sacks of flour, consigned to the American Consul at

Shanghai, were shipped by steamer from Portland last night to San Francisco, where they will be forwarded by transport to their trans-Pacific destination. This shipment is the contribution of James W. Cook, a retired capitalist, of this city, to the starving Chinese. Mr. Cook was for many years engaged in the salmon cannery business at Clifton, where he accumulated a competency. "I wish you would quote me a price on 400 sacks of first-class flour," said Mr. Cook, walking into the commission house of Everding & Farrell yesterday. "You will also please include in your estimate the freight charges on the same to Shanghai, China." The cost was figured and a statement was handed the purchaser, who, as he left, said: "These unfortunate people were faithful to me when I was engaged in the salmon canning business, and now

that they are in need I propose to help them out in a small way."

She Meets Unusual Death.

GOLDFIELD, Nev., April 20.—Miss

Carris Burton, aged 30 years, was killed here today in a most peculiar manner. Miss Burton, who was an employee of L. L. Patrick, was on her way to the post-office for the official mail just as she was entering the building Fred Gleason,

a Deputy Sheriff, rode up. His horse began to buck and a revolver fell from his pocket. In its wild plunging the horse jumped upon the revolver, which exploded, and the ball struck Miss Burton in the jugular vein, causing instant death.
