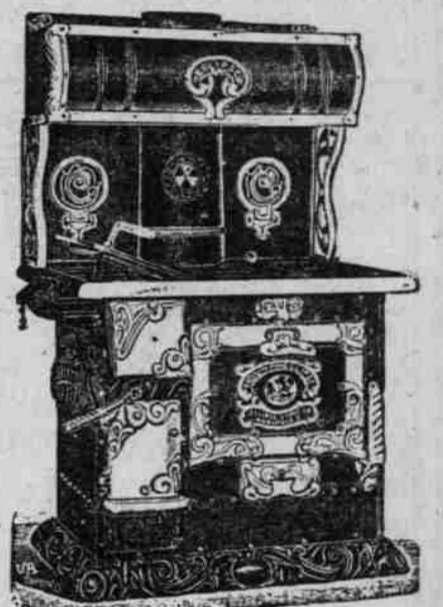

TALK ON WOMAN'S RIGHTS

Governmental Study Department of Woman's Club to Frame Bill.

In the rooms of Dr. John Carlyle yesterday, the government study department of the Woman's Club held a meeting of which a feature was an address by the president, Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway. It was followed by an animated discussion which took a wide range. The legal, civil and political rights of women and children were considered in many phases, from the different standpoints of different countries. Australia, New Zealand, Switzerland and Finland were among the nationalities whose laws were pronounced more favorable to the rights of women than those of "Free America."

Mrs. Duniway described her visit to the historic grounds of Champepe, May

3, alluding feelingly to the fact that when the provisional government was formed, women as the mothers of men, were under such complete subjugation to the laws against which they are still compelled to struggle, though in many modified ways, that no woman had a legal right to the bridal trousseau presented her by her father, after she had exchanged vows with her husband at the marriage altar. It was voted to devote sufficient spare time during the Summer vacation to the preparation of such laws for the well being of the mothers of men as the natural half of the human family as the department desires to submit to the next Legislative Assembly, or, if necessary, to a referendum for final action. A resolution of thanks to Attorney-General Crawford closed the deliberations.

Union Must Show Cause.

In the case of J. H. Scott against the

Marble Workers' Union, Local No. 25, of the International Association of Marble Workers, Judge Wolverson yesterday issued an order compelling the defendants to appear in court next Monday to show cause why an injunction should not be granted against them for endeavoring to keep Scott from working at his trade in this city.

Farm Sells for \$10,000.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 4.—(Special.)—Judge A. E. Rice, of the Superior Court of Lewis, Pacific and Wahkiakum Counties, has just purchased the Dillenbaug farm, situated about four miles from Chehalis. The tract of land comprises 190 acres, and the purchase price was \$10,000. The farm has been named "The Chateau." It is one of the finest pieces of land in Lewis County, and it is an ideal place for fishing and hunting.

SAILOR ROUGHLY HANDLED

Says He Was Beaten and Robbed in a Saloon.

A thrilling tale of a bandit's operations in the Osborne Cafe, at 21 Grand avenue, and an investigation led to the arrest late last night of Fred Schmitt, a bartender in the establishment. He was charged with larceny from the person and was locked up in default of \$1000 bail. The tale told by the victim of the robbery was the most sensational heard by the police for a long time, and at least a portion of it is borne out by the appearance of his face. Emil Johnson, formerly a sailor, was the man who lost the money. The sum he alleges was taken from him was \$10, and he also declares the bartender, now under arrest, stole his watch. Johnson's story is that he went into

the saloon to get a drink, and that three men, one of them the bartender, persuaded him to remain longer. Before he got out, he swears, he was attacked, knocked down and robbed by the three men. His outcries frightened the men so, he says, that they stuffed a handkerchief into his mouth to keep him from calling for help.

After they had finished their criminal work, according to Johnson, they picked him up bodily and threw him into the street. They told him to move on and get out of the neighborhood, he says. He waited until morning, when he reported the case to the police. Detective Tichenor arrested the bartender last night, on a warrant issued from the Municipal Court. Schmitt emphatically denied his guilt. The names of the other men are unknown. They are being hunted by the police.

Injunction Against Railroad.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 4.—(Spe-

cial.)—The Northwestern Long Distance Telephone Company has commenced injunction proceedings against the Northern Pacific Railway Company to prevent the defendant from interfering with the construction of a telephone line along its right of way between Kalama and Tacoma.

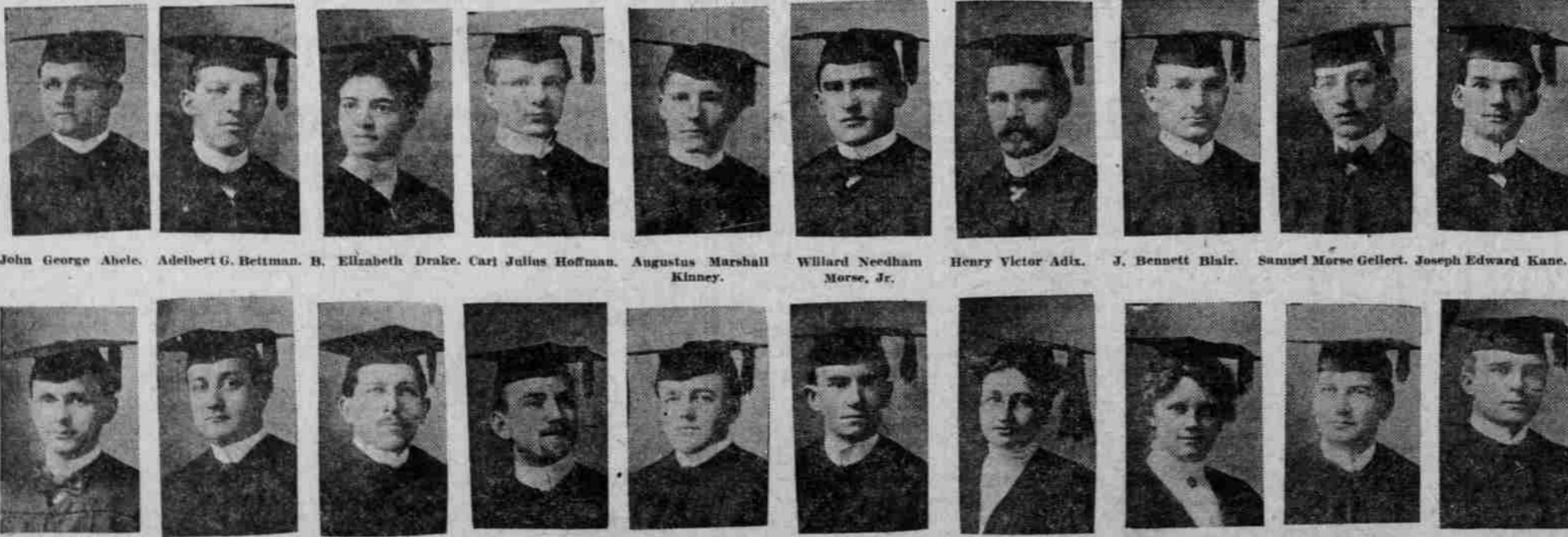
