Cellars led the ticket on the East Side, with Blair second and Anand third. Cellars' heavy lead on the East Side gave him the nomination, while Driscoll's strength on the West Side did the same for him. Anand ran surprisingly well on the West Side.

Democrats Scatter Votes.

Something of a surprise was the large number of scattering votes on the Democratic ballot. For the offices of City Auditor, City Attorney and Municipal Judge, for which there were no regular candidates, many names were written in by the voters, just as Dr. Lane was placed in nomination against George H. Thomas for Mayor. A still longer list of Democrats were written on the ballots for Councilmen-at-large.

The friends of Frank Schlegel and Charles Petrain united to give them a

considerable vote for the position of City Attorney and Municipal Judge, respectively. Schlegel received 13 votes and Petrain 16, according to the incomplete returns. Their totals may have been still higher, as several of the precinct chairmen neglected to give the detailed scattering vote on the sample ballots sent out. D. M. Watson, receiving three votes, is legally entitled to enter the contest against Werlein for City Treasurer, and John Montague, H. W. Stone and several others received several votes for Councilmen-at-large, so it is probable that Robert Andrews will not be the sole contest for that position on the Democratic ticket. Contests for City Offices. For the city offices all of the successful Republican nominees won by good pluralities. A. L. Barbur, Republican candidate for City Auditor, had a close competitor in W. S. Lotan, Barbur defeating Lotan for the nomination by only 165 votes. J. E. Werlein had no opposition for the nomination as City Treasurer and polled practically the entire Republican vote. John P. Kavanaugh is successful over William

R. McGarry for the place on the ticket in June as City Attorney. Kavanaugh won by 2264 votes. George J. Cameron administered a severe defeat to J. Silvestone and won the honor of being the Republican standard-bearer as Municipal Judge by 3350 votes. Silvestone had been an indefatigable worker in the primaries, had succeeded in getting supported from factions supposed to be at sword points, and his overwhelming defeat was a surprise to many who thought he would at least be in the race.

Contests in the Wards. In the contests for Councilmen on the Republican ticket, Robert Preston defeated W. A. Storey in the First Ward. The greatest interest was centered in George L. Baker's race in the Fourth. Baker had encountered vigorous opposition and his opponent, Rufus C. Holman, strong support from the Municipal Association and the pulpits. Baker was nominated by a majority of 254. Dr. W. T. Cattel won in the Fifth over J. F. Boothie, present incumbent; Councilman

the Sixth, decisively beating John M. Mann; Councilman A. G. Ruslight was Henry A. Belding was renominated in the Seventh, and Councilman Frank S. Bennett had an easy race in the Eighth.

Vote Cast Is Very Light. The total vote cast was very light. Out of a total registration of 17,724 Republican voters, only 3759 participated in the primary election. Of a total of 4111 registered Democratic voters, only 1547 exercised their privilege in the primary. The following table is a summary of the showing made yesterday:

West Side: Republicans registered 9,144; Democrats voting 4,512. East Side: Republicans registered 8,590; Democrats voting 4,247. Total registered 17,724; Total voting 8,759.

Comparison of the votes cast in the primary elections of 1905 and 1907 follows: Republicans 1905, 15,007; Democrats 8,592. Total 23,599.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO KILL GREAT MINE FOUND NEAR CABRERA'S MANSION. Guatemalan President Has Narrow Escape—Many Arrests Cause Reign of Terror.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Another attempt to assassinate President Cabrera, of Guatemala, according to a dispatch received today by Minister Toledo, was made yesterday. In this instance, what is described in a general way in the advices as a "mine" was placed not far from the mansion of President Cabrera, apparently with the intention of exploding it at a time when it would be most destructive. The mine was discovered, the attempt at assassination thus being futile. This news was received in a cablegram, of which the following is a translation: "BARRIOS." "Guatemala, May 4.—Minister Toledo, Washington: Yesterday a great mine was discovered placed in front of the barracks of the guard of honor, 120 feet from the American Legation and 170 feet from the Presidential mansion. This scandalous attempt at assassination has created great indignation among all classes of society. "BARRIOS." "Senor Barrios is Minister of Foreign Affairs of Guatemala. The guard of honor is the special guard of Senor Cabrera. It appears from advices which the Mexican Ambassador has received from the City of Mexico that a condition of chaos exists at Guatemala following the recent attempt to assassinate Senor Cabrera. The Mexican account is that indiscriminate arrests are being made of men, women and children, both Guatemalans and persons of other nationalities, and that these prisoners are being harshly treated.
