

DISAPPOINTMENT TO OREGON GIRLS

New York, Its Men and Women,
Not Up to Expected
Standard.

DUMPY LITTLE BUILDINGS

Men Not Polite, and Women Are
"Actressy" and Look Stagestruck.
Oregon Is Finest Place in the
Country, After All.

NEW YORK, June 1.—(Special.)—A
New York paper tomorrow will say:

Fourteen Oregon girls who were sent here to study New York are greatly disappointed with the country's metropolis. New York is not at all what they imagined from the full-page Sunday paper accounts of the largest city of the Western Hemisphere. The buildings along Broadway are small, the women are "actressy" looking, the men impolite enough to remain their seats in cars while women stand, and the streets are dirty.

Philip S. Bates is chaperon of the party and also chaperon of the exchange, because the girls' hurried subscriptions for his paper, Mrs. C. E. Redfield, was the chaperone proper. Everywhere at the Martha Washington Hotel, where the tourists are stopping, agrees that the girls are so sensible, so well-behaved and so interested in the higher things of life that Mrs. Redfield must have an easy job.

Hard on New York Women.

"What do we think of New York women?" said Miss Fanny Spellman. "Well, I just give you my opinion as long as you ask for it, and that is, that I can't see what men see in them. I'm sure they don't think of anything but their clothes, and as for dressing the way they do, why, I never could do it. They look as if they were all stagestruck and a woman of that kind never could make a man happy, I don't think."

"Those short skirts they are wearing with high-heeled shoes and stockings to match—why, they are all put on to attract attention. I saw a woman dressed like a young girl and she was forty, if she was a day, who had on a blue suit, blue stockings and blue laces in her tan oxfords. Now, don't you suppose she put those laces in to attract attention to her ankles?"

"Of course she did," put in Miss Daisy Bettey, of Vale, Or. "I'll tell you just such a woman would be talked about a good deal out West, and she wouldn't be in with the nice circles at all."

Oregon Beats Them All.

"Wherever we go, we realize that the finest place is Oregon or Washington," said Miss Mammie Smith, of Clifton, Gilliam County, Or. "Jameson town was terrible disappointing. Washington is handsomer than New York. I don't understand why we heard so much about New York, when there are so many dumpy little buildings on Broadway. And the great white way is just some electric lights, that's all. There's no wonder in electric lights."

MOB RAZES HIS SALOON

CROOK COUNTY RESORT BLOWN
UP WITH DYNAMITE.

Fred Mosier, Wet Goods Man, Is Told
to Leave Town, When Citizens
Destroy the Property.

PRINEVILLE, Or., June 1.—(Special.)—Fred Mosier, who was preparing to open a saloon at Paulina, 30 miles east of here, witnessed the dynamiting of his building and the destruction of his stock of wet goods by a crowd of his fellow citizens a few nights ago.

Paulina people had listed Mosier as an "undesirable," and gave him overnight to leave the settlement. He took the hint, but went only a short distance, returning to the hill back of town, where he could overlook his property. He then set off dynamite, blowing out one of the walls.

Paulina is 50 odd miles from Prineville, in the eastern portion of Crook County, and had hitherto been a dry community. Deputy Sheriff Cramer is now investigating the affair.

HOLDS BOOKS AS HOSTAGE

Woman Clerk Goes to Jail Rather
Than Surrender.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 1.—Because Elaine refused to be dispossessed from her belief that possession is nine points of the law, she spent her hours today in a cell at the County Jail. She was taken into court this morning because she refused to surrender the books of the Murray Murphy Mining Company, which she acknowledged to be in her possession.

Miss Fuller claims about \$40 salary for work done upon the books. When the mining company demurred to immediate payment of the sum, Miss Fuller is alleged to have informed the officers that as long as payment was deferred just so long would they seek vain for the books. She was sentenced to jail until she would consent to turn over the books.

FIND GATUN'S AREA LARGER

Engineers Pleased With New Survey
Increasing Canal's Capacity.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—In explanation of the cable report from Panama of the extensive revision in engineering estimates for the Gatun dam and lake, upon the sufficiency of which the success of the entire project depends, the following statement was today issued by the Isthmian Canal Commission:

Detailed surveys which have been completed on the Isthmus show that the area of the great Gatun Lake will be 235 square miles, or double the estimate made in the minority or lock-canal report of the board of consulting engineers, which is 110 square miles.

In the opinion of those engineers of the Commission who have given most study to the question, this large area is a great advantage to the lock type of canal, in both wet and dry seasons. It

REVENUE GROWS BY JUMPS

Surplus for May \$8,575,212, Eleven
Months Over \$65,000,000.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The monthly comparative statement of the Government receipts and expenditures shows that for May 1907, the receipts were \$57,482,012, and the expenditures \$48,912,800, leaving a surplus for the month of \$8,575,212. The surplus for the 11 months of the present fiscal year is \$65,000,000, as against \$61,825,578 a year ago, a gain of nearly \$3,000,000.

The expenditures for May were about \$3,000,000 in excess of those for May, 1906.

Alaska Forest Not Worth Saving.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 1.—Request has been made by the Forest Service for release from temporary withdrawal of 3,500,000 acres of land at Norton Bay, Alaska. The restoration to the public domain of this land will be made because after careful examination the Forest Service has found it unsuitable for National forest purposes.

Increase in Bank Circulation.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The monthly circulation statement issued today by the Comptroller of the Currency shows that the close of business May 31, 1907, the total circulation of National bank notes was \$901,990,660, which is an increase for the year of \$42,810,850, and for the month of \$2,026,710.

Prescribe Correct Attire.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—If letter-carriers desire to wear shirtwaists, they must wear also dark ties and belts. This has been determined officially by the Post-office Department.

USES HIS GUN RECKLESSLY

CARMAN, PURSUED BY CROWD,
OPENS FIRE.

Officer Returns Fusillade and
Fatally Wounds Fleeing Strike-
breaker Who Had Shot Man.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—W. A. Forgy, a strike-breaker in the employ of the United Railroads, was shot and fatally wounded at Van Ness avenue and Turk street at 11 o'clock today.

The car of the General landed a shot, and three men were killed. Forgy opened fire on a crowd of strike sympathizers who had recognized him and accompanied him as strike-breaker. Carman, who had pursued the two men for several blocks.

Blomberg took up the chase, attempting to shoot Forgy, and returned the latter's fire with fatal results.

During the fusillade Thomas Stack, a structural ironworker, was shot in the leg. Forgy, who was dying at the Central Emergency Hospital.

The cars of the United Railroads started this morning at 6 o'clock, and the service was continued until 8:30 p.m. This time it is said, will be gradually extended by the end of next week, when full service, with the exception of the city route, will be resumed. The owl cars will not be placed in operation for some time.

Up Goes Price of Meat.

ST. LOUIS, June 1.—Consumers were forced today to pay for a pound of beef from 2 to 4 cents a pound for beef as a result of the contest between the packers and livestock dealers on account of the refusal of the packers to pay for cows and heifers until the Government inspection that follows killing. The advance to the consumer today followed the rise of a pound on beef carcasses by the packers yesterday.

Has Talk With Train Crew.

Goes After "Honorable" Fish
Near Chicago.

GOOD OMEN IN SUN-FISH

Famous Japanese Spends Day on the
Fox River, Guest of Country Club,
and Is Greatly Pleased to

CHICAGO, June 1.—(Special.)—General Baron Kuroki and his staff went fishing in the Fox River, near Geneva, today, guests of the Country Club. The "unworthy" General had a "bully" time and dragged out some "honorable" pickerel and other fine denizens.

The invitation carries special significance, inasmuch as in Japan the fish is highly honorable. There is not a garden in the whole empire of Nippon that hasn't its tiny archipelago with goldfish swimming around among the artificial isles.

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CONVICTED IN TEXAS

Pierce Oil Company Found
Guilty of Fraud.

COURT FINES \$1,623,900

Missouri Corporation Charged With
Violation of Anti-Trust Laws and
Judge Grants Injunction
to Prevent Removal.

AUSTIN, Texas, June 1.—A jury today found the Waters-Pierce Oil Company of Missouri guilty of violating the anti-trust laws of Texas, convicted it of having entered the state by fraud, fined it \$1,623,900 and granted the prayer of the state for ouster proceedings.

The defense this afternoon filed a motion for a new trial and the case will be taken to the Federal courts. The state filed a petition with District Judge Brooks for the appointment of a receiver, also an injunction to restrain the company from moving any of its property from the state. The judge granted a temporary injunction and set the receivership hearing for June 8.

The trial has consumed three weeks in the District Court here and its conclusion today is merely the beginning of a long legal battle. At the outset of the proceedings the defense attempted to secure a change of venue, but not succeeding in that, vainly sought to secure a judgment by default in order to hasten their course to the Federal courts.

The basis of the controversy is the provision of the anti-trust laws of 1899 and 1903.
