

MAKES HIS PILE AND HAS RETIRED

Thomas F. Ryan Leaves Wall
Street With Fortune of
\$100,000,000.

HAS SOLD ALL HIS STOCKS

Traction and Gas King, After Return
From Europe, Will Retire to Vir-
ginia Estate and May Try
for Senatorship.

NEW YORK, June 1.—(Special).—Thomas F. Ryan has ended his days of activity in Wall street. His departure for Europe on Friday signified his breaking away from the personal management of the gigantic corporations with which he has been associated for the last 25 years. The news of Mr. Ryan's retirement was confirmed today in Wall street by the men in Wall street who knew him intimately and who have closely watched his movements in the stock market during the last year.

There is a Wall-street tradition that Mr. Ryan's ambition, after he had become an important factor in the financial world, was to accumulate \$100,000,000. This he has accomplished. His fortune is estimated by those in a position to know at considerably over that figure.

Mr. Ryan, according to "inside" information in Wall street, will now enjoy a retired life on his magnificent estate in Nelson County, Virginia. That he may direct his energies toward becoming a United States Senator from Virginia is considered a strong possibility. He has long held that ambition, and his friends expect that he will realize it.

The retirement of Mr. Ryan from Wall street has been expected for some time. The first inkling of it came when the financier began to unload his holdings of stock in the Metropolitan Railway Company. Since that time he has gradually sold out his stock until he holds practically no Metropolitan shares. A substantiation of the rumor that he had got rid of his extensive holdings in the Consolidated Gas Company was given by Mr. Ryan himself before he sailed on Friday.

"I don't own a dollar's worth of gas," that meant only one thing, that he had quietly sold out all his stock. It verified what Wall street has suspected.

CAUSED BY "WHITE FANS"

POLICE ARREST LEADERS OF
SOCIETY AS PIRATES.

Chinese Revolutionists Say They Are
Anti-Dynastic, but Not Anti-For-
eign.—U. S. Gunboat Ready.

AMOY, China, June 1.—Although the rebels were recently defeated with the loss of 600 men, the government troops did not succeed in dispersing them, and they are rapidly recruiting their forces and threatening to attack Changchow, one of the largest cities in China.

The United States gunboat Helena is here. Amoy is in no danger of an attack.

The center of the uprising is at Juan, 50 miles southwest of Amoy. The police there arrested the leaders of an organization known as the White Fans, accusing them falsely of being pirates. The prisoners, collected from the followers, killed the prefect and other officials, and held a magistrate as a hostage. Emboldened by this success, 30,000 rebels gathered and threatened Chao Chow Fu. Troops were hurried from Canton and Fu Chow and engaged the rebels yesterday between Swatow and Amoy, with the result that 800 of the latter were killed. The government loss is not known.

The correspondent here of the Associated Press is in a position to confirm the statement that the outbreak is not anti-foreign but anti-dynastic. The White Fans are a revolutionary organization, and are strong in Southern China. The movement has been growing steadily for 15 months, the leader being Sun Wen, who was educated in Japan. The rebels are well organized, and well fed, but badly armed. The local troops refuse to attack them and people are fleeing from Changchow to Amoy.

Predic Revolt Against Manchus.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Dr. E. C. Machile, a Franciscan missionary, arrived on the steamer Doric, en route to his former home in Cincinnati. O. He comes from Lenchow, close to the borders of Hunan Province, and 200 miles by water from Canton. He returns alone, for his wife and 10-year-old daughter were murdered by the Chinese in the uprising against the Manchus, October 15, 1902. He fears there will be an uprising of the natives before many months as a result of the effort to overthrow the present Manchu dynasty. Many natives, he says, are uneasy, and dare not express opinions on either side.

ALL CANNOT GET BOUNTY

Disapprehension About Appropria-
tion for War Veterans.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, May 25.—Somehow the great im-
pression seems to have gotten abroad
in Oregon that an appropriation was
made in an act of March 4, 1907, grant-
ing a bounty of \$100 to every Civil War
veteran. This is not the case.

There are various laws under which
bounties are granted. All claims for
bounty are submitted to the Auditor
for the War Department, the merits of
each individual case are determined by
him, and just claims are certified to
the Secretary of the Treasury for pay-
ment. These claims have been pre-
sented continuously since the close
of the Civil War, payments are being
made every year, but only in such cases
as are certified to by the Auditor and
approved by the Secretary of the
Treasury.

The sundry civil bill passed last
session carried an appropriation of \$200,
000 for the payment of bounty to vol-
unteers and their widows who were
entitled to bounty under the act of
July 28, 1865, and also to settle claims

for arrears of pay of two and three-
year volunteers who were not fully
paid for their services prior to their
discharge from the Army. This ap-
propriation was not intended to pay in-
discriminate claims for bounty, and it
did not intend that bounty should be
paid to any one other than those who
came within the provisions of the law
which authorized bounty payments. On
its face, it is apparent that this ap-
propriation was not intended to grant
a bounty of \$100 to every Civil War
veteran, for \$200,000 would reach only
2,000 veterans at that rate, and it is
conceded that there are a great many
more than that number who would be
entitled to bounty under any general
law.

Because of the wide-spread mis-
understanding of the meaning of this
law, the Auditor for the War Depart-
ment has issued a circular letter, ex-
plaining just what classes of bounty
claimants can be certified for payment.
If there are applicants in Oregon who
come within these limitations and who
have not already received more than
\$100 in bounty altogether, they can,
upon proper application, secure the
payment of bounty in accordance with
the established law, but not other-
wise.

Senator Bourne has been flooded with
letters from Civil War veterans who
have been misled into believing that
they can secure a bounty of \$100 out-
right for the asking. In all such
cases he has been obliged to call at-
tention to the restriction of the law,
and is now sending each applicant a
copy of the letter of the Auditor.

MONEY GOES TO NEW YORK

Movement From Interior More Than
Large Gold Exports.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The Financier
says: Last week's official statement of
the New York Associated Banks while
indicating a moderate increase in cash,
disclosed quite an important reduction in
surplus reserves due almost entirely to
a large expansion in loans and conse-
quently in deposits and reserve require-
ments. The cash gain was \$32,100, the re-
sult chiefly of receipts of \$2,700,000 over-
payments of currency as shown by the
interior bank movement.

It is noteworthy that the gain on such
movement was larger than for any week
since the end of March, indicating an im-
portant influx of the monetary tide, which
may be expected to continue. Though the
gold exports to Paris were more than
\$2,000,000 for the week, the average of such
exports was less than \$1,500,000, owing
to the fact that the shipments were
greater during the first half of the week,
and therefore the cash gain from the in-
terior was only practically offset by gold
exports.

TEMPER CAUSE OF SPLIT

Howard Gould Says Wife Is Extrava-
gant and Vain Besides.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Two of the coun-
ter charges in Howard Gould's reply to
his wife's suit for separation have been
announced, on the authority, it is stated,
of Mr. Gould. One is that she is extreme-
ly extravagant. The other is that Mrs.
Gould's temper was a source of constant
annoyance to Mr. Gould and many times
placed him in embarrassing positions with
his friends because of her barrier to their
domestic happiness.

Mr. Gould also says that his wife's dis-
play of jewels in public was a source of
annoyance to him. In his reply Mr. Gould
will tell of suits brought against his wife
by tradesmen. Some of these were for
dresses and others for jewels. He will
say that his wife was reckless in her ex-
penditures and cite these suits as proof.

Mrs. Gould's defense to the various
suits was always that she had been im-
posed upon by the tradesmen and the
prices charged her were too high.

ATTEMPT TO WRECK TRAIN

Obstruction Found Just Before Ex-
press Dashes Past.

LOS ANGELES, June 1.—What ap-
pears to have been another deliberate
attempt to wreck a Southern Pacific
train was made this morning half a
mile from Burbank and within seven
miles of where wreckers caused the
ditching of the Shore Limited on May
22, resulting in two deaths and many
injured. A work gang discovered a
dispute, which had been driven hard
and fast into a split switch, and which
would certainly have caused the de-
railing of the first passing train had
not the obstruction been found.

Shortly after the dispatch had been
found and removed, the regular south-
bound passenger train from Santa Bar-
bara whizzed over the spot. Dis-
charged employees of the road, harbor-
ing ill will toward the management,
are suspected.

RETURNS TO WASHINGTON

President Roosevelt on Duty Again
at Executive Office.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—President
Roosevelt, Secretary Loeb and Surgeon-
General Rixey returned to Washington
from their visit to Canton, Indianapolis
and Lansing at 4:15 o'clock this after-
noon, went directly to the White House,
and later went to the executive offices.

The President is to start June 8 for the
Jamestown Exposition, where Georgia
day is to be celebrated on the 10th. On
the 12th he will leave for Oyster Bay,
where, as he said today, he hopes to
pass a quiet summer.

Everywhere the train stopped the Pres-
ident appeared on the platform of his
car, and when time permitted he shook
hands with the assembled people or spoke
briefly. Several times he got a good
drenching in the rain, as he stood with
bare head and leaned over the platform
of the car.

Stratton Wins Mining Suit.

DENVER, June 1.—After two weeks
trial in the Federal Court here, a de-
cision was given today in favor of the
Stratton Independence Mining Com-
pany, Limited, of London, England, and
its lessees in the suit of the Portland
Gold Mining Company to recover the
value of about \$200,000 for gold ores
alleged to have been taken by the de-
fendants from ground in the Cripple
Creek district, owned by the plaintiff.
Judge E. E. Lewis directed the jury to
find for the defendants, on the ground
that the Portland Company had failed
to prove the trespass alleged. Notice
of appeal was given.

Railton Guilty of Robbing Bank.

PITTSBURGH, June 1.—After being
out nearly 24 hours, the jury in the
case of George J. Railton, former in-
dividual bookkeeper of the failed En-
glish National Bank, this afternoon
found Railton guilty of misappropriat-
ing funds and not guilty of making
false entries in the books.

\$1,000,000 Mining Deal.

DENVER, June 1.—By a deal closed
in this city today, the Japan group of
mines near Telluride, Colo., was trans-
ferred to the Consolidated Mines Se-
lection Company, Limited, of London,
England, the consideration being \$1,
000,000.

HEALTH NO BETTER

Chamberlain Returns to Lon-
don Quite Feeble.

NOT ABLE TO WALK ALONE

On Arrival, Tries in Vain to Raise
Hat in Response to Cheers of
the Waiting Crowds at
Victoria Station.

LONDON, June 1.—After the recent
reassuring reports from Santa Raphael,
France, regarding the improvement in
the health of Joseph Chamberlain, his
arrival in England tonight was some-
what of a shock to the friends who had
gathered to meet him both here and at
Dover.

Quite apart from the fatigue of the
journey, which he bore well, it was evi-
dent that Mr. Chamberlain was still a
long way from that degree of recovery
that would give hope of his resuming
active political life.

Mr. Chamberlain was accompanied by
his wife and son, Neville. When the
train arrived at the Victoria station he
was seen lying back in the cushioned
seats, seemingly almost helpless. He made
no effort to rise until assisted by his
wife and son, and it was remarked that
he made vain attempt to raise his hat
in response to a cheer from the crowd.

Mr. Chamberlain was almost carried
to his carriage. He drove to his Lon-
don residence. It was said that he was
quite unable to walk by himself. Twil-
tchings of the facial muscles sug-
gested that the effects of his recent
seizure have not been completely
shaken off.

The family authorized the following
statement:

"Mr. Chamberlain has returned much
improved in health and none the worse
for the long ride. He has not yet made
any plans, but will certainly remain in
London for a time."

BLAME NOW LAID ON TOLEDO

Guatemalan General Makes Alliance
With President Zelaya.

GUATEMALA CITY, June 1.—The gov-
ernment declares that General Salvador
Toledo, the Guatemalan revolutionist,
who is about to undertake an active
campaign against President Cabrera, is
the author of the recent attempt upon
the President, as well as the instigator
of the assassination of ex-President Bar-
rios, in Mexico City. His motive was
jealousy.

General Toledo is now making prepara-
tions with President Zelaya, of Nicara-
gua, for an organized invasion of Sal-
vador and Guatemala.

Pretender Wins Great Victory.

ORAN, Algeria, June 1.—Advices re-
ceived here from Morocco say that the
troops of the pretender to the throne
surrounded and killed the Sultan's
uncle, and two Kaids were killed
and 300 women were captured.

WANTS BETTER SERVICE

JOHN P. LOGAN MAKES COM-
PLAINT AGAINST S. P.

Declares Traveling Public Is Greatly
Inconvenienced by Woeful
Lack of Schedule.

SALEM, Or., June 1.—(Special).—
John P. Logan, a prominent Portland
attorney, has filed a complaint with the
Oregon Railroad Commission a vigorous
complaint against the Southern
Pacific because of its irregular and un-
certain passenger train service north-
ward. There is no complaint concern-
ing southbound trains.

Mr. Logan sets forth the incidents of
a recent effort to catch a train from a
Valley town to Portland. He says the
train was reported several hours late,
but that station agents were not kept
advised as to the time the train would
arrive, with the result that he and
many others were caused much incon-
venience and loss of time. He wants
the commission to compel the railroad
to establish a schedule it can follow
and then keep its agents advised of the
time of trains that are delayed.

The afternoon trains going north
through the Willamette Valley have
not been regular for nearly three
months.

Passengers near Heppner have filed a
complaint against the O. R. & N.,
asserting that the freight rates be-
tween Heppner and Portland are ex-
cessive. The complaint charges that the
rate on wheat between Heppner and
Portland, 195 miles, is 15 cents
per hundred, while the rate from Pen-
niston to Portland, 221 miles, is 15 1/2
cents per hundred. On other commodi-
ties the same difference prevails.

Black Diamond Hit by Fire.

BLACK DIAMOND, Wash., June 1.—
The first destructive fire to visit Black
Diamond occurred today. When the
town was swept by flames entailing a
loss of \$50,000 and rendering many peo-
ple homeless. The fire is supposed to
have been caused by a defective fuse.
The heaviest loss was sustained by
the Pacific Coast Company, which op-
erates a general store here. The build-
ing and stock of goods which were
valued at \$25,000 were a total loss.

Folio Shakespeares Come High.

LONDON, June 1.—There was an in-
teresting book sale at Christie's today.
First folio Shakespeare brought \$10,000.
A play, "Antony and Cleopatra," dated 1595,
and originally attributed to Shakespeare,
went for \$500; a fine quarto, "Merchant of
Venice," fetched \$350.

The original manuscript of Sir Walter
Scott's "History of Scotland" sold for
\$250; a third folio Shakespeare made a
record price of \$750.

Shot to Death by Another's Lover.

FREEMONT, Ill., June 1.—Mrs. Edna
Hummel, 19 years old, was shot to
death today by Herbert E. Springer, 18
years old, of Rockford, Ill., who
chased Mrs. Hummel through a
crowded street, thinking she was an-
other woman, who, he said, had "thrown
him over."

Miners Offered an Increase.

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo., June 1.—The
United Pacific Coal Company and Cen-
tral Coal & Coke Company today post-
ed notices to the effect that an in-
crease of 10 per cent was being made
on all employees who return to work on

Monday morning. The miners have been
out and the mines closed for a week
pending the organization of a union,
which the companies refused to recog-
nize. The miners have not yet signi-
fied their acceptance of the offer.

RUSSIAN PRIESTS REVOLT

Fail to Attend Douma When Em-
peror Is Congratulated.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 1.—A special
session of the Holy Synod was held
this afternoon to try the five
priests who refrained from attending
the session of the Douma at which the
Emperor congratulated the Em-
peror on his escape from the plot
against his life was passed. Letters
from the priests announcing their re-
fusal to leave the radical parties were
read and caused great indignation
among the old line ecclesiastics. It is
announced that severe disciplinary
methods will be adopted.

TRIES TO KILL GRAND DUKE

Vengeful Russian Puts Runaway
Locomotive on Track.

OREL, Russia, June 1.—A train from
Saratov to this city, on which the
Grand Duke Constantine Constantinovich
was a passenger, had a narrow escape
from being wrecked today. Shortly be-
fore the time of its arrival a discharged
employee, out of revenge, started a loco-
motive at full speed down the track. The
Grand Duke's train fortunately was late
and the runaway engine was captured
before a collision occurred. The culprit
was arrested.

Emperor Consults President.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 1.—Presi-
dent Golovin, of the lower house of
Parliament, was received in audience
by Emperor Nicholas at Petrograd this
evening. They discussed the work of
Parliament.

STILL AFTER OPPOSITION

Grand Jury and Federal Attorney to
Prosecute Insurance Men.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The Tribune
tomorrow will say: The Grand jury,
next week or the week follow-
ing, will investigate the charges of
forgery in the insurance election
against a representative or representa-
tives of the International committee,
according to a semi-official announce-
ment yesterday.

At the same time the District At-
torney's office is considering inviting the
co-operation of United States District
Attorney Stimson in dealing with the
alleged violation by the committee's
representative of Federal statutes
which provide penalties for tampering
with another person's mail.

CONFEDERATES HONOR LEE

Permanent Memorial Proposed for
Virginia's Great Soldier.

RICHMOND, Va., June 1.—The United
Confederate Veterans here today adopted
the report of the committee on resolu-
tions which suggested the celebration of
the 100th anniversary of the birth of Gen-
eral R. E. Lee by a permanent memorial
at Washington and Lee University; also
thanked Congress and the President for
returning captured flags and for approp-
riating \$300,000 to mark the graves of
Confederate soldiers buried on Northern
soil. Sympathy was extended to the fam-
ily of Mrs. McKinley.

SALMON PRICES SHOVED UP

Opening Quotation Shows Sharp Ad-
vance Over Last Season.

ASTORIA, Or., June 1.—(Special).—At a
meeting of the Columbia River canners
this afternoon the selling prices for
canned salmon were fixed at the follow-
ing rates per dozen: Tails, \$1.55; flats,
\$1.75; halves, \$1.05; plain ovals, \$2.30; key
ovals, \$2.35; nominal, \$2.50; ovals, \$1.75.
Compared with last season's prices these
figures are an advance of 15 cents
on tails and flats, 5 cents on halves and
10 cents on ovals and nominal.

Photograph Wins Law Case.

(Kansas City Times.)

made good use of a photograph in a law-
suit. He had been continually annoyed
by the noise of hammering at an iron
foundry in his near neighborhood. Find-
ing that complaints were unavailing, he
brought the matter into court. But be-

the result, and the ingenious lawyer won his
case.

Italian Deputy in Camorra.

LONDON, June 1.—The Rome corres-
pondent of the Chronicle says that the
Crown has begun proceedings against
Giuseppe Romona, deputy from Aversa,
on allegations of his connection with the
notorious Camorra. He has been de-
nounced by a group of his fellow deputies
as being president of criminal societies
in his constituency.

The sensation has been increased by the
fact that Signor Schanzler, minister of
posts and telegraphs is accused of com-
plicity in the crimes committed by the
societies.

Their Homes Ruined by Flood.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 1.—A special
dispatch from Vernon, B. C., says that a
large dam was washed out there this
morning. Several houses were carried
away, and the damage to the city was
numbered in orchards. Anxiety had been
felt regarding the safety of the dam and
people in the path of the flood were
warned in plenty of time.

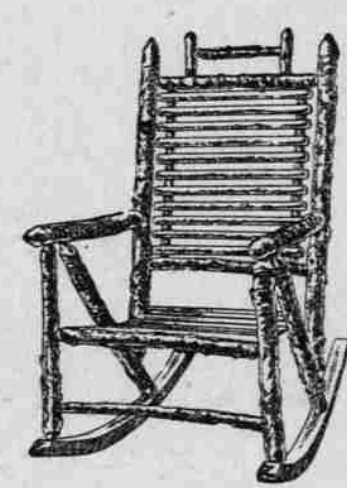

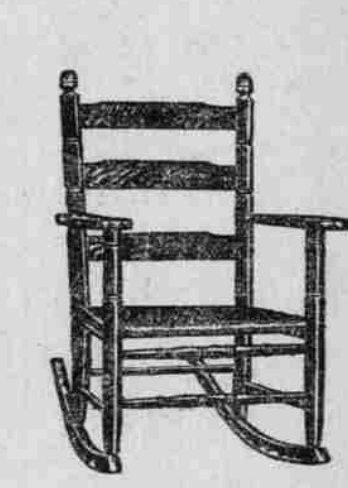

IMPORTANCE OF RULES

Prompt Obedience in Business Can-
not Be Overestimated.

(Value World.)

"Rules, establishing as they do fixed
practices, are of the utmost importance
in conducting a business and their value
cannot be overestimated. They are the
permanent orders by means of which the
head of a concern is enabled to direct the
operations of his subordinates, however
numerous they may be or however wide-
ly scattered. Through rules, the scope
of each department is fixed and all de-
partments held to unity of action and sin-
gleness of purpose.

In discussing this subject, the head of a
large establishment asserted that his busi-
ness was conducted entirely without
rules and that he would not have a man
in his employ who could not run his de-
partment without being guided by rules.
As a matter of fact, however, no busi-
ness can be run without the order and
system brought about by rules. What he
meant was that he gave his instructions
verbally to his subordinates, however
numerous they may be, and each depart-
ment manager in turn made such
verbal rules as he deemed necessary
for the guidance of his assistants.

It seems that department managers
should receive something more than off-
hand instructions, which are easily mis-
understood and quickly forgotten, and
that the man at the head of a business
knows, or ought to know, the best way
to conduct the business and should not
leave it to subordinates to make rules
for themselves and their assistants.

The head of a great corporation can de-
vot part of his time to no better ad-
vantage than in preparing rules for the
guidance of every feature of his business.
These rules should be put in writing, so
as to be a permanent and readily ac-
cessible form, and should be so carefully
prepared that misunderstanding and
false interpretations are impossible.

The president of a large commercial
house has given a large amount of his
time to the preparation of rules so that
the business of his company might be car-
ried on systematically, without friction,
and be well-rounded and complete in
every particular. Whenever an error has
occurred, the repetition of which might
be prevented by the issuance of a rule for
the future guidance of employees, this
has been done.

These rules have grown into a compre-
hensive code covering all features of the
business and are a great and permanent
benefit to the concern.
