GAS COMPANY INCORPORATED.—Capitalized at \$1,000,000, the Economy Gas Company was incorporated yesterday by E. E. Lytle, D. G. Tomasi and R. W. Colson. The new concern is backed by local capitalists and has for its object the laying of mains to engage in the sale of gas throughout Portland. At Monday's election an ordinance submitted for the purpose of ascertaining the people's voice concerning a franchise for this company will be included on the ballot. The ordinance provides that 50 cents per 1000 cubic feet will be the maximum price for gas, and that not less than \$5000 a year shall be spent for the maintenance of the plant. It also provides that 1 per cent of the gross earnings shall be paid to the city every year. The ordinance if approved will prevail for 25 years, at the end of which period the city will have an option on the purchase of the plant.

ALL-EAST-SIDE CARS.—The long-talked-of all-East Side cars were put into operation yesterday, between Hawthorne avenue and the Steel bridge. By means of these cars operated on Grand and Union avenues connection is made with all the East Side branch lines. However, few people used the car yesterday, and it may be doubted whether people generally knew what these cars were running for. They were put on at the request of the East Side Improvement Association, made several months ago, with the expectation that they would be an accommodation to the pupils attending the East Portland High School, and to do away with the long delay incident to a trip across the Willamette and return in passing from one end of the East Side to the other.
