GROUND BROKEN FOR TEMPLE.—Ground was broken on the southwest corner of East Burnside and East Eighth streets yesterday morning for the East Side Masonic Temple. It will be 100x50 feet in size, two stories high with full basement. The building will cost about \$5,000. Architects Pugh & Leitz completed the plans yesterday for the structure, and the contractor will let this month. It is expected that the building will be completed ready for occupancy some time next fall. This temple is the outgrowth of a movement by Washington Lodge No. 46, A. F. & A. M., which purchased the ground, and was joined by Washington Chapter, The Masonic Lodge remaining in East Portland will find quarters in the East Side Temple.

COMPLETING GRAND AVENUE BRIDGE.—The Grand avenue bridge over Sullivan's Gulch will probably be completed by July 1, as the contract reads. All but two piers have been finished and the piles for these have been driven preparatory to the concrete work. These last piers are near the center of the gulch where trouble was expected, but the piles were driven to a solid foundation without difficulty and concrete is now being filled in around them. The piers will be built up from these foundations. From the south abutment the steel sections of the bridge are being swung into place by the big crane. About 60 feet of the steel frame have been put into position from the south bank.

COLONEL CHAR. E. FORCE HANDS OF COUNCIL

Civil Service Commission May Take Clerk Dispute Into Courts.

The action of the Civil Service Commission in employing an assistant to Secretary McFarson, although no money had been appropriated for that purpose by the Council will be up for consideration at the meeting of the ways and means committee of the Council next Monday. After waiting in vain for an appropriation, the Civil Service Commission, at its meeting last Wednesday resolved to force the Council to pay for sufficient clerical force to transact the business of the department. An assistant has been secured and it now remains for the ways and means committee to say whether the money will be appropriated or whether the matter shall be taken into the courts.

"City Attorney" McNary will advise the ways and means committee as to his opinion of the legal point involved. It is understood that he will tell the committee that the city will have to pay for the services of the attorney who has been hired. There is some doubt, however, if it is said, as to the power of the Commission, under the charter to hire additional help and force appropriations in this manner.

This Name Worth \$100 Avers Nick Costa.

He Brings Suit, Alleging That Rival Appropriated Title, "American-Italian Grocery."

"WHAT'S in a name?" Nick Costa, a First-street grocerman in a complaint filed in the Circuit Court yesterday told Francesco Aceto, a merchant on the same thoroughfare, a cognomen is worth \$100 and costs. The name thus valued by Costa is "American-Italian Grocery," which hangs in a multicolored sign over his place of business at 342 First street. That Aceto maliciously usurped this name and applied it to his rival grocery store situated across the street, is the complaint of Costa, who alleges the usurpation has damaged him to the extent of \$100.

Costa asserts he was given exclusive use of the title "American-Italian Grocery" by the Secretary of State May 27, and that his rival, Francesco, knowing he had obtained the privilege, called his store the "New American-Italian Grocery," and published this fact to the consumers of the neighborhood by erecting a sign bearing the words.

Costa also accuses Aceto of calling his store "The American & Italian Grocery" for the purpose of deceiving patrons who have heretofore followed Costa's sign as they would a finger post.
