River, lake and ocean pictures have timely value only if used as a background to illustrate human action. Broadly speaking, the Oregonian wants attractive pictures that tell their own story. Size of the negative doesn't matter, but it must be clear and sharp. Kodak films three inches square are available. These are enlarged in the Oregonian's photographic room. It is not worth while to send dim or otherwise imperfect negatives.

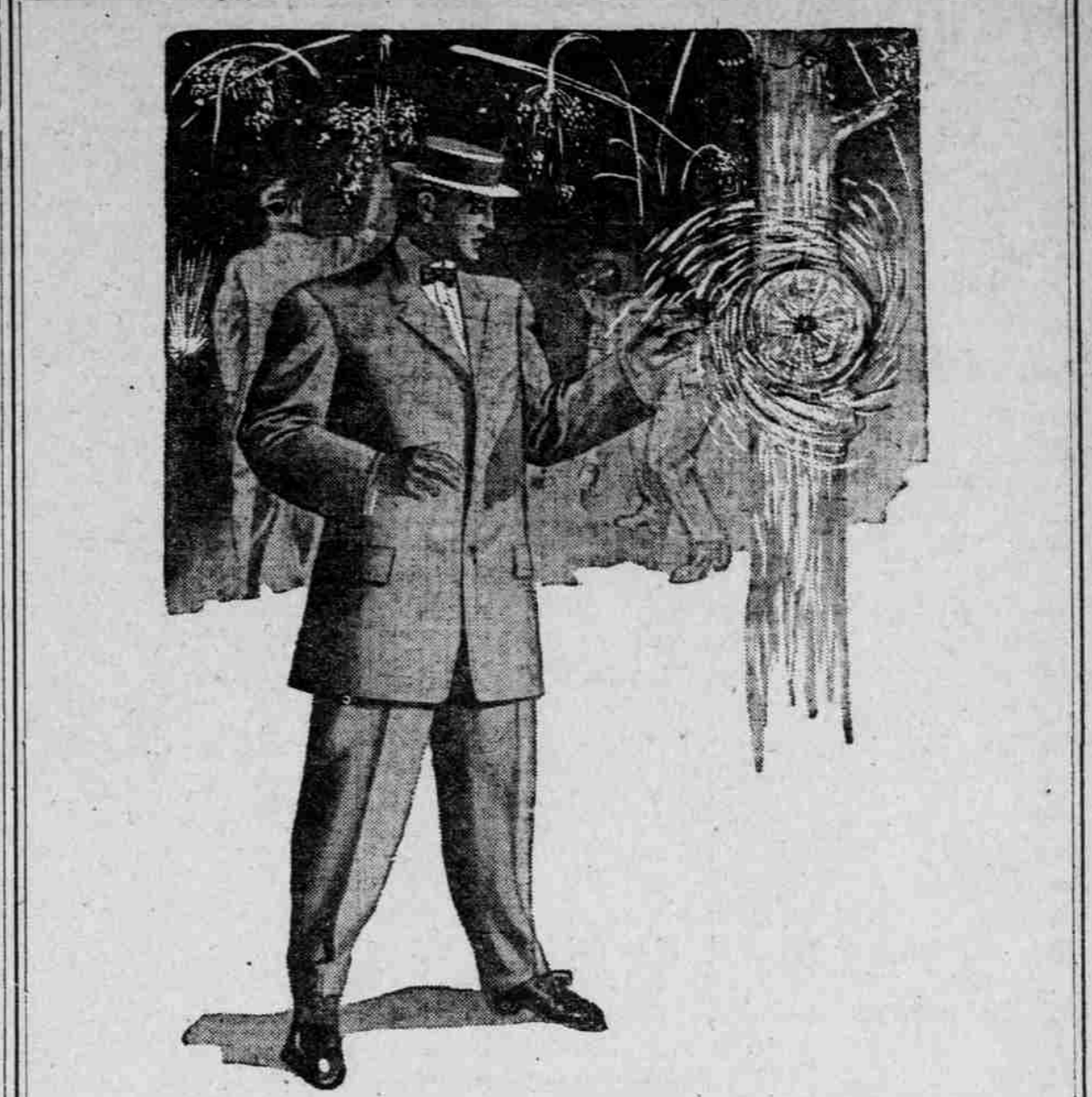
