MASTODON FOR CITY MUSEUM.-Splendid emains of the extinct, prehistoric species of mastodon, which formerly roamed this section of the United States, have been found in the Foots Creek group of placer mines in Southern Oregon and parts of a skeleton have been presented to the city museum through the good offices of C. K. Wright. Had it not been for his efforts, the remains would probably have been sent to the Smithsonian Institute at Washington. Parts of the skeleton of the huge monster are in good condition. The tusks of the mastodon are 10 feet, four inches in length, while the jawbone masters. measures four feet. An upper molar tooth weighs 1012 pounds. The skeleton of the big mainmoth is a valuable acquisition to the city museum,

WHAT RAILROAD WILL Do.-Peter Log-gie, of North Bend, was in Portland yes-terday on his way to Puget Sound on a visit to his relatives there. He attended the meeting of the Williamette Valley De-velopment League at Cottage Grove dur-ing the week and said yesterday that the proposed railroad extension from Drain to Coos Bay was discussed and that much enthusiasm over the prospect was mani-fested. In referring to the benefit to be derived by the Coos Bay district from the building of this road, one point appealed to blin as of paramount importance and that would be the ability to load manu-factured products on cars at the bay and have them sent through to Eastern mar-

kets without rehandling.

LICENSE RECEIPTS INCREASE.—Receipts of the year, aggregating \$194,969, show an increase of \$37,796 over the corresponding period last year. Due largely to the increased liquor license of \$800, which went creased liquor license of \$80, which went into effect April 1, the license receipts for the last quarter were the largest in the history of the city, amounting to \$U1.2%, of which \$102.519 goes into the general fund and \$7555 into the street repair fund.




