SEASIDE, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—To partake of breakfast while looking through a window on a bright sunny morning watching the breakers roll and to eat dinner while gazing upon a golden sunset are among the delights of Seaside life at the present time. The weather is perfect. There was a severe rain storm Wednesday, but during the night the clouds scattered. The sun rose on the anniversary of the Nation's birthday without a speck in the sky and the weather remained perfectly clear throughout the day and still continues so. Throngs of visitors came from Portland and other places to enjoy a quiet Fourth at the seashore. The Moore Hotel was the center of attraction. There was a fine display of fireworks on the beach at night, and the cottages also made the heavens aglow with numerous skyrockets and Roman candles. There was a dance in the evening and many flags were displayed and considerable adverse comment was indulged in because of the absence of a starry banner on the flagstaff on top of the City Hall.

Elaborate preparations are in progress for the reception of Vice-President Fairbanks at the Hotel Moore on the evening of July 15. Vice-President Fairbanks will be the guest of the Astoria Chamber of Commerce and is expected to deliver an address at the reception. The banquet will cost \$10 a plate. Prominent people of Seaside have promised to attend. Music will be furnished by Professor H. A. Webber's string orchestra from Portland.

On July 12 and 13 the 22d annual meeting of the Oregon State Medical Association will be held in Knights of Pythias Hall. There will be a clambake in the grounds back of the Moore Hotel on Friday, July 12, and a smoker on the following Saturday evening. The Western Association of Druggists will meet at Seaside, Monday, July 8.
