LAW PREVENTS AID TO FARMERS

Railroads Forbidden to Give Harvester Machinery Preference.

HARVESTS ARE SUFFERING

West Is Crying for Machinery Blocked in Congested Yards, but Hepburn Law Forbids Relief.

Hardship to the Sick.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—(Special.)—Shippers and communities throughout the country are beginning to appreciate the fact that under the new law the railroads are unable to do many things that they did formerly without question and for the benefit of the people at large. Even in cases of public necessity, for example, the lines find themselves powerless to relieve the situation, through fear of being guilty of discrimination that will make them liable to the penalties of the Hepburn act.

Information has been received by the Commerce Commission that a large portion of the Far West Northwest is suffering from lack of farm machinery, ordered with a view to harvesting this season's crops properly. The railroads were appealed to for relief and were anxious to assist the farming communities, but were unable to do so for fear that they would discriminate as to service against other shippers.

Farmers Cry for Machinery.

The harvester company was in receipt of hundreds of complaints from every part of the Western country. Farmers and communities were begging for machinery, for the lack of which the harvests were suffering. Accordingly, the harvester people laid the matter before the officials of the Harriman lines. The traffic heads discussed the question, and then decided that it was a case where relief should be granted.

The company asked the railroads to make farm machinery preferred freight and have it sorted out of the congested yards and sent to its destination at express train speed. The request was put on the ground that the harvest of the West would suffer greatly if the enormous amount of farm machinery that is in transit could not be delivered speedily.

New Law Forbids Relief.

Under the old regime the traffic officials would have complied with the request without a moment's hesitation. It occurred to them, however, that they would better lay the question before their attorneys, just to be on the safe side. Much to their surprise, they were told that they could not grant the request of the harvester people without violating the Hepburn act.

The Commission already has been requested to modify its ruling that an extension of a ticket cannot be given to a traveler taken severely ill during a journey. The Board holds that to do so constitutes a discrimination against other travelers, but the railroad men think there can be no discrimination if the privilege is extended to any sick traveler to continue their journey.

FREIGHT CAR POOL BREAKS.

Big Roads Abandon Project Which Does Not Succeed.

CHICAGO, July 13.—The American Railway Clearing-house, which for eight months has been trying to perfect a pool of all freight cars in the country, is in process of disintegration, according to the Inter-Ocean. The Chicago & Alton Railroad, which was one of the strongest advocates of the car-pooling scheme at the outset will withdraw. The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad has already withdrawn, and many of the big roads in the East and West have determined to abandon the project.

The organization has failed in its prime object, to insure each road having on its own rails all the time the number of cars owned by it. It has failed to do this because it had no power to penalize the roads for disobeying its mandates, beyond the imposition of the established rate of rental per diem.

COFFEY CHOSEN PRESIDENT

PORTLAND DOCTOR HEADS STATE MEDICAL SOCIETY.

Successful Session at Seaside Closes With Smoker—Meet in Portland Next Year.

ASTORIA, Or., July 13.—(Special.)—The second day's session of the Oregon State Medical Association opened this morning in Knights of Pythias Hall at Seaside, with a large attendance. The reading and discussion of papers were resumed and continued during the afternoon.

Dr. W. T. Williamson gave an abstract of a paper which will be presented through the association's publication of proceedings, and he was listened to with keen interest. His subject, "Expert Opinion in Cases of Railroad Injury," was well treated, the doctor having well-known views on the question. Dr. J. A. Pitt, of Portland, and James R. Yocum, of Tacoma, led in discussion.

Dr. Williamson was followed by Dr. J. A. Reuther, of The Dalles, who read his paper on "The Use of Diphtheria Antitoxin in the Treatment of Hay Fever and Asthma." Discussion was opened by Dr. Calvin S. White, of Portland, and Dr. L. T. Linklater, of Hillsboro.

Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, presented a paper which he read, his subject being "Surgical Treatment of Goitre." The discussion that followed was participated in by Drs. Hamilton Allan, of Tacoma, and Fred Essig, of Spokane, and others.

Then followed the president's address, which was ably delivered by Dr.

E. B. Pickel, of Medford, the retiring president.

Dr. Kenneth A. J. MacKenzie, of Portland, treated his subject, "Indications for Treatment in Gastric and Duodenal Ulcer," in a masterly manner, and the paper and the discussion won the attention of all. The discussion on this paper was opened by Drs. I. D. Freund, of Butte, Mont., and William Jones, of Portland.

At the conclusion of the discussion, the election of officers for the coming year resulted as follows:

President, Dr. R. C. Coffey, Portland; Vice-president, Dr. Rosenburg, Astoria; Treasurer, Dr. E. D. Timms, Portland; Secretary, Dr. William House, Portland; delegate to American Medical Association, Dr. A. C. Smith, Portland; alternate delegate to American Medical Association, Dr. W. T. Williamson.

It was decided to hold the next convention at Portland next Summer. The papers will be printed in a special volume for distribution among the members of the association.

When the reading of papers was resumed, Dr. J. N. Hall, of Denver, Colo., read a paper on "Abdominal Diagnosis as Tested by Operation," discussion by Dr. E. S. Somers, of Oregon City, and J. S. Fulton, Astoria, being carried along with ease and fluency and made interesting.

"What Shall We Do for Advanced Cancer of the Large Bowel?" was the subject handled by Dr. R. C. Coffey. The discussion was opened by Drs. J. B. Eagleston, of Seaside, and C. N. Suttner, of Walla Walla, Wash.

Other papers were read by Drs. C. H.

At the session, a smoker was held in the Knights of Pythias Hall, and one of the most successful conventions of the association closed.

The convention was attended by delegates from many localities and the meeting of old friends and the making of new acquaintances added much to the value of the gathering.

MORGAN DISCREDITS HER

FINANCIER WITNESS AGAINST FEMALE SWINDLER.

Reputates Adventurers Who Profited Through Letter Purporting to Have Been Written by Him.

LONDON, July 13.—J. Pierpont Morgan appeared in the West London Police Court today as a witness in the case of Mrs. Josephine Leslie, who was arrested at Newmarket July 4, charged with defrauding members of well-known families by false pretenses, and who represented herself to be a friend of Mr. Morgan. The letter repudiated all knowledge of Mrs. Leslie. He said he did not write to her advising her to join one of his syndicates, and never invited Mrs. Leslie, as alleged, to Morgan at his own house. As a matter of fact, Mr. Morgan added, he was in New York at the time of the alleged invitation.

On cross-examination, Mr. Morgan said he did not remember any invitation being sent to George Esterlick, the prisoner's father, for a public dinner which Mr. Morgan gave in New York. Mr. Morgan was sure that his firm had no customer of that name, and he said it was improbable that any of his business friends would speak of investments returning 12 per cent, which Mrs. Leslie said was to be the interest on money invested in the alleged Morgan syndicate.

"I did not know many of that character," said Morgan in conclusion. After the plaintiff, Miss Annie Blount, had testified briefly that she was induced to give Mrs. Leslie \$25,000 on the strength of letters purporting to have been written by Mr. Morgan promising huge returns, the case was adjourned.

REDS DENOUNCE CABINET

Demonstrations Against French Government in Southern Cities.

MONTPELLIER, France, July 13.—Marching workmen and their sympathizers, singing anarchistic airs, stopped tonight in front of the barracks and acclaimed the soldiers, who were ordered to join the procession and demonstration. The troops were confined, however, and were not allowed to mingle with the celebrators, who as far as had been reported, were not disorderly. At a mass meeting the workmen condemned the Government and expressed sympathy with the South of France.

AERONAUT MAKES ESCAPE

Jumps in Parachute From Burning Balloon Without Injury.

SPRINGFIELD, O., July 13.—While operating an airship at a height of 7000 feet here tonight, Gail Robinson, a Buffalo, N. Y., aeronaut, had a thrilling experience. The propeller of his airship was thrown into the gasbag which was cut open, letting the gas escape. The gas took fire and the machine began to fall.

Robinson climbed nearly to the top of the balloon. He jumped in a parachute.
