PLANS FOR PURE FOOD SHOW.

Preliminary arrangements for Portland's first annual pure food show have been practically completed by the committee in charge. Large posters have been printed announcing the show and giving the charges for floor space and other data of interest to exhibitors. The show will be held at the exposition rink, September 2 to 14 inclusive. The show is to be given under the auspices of the Portland Retail Merchants' and Grocers' Association, and it is planned to make it the most complete exhibit of food products ever held in the city, with the exception of that at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. The committee in charge is composed of J. C. Maum, chairman, Seattle; George Lewis, D. C. Burns, F. Dresser, C. W. Stubbs, J. E. Malley, J. A. Eames, Dan Kellner, C. B. Merrick, E. G. Gunther and B. J. Dresser.

FUNERAL OF MRS. E. B. WHITE—The funeral service of the late Mrs. E. B. White, who died suddenly at Seaside, on Sunday morning last, was held in the Church of St. David, East Twelfth and Belmont streets, last Thursday morning. A large congregation of friends and sympathizers was present to take part in the last solemn rites. Very many most beautiful floral offerings were placed around the bier. When the funeral cortege arrived at the church Rev. George H. Van Waters, D. D., rector of the parish, met the mourners at the west door and preceded the body into the church, reciting the opening words of the burial service of the Episcopal Church, as the organist, Mr. L. B. Pomeroy, played very softly the melody of Chopin's "Marche Funebre." The vested choir of the church was present in the chancel and sang the burial psalm to the usual solemn music. After Dr. Van Waters had read the lesson, Mr. W. Conley sang "The Psalmist" (Psalm) in a very effective manner. This piece of music was a great favorite with Mrs. White, and was included in the service by request of the family. The hymn "Nearer, My God, to Thee" was also sung to the well-known tune, and as the body was carried from the church the choir sang "Adeio With Me." The service was very solemn and impressive, and the large attendance gave eloquent testimony to the respect and friendship held for Mrs. White and her bereaved family.
