8-room building.

H. L. Camp & Company has the contract for the erection of a residence and garage for John Poulsen, to cost \$7000 and \$400 respectively. The house will be built on East Tenth and Multnomah streets and the garage will occupy one end of the lot. It will be one of the most attractive houses on

Mr. Hart was burned slightly about his face and his beard was partly

After Mr. Hart had gone to his home from the gallery he found that the house had a narrow escape from fire. Mrs. Hart had retired, leaving the lamp burning on a table near the bed. Before fall-ing asleep she noticed that the light was slowly fading out. She saw with alarm that the light had gone down into the lamp itself.
