CRISIS NEAR IN STRIKE ON WIRES

Operators Expect Peace Conference to Meet in Few Days.

NEILL MAY MEET SMALL

Union President Goes to New York, Giving Color to Rumors of Negotiation, Which He Denies. Neill Still Busy.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—A crisis will be reached in the telegraphers' strike within the next few days, according to the expectations of Chicago operators. Announcement to this effect was made today by Frank Likes, chairman of the local strike committee, at a meeting. Mr. Likes declined to disclose fully his reasons for making this statement, but from other sources it was learned that the operators are expecting that some sort of an offer will be received from the companies within a short time.

In view of the determined stand taken by both corporations against dealing with the strikers collectively, this report was viewed with skepticism in many quarters.

Says Companies Weaken.

It is said that many of the strikers would be willing to return to work upon the promise that they be given free use of typewriters and a moderate increase. Recognition of the union, it is declared, would not be insisted upon.

The statement of Mr. Likes concerning a possible crisis was made during a dispute concerning the advisability of holding a strikers' meeting tomorrow.

There may be important disclosures to make tomorrow," said Mr. Likes. "It is entirely possible that a crisis may be reached."

When questioned later regarding his statements, Mr. Likes said: "We have information that the companies are weakening a little and it looks as though there would be a conference between all parties concerned next Monday. Our information is that the companies are now intimating that an adjustment of the dispute may yet be reached."

Small's Trip Starts Rumor.

Further color to the various rumors afloat was given by the departure in the afternoon of International President S. J. Small for New York. Mr. Small declared that he was "on a tour of inspection" and had made no arrangements to meet United States Commissioner of Labor Neill, President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, or any other possible peace envoy while in New York. It is believed, however, that he entertains hopes of opening negotiations for a settlement while there.

The attitude of both Superintendent Cook of the Western Union Company and Superintendent Capen of the Postal Company yesterday was the antithesis of that of Mr. Likes and others in the strikers' ranks.

"The problem before us is to handle our telegraph business," said Mr. Cook. "I might add that we are doing it. We are not only receiving all business, but sending out all messages as well. The strike is not bothering us."

Neill Still Negotiates.

A dispatch from Washington tonight stated that the officers of the local union there predict a settlement of the struggle before next Wednesday. Not more than passing notice would probably be given the statement were it not for the fact that Mr. Neill since he left Chicago has been conducting all his negotiations through the officers of the Washington union. The Washington union officials declared that the settlement would be "honorable" to the union. Mr. Neill would not admit that he had information that the end of the strike was at hand.

While it is said that Mr. Neill has been unable to make any progress in the direction of arbitration, it is believed in Washington union circles that the strike may be ended by other means.

STRIKE WHEN "BOSS" LEAVES

Macon, Ga., Operators Walk Out During Manager's Absence.

MACON, Ga., Aug. 24.—Manager W. B. Stuart, of the local Western Union office, left Saturday morning to reopen the Albany, Ga., office. When he returned he found only the chief operator and one woman operator on duty. The rest had struck while the manager was absent.

Historic Palace to Be Leased.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The "old palace" of Richmond has come into the lease market. It was formerly part of the royal palace at Sheen, once the home of Anglo-Saxon monarchs, and has history almost as interesting as the Tower of London. Edward III died there in 1377. After his death the palace was pillaged by the servants. Richard II, with Geoffrey Chaucer as Clerk of Works, added greatly to the building, and Edward IV settled it on Queen Elizabeth. At the end of the year 1497 it was burned. It was rebuilt in 1501, and Henry VII died there in 1509. Leaving it, it is said, to the use of \$2,000,000 hidden in vaults which have not yet been discovered. The last royal person to reside in it was Queen Charlotte, to whom a lease was granted in 1817. The palace faces Richmond Green. It contains five reception-rooms, ten bedrooms and two bathrooms, with stables and coachhouses.

Establish Naturalization Districts.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—A. W. Cooley, Assistant Attorney-General, leaves here today to establish naturalization districts in the West and select attorneys to represent the Department of Justice in the districts established, to carry into effect the provisions of the new naturalization law.

Four districts will be created to cover the West and Northwest, with headquarters at Denver, San Francisco, Seattle and St. Paul respectively. The boundaries of the districts will be determined by Mr. Cooley after visiting each of the cities named and after he selects an attorney in each city to act as the agent of the Department.

DEMANDS HUGE FORTUNE

American Claimant's Step to Secure \$25,000,000 in England.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—

Fresh from making a formal demand on the Coutts Bank of London for \$25,000,000, Edward A. McShane, a Manhattan attorney, asserted today that he was confident of getting that amount for his client, L. A. H. Heavside, of Flatbush. The man in whose name he presented the claim is not to have any part of it save such as he may receive through his wife.

The real claimant is Heavside's father-in-law, William Fitzherbert, of Parkville, and as he is 78 years old, those who probably will have the spending of the money are his nine daughters and 35 grandchildren.

All of Fitzherbert's daughters are married. Three of them live in England. If they inherit almost \$25,000,000 each from their father they will have to thank the foresight of Lady Fitzherbert, morganatic wife of King George IV of England, who invested so shrewdly. Those millions she deposited in the Coutts Bank, and they grew tenfold.

Lady Fitzherbert, when she was merely Mrs. Fitzherbert, a young widow with two promising sons, attracted the attention of the Fourth Duke, when he was Prince Regent. Prince George wooed the comely widow as only the first gentleman of Europe could do, but his wife didn't win her until he consented to make her his wife. As her marriage with the Prince Regent was recognized as regular by Rome, that satisfied her. Of course, as soon as he found the union menaced his right of succession to the British throne, Prince George assured Charles Fox, who was his nine daughters and 35 grandchildren.

Mr. Fitzherbert, of Parkville, asserts he is a lineal descendant of one of the two sons Mrs. Fitzherbert had before she met the Prince. The other son died without heirs, he asserts. Edward VII, on ascending the throne, ordered that the Fitzherbert money in the Coutts Bank be advertised, and thus it came to the Brooklyn attention.

That his claim might not lapse in the event of his death before getting the money, Mr. Fitzherbert assigned his interests to his son-in-law, Heavside, for purposes of litigation, and all his daughters did likewise. So it was that in London Mr. McShane demanded the money.

ATTACK NONUNION DRIVERS

New York Teamsters' Strike Marked With Numerous Acts of Violence.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Numerous clashes marked the strike of teamsters of meat wagons today. Several non-union men were badly beaten. Most of the wagons were guarded by mounted police, but in a few instances unguarded vehicles were attacked. The packers say there will be no arbitration, and claim matters will be in usual condition Monday. The strikers are confident. Leaders say they are doing all possible to prevent violence.

Unrest in New York.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Seventeen thousand and machinists in Greater New York will probably strike Monday, they having been notified by the Employers' Association that their demand for an increase of 25 cents a day is unwarranted by business conditions.

New Yorkers Get Meat.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—It is stated there is no danger of a meat famine on account of the strike of meat wagon teamsters. Many firms are said to be moving teams and delivering meat today.

Strike on Long Island Road.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Two hundred Long Island railroad telegraphers demand an increase of pay and shorter hours, and will probably strike if not granted.

MONEY IN GETTING HURT

Young Italian Purposely Gets In Way of Automobiles.

NAPLES, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—The Duke of Aosta was motoring the other day with his mother on the Via Roma, when his automobile collided with a young man named Russo. The Duke stopped and took the man to a hospital, where it was found that he had only a slight flesh wound. The interest taken in the noble automobilist's victim proved to be unfortunate for him, because it was discovered that Russo for a considerable time had been living on compensations paid him by wealthy motorists. Much practice and remarkable agility enabled him to sustain a motor accident sufficiently serious to make sure of a handsome indemnity from motorists, who were always preferred to settle privately rather than face a lawsuit.

PHOTOGRAPH BY WIRE

German Police Secure Invention of Professor Korn.

BERLIN, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—The secret service department of Germany has secured an option on Professor Korn's invention for transmitting photographs by telegraph. The police department was well represented at the official test of the invention at the Zoological Garden, when photographs of the Kaiser and other members of the royal family were transferred to photographic plates at the police headquarters at Munich. It required ten minutes to adjust the apparatus in Munich after the wires had been connected, and in ten minutes the first photograph had been transmitted. The invention will be of great value to the police for sending out descriptions of criminals or suspects.

Commission Hits Great Northern.

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 24.—The Railroad Commission has ordered the Great Northern to cease discrimination against Omaha in favor of Minneapolis in refusing cars for loading grain destined to the Omaha market.

NAUGHTY TRICKS OF OSCAR TRIGGS

They Cause Court to Grant Wife Divorce and Maiden Name.

HE PRACTICES FREE LOVE

Witnesses Tell of Catching Whisper of Multi-Millionaires in Act of Carrying Out His Amorous Principles.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—Judge Chetlain today granted a divorce to Mrs. Oscar L. Triggs, wife of the eccentric former University of Chicago professor, whose sensational escapades at the Sercombe free love colony and whose lectures and writings have brought him much notoriety. Mrs. Triggs is permitted to resume her maiden name—Laura Starrette McAdoo—and secure the custody of their son, Edmund Triggs. She is now in Paris and her deposition was read.

Witnesses today gave sensational testimony as showing Triggs' disregard for the marriage vow. Herman Kuehn told of coming suddenly into a room Professor Triggs thought locked and finding him in disarray, while on a sofa, covered with a quilt, was the form of a woman. One pink barefoot protruded. Other witnesses told of his escapades with various women. Dr. Triggs is now 42 years of age. He is an alumnus of the University of Minnesota and University of Chicago and has degrees from Oxford, Berlin and the British Museum. He first gained attention by denouncing all church hymns as doggerel and classing Rockefeller and Carnegie above Shakespeare.

REPEATS KOEPENICK TRICK

Bogus Russian Soldier Uses Troops to Guard Plunder.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 24.—The fame of the cobbler of Koepenick seems to have penetrated as far away as Harbin, Manchuria. A few days ago a man in a Russian uniform presented himself armed with a power of attorney at the treasury of the Trans-Amur division and demanded 65,656 rubles, the estimated expenditure of the First Brigade for the month.

The papers were in perfect order and the supposed officer received a check on the Russo-Chinese Bank for the amount, which was duly paid. Part of the money was counted out in silver coin, which seemed to annoy the man, but as the bank had a legal right to make part of its payments in silver he consented grudgingly to take the heavy stuff, but telephoned for a convoy of three privates, who escorted him to the railway station.

There the supposed officer ordered the men to stand guard over the bags of silver and left, carrying off the rest of the money himself. The guard kept watch for 24 hours without coming near the money and would probably still be there had not the garrison commander made inquiries from the staff of the First Brigade, where nothing was known about the officer, his mission or the money.

LOIE FULLER, PLAYWRIGHT

Famous Dancer Sells Three Skits.

"Salome" Next Season.

PARIS, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—Miss Loie Fuller, the famous dancer, has sold three one-act skits to Charles Frohman and is negotiating for the American rights for an other one-act skit, "Pin-Prick," being the story of a snake's bite, dressed up in a romantic, practical setting. The other is called "The Holland Dame" and is a satire on the American worship of ancestors.

Miss Fuller is preparing to appear on the stage again next season in a spectacular production of "Salome," in which she will first be seen at the Theatre des Capucines at Nice and later in a Paris Theatre. She will do the famous "Salome" dance, with 150 girls for a background.

BANK NOTES FROM THE SEA

Package of Money Found on Beach by Workmen.

BERLIN, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—A package of bank notes of the National Prussian Bank of England, recently washed up on the beach of the Island of Fohr, off the Schleswig-Holstein coast, and found by a workman on his way to his factory. It is supposed as no owner has appeared to claim them, that they belonged to a passenger on the ill-fated Berlin, which went down off the Hook of Holland. The notes have been deposited in the safekeeping of the police. If unclaimed in nine months they will be handed over to the finder.

PRINCE GIVES A DINNER

Returns Hospitality of Newport Society on Board Cruiser.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 24.—Prince Wilhelm, in recognition of the entertainment given him by Summer society leaders here, gave a dinner tonight aboard the Swedish cruiser Fylgia to his hosts and hostesses. The Prince saved for Providence tomorrow evening.
