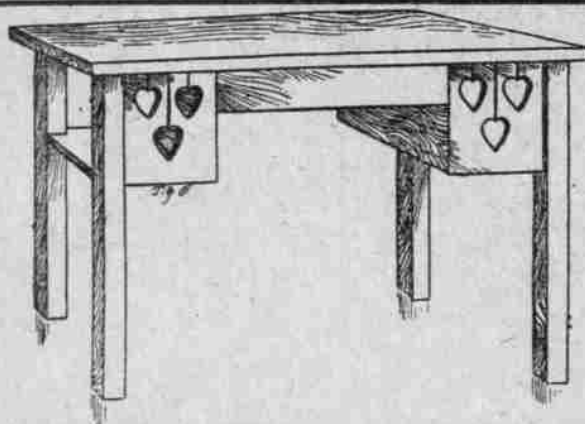

BAKER CUTS OFF POSTERS

THEATER MANAGER ABOLISHES BILLBOARD ADVERTISING.

Will Depend on Newspapers and Periodical of His Own for Publicity—Big Monthly Saving.

Manager George L. Baker, of the Baker Theater, will introduce a decided innovation in local theatrical circles when his popular Third-street playhouse opens September 1, for neither its opening nor the plays that will appear from week to week, will be heralded by the usual glaring poster advertisements. The billboards are to be used no longer to entice patrons at the Baker Theater. Even window cards, portraying scenes from forthcoming plays, will be eliminated also. The newspapers and Baker's Players, a theatrical publication just brought out by Manager Baker, will be used to spread information about the Baker shows.

By cutting out billboard advertising, the Baker management will not only be doing the Portland public a favor by removing rods upon rods of unsightly and highly-colored posters from the billboards and walls about town, but Manager Baker will be doing himself a good turn as well, for he will save from \$700 to \$800 each month by the new arrangement. While the change is a decidedly novel one in theatrical circles, for the billboard is almost as old as the theaters themselves, and the move is somewhat in the nature of an experiment on Manager Baker's part, it is believed that it will be one that will be approved by the public.

"I figure that theatergoers are an intelligent class of people who read the newspapers," said Manager Baker last night, "and can tell the merits of what we have to offer them. That these mediums better than by reading the billboards. 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CLOSE BLACKSMITH SHOPS

District Attorney Manning Acts to Stop Sunday Desecration.

District Attorney Manning again gave further evidence of his determination to compel observance of the Sunday-closing laws of the state when he issued the following order, closing the blacksmith shops throughout Multnomah County:

To the Blacksmiths and Horseshoers of the City of Portland: You, and each of you, are hereby notified that on and after Sunday, August 25, 1907, you will be obliged, under section 1984 of the statutes of Oregon, to keep your blacksmith shops closed on each and every Sunday thereafter.

I have received a petition from the Master Horseshoers' Protective Association, signed by a number of blacksmiths and horseshoers of this city, requesting me to assist them in keeping the blacksmith shops closed on Sunday. Therefore, any man conducting a blacksmith shop who is found working in said shop or keeping the same open on Sunday will be arrested and prosecuted.

Makes Hop-picking a Pleasure for Girls

Y. W. C. A. to Provide Entertainment and Safety for Women Workers in the Fields.

DURING the coming hop-picking season the Oregon State Board of the Young Women's Christian Association will make an entirely new departure in Association work.

It is felt that the association has a function wherever women are gathered in any kind of artificial relations. The work in universities and colleges is based upon this idea, and it certainly applies with equal force to the gathering of thousands in the hop fields.

In the old days, when yards were not so extensive and when as a rule whole families went together to the picking, there were no such special conditions to be met. Now, however, when the hopgrowers rely more on miscellaneous transient service, and hundreds of young women go without escort or family protection, it seems that this association, which has for its purpose "the development of the best possible physical, mental and social conditions for young womanhood," should feel responsibilities and find opportunities for helpfulness. It is fitting also that the greatest hopgrowers in the Union should be the first in which this new line of social service is attempted.

In its general features the work will resemble that undertaken in the English hopyards, where the association has been active for some years. Though necessarily less permanent in

character, it is something like the "Mill Village work" of the South. The experiment will be first tried in the Kresge hopyards, in Polk County. The owners of these yards draw most of their pickers from Portland and welcome the extra comforts and safeguards which the presence of association headquarters will give.

Miss M. J. Myers, of Forest Grove, will be manager and general chaperone. Mrs. W. J. Honeyman, president of the State Board of the Association, Miss Frances C. Gage, state secretary, and Miss Maud Ewing Ross, assistant state secretary, will also be present. Mrs. F. Swanton will have charge of the entertainment programmes and Miss Beula Caldwell will be responsible for the music. Camping place, amusement hall, cooking outfit and many other things have been generously provided by Mr. Kresge.

The association will have charge of a restaurant where comfortable meals can be obtained. There will be two or more dormitory tents for girls who are alone, and a large rest-tent, with couches, and provision for anyone suddenly taken ill. A library-corner, with magazines and books from the Library Commission at Salem, and convenient desks and writing materials will probably be much appreciated.

In the evenings there will be "good times" of various kinds. Elders Piano House is kindly supplying not only a piano, but an electric piano player, too. The Columbia Phonograph Company have lent a phonograph with records to suit tastes both grave and gay. Mr. Hester will be down there at least once with his stereopticon views, and moving pictures are spoken of. There will be a regular entertainment once a week in the amusement hall. Religious services will be held every Sunday, with good music from the double quartet, to be organized by Miss Ross.

GIVE BANKERS FAIR CHANCE

Depositor Would Not Hamper Them With Threats of Prosecution.

PORTLAND, Aug. 24.—(To the Editor.)—I am one of the heavier depositors of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, and I believe I represent the attitude of a large number of the depositors. I wish to say to the officers of the bank and to the whole number of depositors that I believe in a square deal, and to this end there should be given to President Moore and the directors of the bank a fair chance to make good on the promise to pay dollar for dollar to the unfortunate depositors. I do not believe the bank's affairs could be in better hands than they are in now. I say, let Mr. Moore have a chance to put his own private resources into the settlement, if that proves necessary.

It is not giving the men a square deal to hamper them by threats of criminal prosecution or forced involuntary bankruptcy, before they have had a chance to make good. If after 60 days, as promised, there is no dividend declared and a still further disposition to make promises, then let further action be taken.

As for myself, I am willing to take President Moore at his word and give him my whole confidence, and let him have a fair chance to make good. All I want is my money, which I trust to his care. This is all any of us want. Let us put aside all threats of criminal prosecution or any other

action that would hinder or worry the officers of the bank till they prove themselves unworthy of further confidence. Nothing could be fairer than the proposition to pay dollar for dollar, and if Mr. Moore is a real man he will do it.

Bank clearings for the week ended yesterday show a gain of almost \$2,000,000 over figures for the corresponding week of last year. The clearings for the week just ended are \$6,150,856.84, while last year shows a total for the corresponding week of \$4,841,111.86. Considering the fact that the feature of the week in financial circles was a bank failure, these figures

do not show any signs of uneasiness in the money market. That the calamity to the depositors of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank was confined almost wholly to them and did not affect other business interests of the city is the general opinion of all in financial circles.
