Most of the accounts are for less than \$5 and many are for less than \$2. Being apparently, balances overlooked because small. Those who have large amounts in their credit are, as a rule, dead or in the insane asylum.

The law does not require banks to furnish a complete list, but only a list of those deposits where the owner is not known to be living. It is quite possible that some accounts have not been reported, but have been forgotten by the owners.

Funds Escheat to State. Section 1. The cashier or secretary of every bank, savings bank, savings and loan society, and every institution in which deposits of money are made, shall within 15 days after the first day of July in the year 1907, and within 15 days after the first day of July of each and every second succeeding year thereafter, return to the Secretary of the State of Oregon a sworn statement showing the amount standing to the credit of every depositor who shall not have made a deposit, or who shall not have withdrawn his part of his deposit, or who has an interest for the period of more than seven years. Such statements shall also contain the last known place of residence or postoffice address of such depositor, and the fact of his death, if known.

WILL ESCHAEAT TO STATE

Secretary of State Benson Has Received Complete List—Portland Banks Have Largest Sums Forgotten by Depositors.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—Secretary of State Benson today completed the list of deposits in Oregon banks upon which owners have been notified for seven years, and the owners of which are not known to be living.

The bank having the largest amount of unclaimed money is the First National Bank of Portland, which reports \$2,841.21, the largest single deposit being \$2841.21, to the credit of John Bouton, \$750 to the credit of Thomas McNamara, and \$905 to the credit of Charles B. Steinhilber.
