He said: "I was never so struck with the possibilities of aerial control as when visiting the St. Louis Exposition. I saw even crude airplanes doing such remarkable things, obeying the control of the helmsman with such accuracy that I felt sure there was a great future for ballooning. On Thursday, when I looked up from my hotel window, here in Paris, I saw a more perfect type than I had imagined. The Vilde de Paris appeared to be about as easily handled as a sailing yacht, if not easier. It maneuvered in such a simple manner that on fine days it should be under absolute control." The correspondent continues: "Mr. Breeden has not done any ballooning himself, though he hopes to make an ascent during the winter. So far he has been more interested in automobiles. He owns two of these and, curiously enough, though he has come to pass some months, if not a year, in Europe, he has selected to use the railway everywhere. 'Of course,' he remarked, 'I am using automobiles, which are so easy to hire in Paris and big European centers, to make excursions. For exploring the environs of large cities are the only means of locomotion to be considered. But I want to cover so much ground while here, to pass from country to country without delay, that we decided to leave our machines at home and to use the railway service.'
