

LOST OR EATEN BY CANNIBALS

Fate That Is Thought to Have
Overtaken Dr. Rice, South
American Explorer.

KNOWN OF GREAT DANGER

Counted Possibility of Being Eaten
as One of the Chances of the Ex-
pedition—Expected to Reach
Manaos by November 20.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Lost in the forests of the upper Amazon, or eaten by cannibals, is the fate of Dr. Hamilton Rice, of Harvard University, whose work as an explorer has attracted world-wide attention.

His friends hope that he has merely been delayed by great difficulties of travel in the unexplored country, but fear that he may have fallen a victim of the savagery of the inhabitants.

On Christmas day, a letter written by Dr. Rice in September, detailing some of the difficulties of his latest exploring expedition, was received by the geographer's brother in Boston.

Since then his friends in this and other cities have been expecting daily to hear of his arrival at Manaus, on the Amazon, the nearest point from which there is cable communication.

Dr. Rice, who is a fellow of the Royal Geographical Society and member of the Societe de Geographie de Paris, left Bogota, Colombia, July 17, 1907, for his 1500-mile journey through unexplored country.

Known Dangers of Journey.

He had just returned from an expedition with Dr. E. H. Bingham, a distinguished South American explorer, to the headwaters of the Orinoco. The trip on which he started had been fully planned in advance, and he was perfectly aware of the dangers he was likely to encounter from savage animals and still more savage men.

"I expect to reach Manaus not later than November 15," he said to Dr. Bingham, as they parted at Bogota. "I shall cable you as soon as I arrive there, and if you do not hear from me by November 30, you may give me up as having been eaten."

Dr. Rice referred to the fate of Nestor Reyes, brother of the President of Colombia, who was killed and eaten by cannibal Indians on a similar trip.

Explorer of Reputation.

On Christmas day, 1906, at Dr. Rice and Dr. Bingham dined together in Caracas, they discussed the Reyes expedition, and Dr. Rice said, perhaps prophetically: "I wonder if I will suffer a similar fate before another Christmas."

Dr. Bingham said that he received no word from Dr. Rice. He had been hoping to hear something ever since the date set by his friend and companion, and he is now greatly worried by the absence of definite information.

Dr. Rice, who holds a well-known New England family, was graduated from Harvard in 1898. Before his graduation he joined a polar expedition and won fame in the expedition to Spitzbergen. He took his medical degree in 1891 from the Harvard Medical school.

Soon after this he made his first journey to South America, making a trip from Quito over the Cordillera to the Napo River, a tributary of the Amazon. It was in recognition of his work on this occasion that he obtained the fellowship of the Royal Geographical Society.

EDUCATE THE NEGROES

Southern Educational Association
Adopts Strong Resolutions.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Dec. 28.—The most important action of the Southern Educational Association, which closed its eighteenth annual session here today, came at the last moment before adjournment, when the committee on resolutions presented the following strong resolutions on negro education, which were adopted unanimously:

"We endorse the accepted policy of the states of the South in providing facilities for the youth of the negro race, believing that whatever the ultimate solution of this grievous problem may be, education must be an important factor in that solution.

"We believe that the education of the negro in the elementary branches of education should be made thorough and should include specific instruction in hygiene and home sanitation, for the better protection of both races.

"We believe that in the secondary education of negro youth emphasis should be placed on industrial, including nurse training, domestic science and home economics. We believe that for practical, economical and physiological reasons, negro youth should be provided for negro schools."

ONE DEAD, FOUR ARE HURT

Train No. 23 Wrecked in Oklahoma.
Another May Die.

DUNCAN, Okla., Dec. 28.—Henry White, engineer, was killed and two mail carriers and two express messengers injured, when Rock Island passenger train No. 23, a double-header, was wrecked near here this afternoon. Otto Kootny, of Kansas City, assistant baggage man, died.

Engineer White's two children were burned to death when fire destroyed his residence in Fort Worth a few weeks ago.

UNITE TO LEGALIZE POOLING

Shippers and Railroads Want Sher-
man Law Amended.

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—The railways and powerful shipping interests are apparently united in an effort to obtain a repeal of the Sherman anti-trust act insofar, at least, as it applies to traffic associations. This fact is made apparent in a symposium published in the current issue of the Railway Age and participated in by railway presidents, governors, railroad commissioners and representatives of large shipping interests.

Nearly every problem that is troubling the railroads and the shippers is touched upon, such as the effect of the Hepburn act, the question of additional legislation, the problem of state versus federal control, the effect of recent agitation upon the earning capacity of the railroads, the desirability of a uniform classification

and the substitution of steam by electricity as a motive power for roads. The shippers and railway men seem to agree that the Hepburn act has brought some great benefits, the chief of which is the abolition of rebates, but that it is too soon to make a correct deduction of the effect of the act taken as a whole.

All deplore the conflict of state and National legislation and also agree that the railroad interests and the shippers are rapidly getting closer together and are realizing that their interests are closely interwoven.

RESIGNS AFTER LONG SERVICE

B. & O. Manager Cannot Agree With
Vice-President Potter.

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 28.—General Manager Thomas Fitzgerald, of the Baltimore & Ohio, today resigned his position after a service with the road extending over 41 years and embracing nearly every position subordinate to the general manager. His resignation is said to take effect January 1. Third Vice-President George L. Potter is to assume the duties of the position temporarily with Mr. Oscar C. Starnes.

Mr. Fitzgerald's resignation is said to have been the outcome of differences with Mr. Potter relative to the operation of the road. These have existed for a long time, and became very acute today.

Appeal in Lumber Rate Case.

HELENA, Mont. Dec. 28.—The Great Northern Railway Company today gave notice of appeal to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals at San Francisco, in the case of the Kallispell Lumber Company, in which Federal Judge Hunt grants a temporary restraining order preventing the railroad from putting into effect a higher tariff on lumber shipments until the Interstate Commerce Commission has passed upon the question. Judge Hunt allowed the appeal.

TRIES TO BUNGO BETTORS

PORTLAND WELSHER CAUGHT
IN ACT AT OAKLAND.

Edwin Wilkinson Detected While
Fleeing From Track With Money,
Leaving Washers to Sports.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—(Special.)—An attempt boldly to make away with more than \$1000 received in a bookmaker's stand that was opened today at Emeryville resulted in the arrest of Edwin Wilkinson and his alleged accomplice, E. S. Grover, in what the authorities believe was a daring effort to swindle racetrack followers who had placed bets with them.

When captured Wilkinson was passing the money to Grover, who was about to make for a waiting automobile. He had just taken in exchange from Grover a batch of iron washers. These, it is said, were to be taken by him back to the betting ring, where assistants were to pay off the winning bettors.

Wilkinson, who is from Portland, Or., came to this city on December 23 and made all arrangements for the opening of a book at the track. The book was opened today, Wilkinson presiding and having as his assistant M. P. Graham and A. B. Graham. He received bettors' money from the first race amounting to \$1045 and left with it. This aroused the suspicions of Portland police, who claim to have seen Wilkinson pass the coin to Grover.

GEISHAS ORGANIZE UNION

Factional Quarrel Among Honolulu
Dancing Girls Is Ended.

HONOLULU, Dec. 21.—(Special correspondence.)—The Geisha girls of Honolulu have organized a protective union in order to prevent the cutting of rates for dancing and entertaining. For some time there have been two cliques among the fair contortionists, and all Japanese has been entertained by the active warfare that has been going on and the criticisms and disclosures made by the Geishas concerning each other. Now the hatchet is buried and the fans once more flutter harmoniously.

Ippachi, a retired Geisha, was the dea ex machina that brought peace to the warring factions, and the union was organized at a tea-drinking afternoon on the mats of her paper bungalow in Palama. As a reward she was elected president of the union and the social arbiter of Honolulu's Japanese. The union rates for attendance at dinners and other functions was established at \$1 per hour per Geisha.

PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF SUN

Visible in Pacific Islands and in
Southern States in This Country.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—An eclipse of the sun will occur January 3, and will be partially visible in the Southern States and the Western Coast of North America. Although the United States Naval Observatory is interested in the occurrence, none of the parties have been sent out by the Government.

The eclipse will be total at Flint Island, in the Pacific, and will be observed by a party from Lick Observatory in charge of Professor W. W. Campbell, who already have been observing the eclipse at Tahiti, aboard the United States ship Annapolis. In the United States the eclipse will be visible just about sunset, and its duration will be short.

SHOOT TO AVOID ARREST

Italian Wanted for Murder Wounds
Arresting Officer.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—While Police Lieutenant Rococo Cavan and two other New York detectives were attempting to arrest a twenty-eight year old Italian, a murderer, of Kingsland, N. J., Bonanno shot Cavan and then himself. Lieutenant Cavan is not thought to be fatally hurt, but Bonanno probably will die.

The police had been searching for Bonanno to arrest him on a charge of having killed Mariano Sant during a row in a saloon. Bonanno was arrested on last Christmas day. Cavan and his two companions, who had traced the fugitive to Kingsland, found Bonanno as he was about to board a train at the railroad station there this morning.

WILL SAIL FOR RIO

Fleet Starts Today on Second
Stage of Voyage.

ALL SHIPS SPICK AND SHAN

Have Drilled With Big Guns and
Torpedoes While at Port of Spain.

Keen Interest in the Brown-
son-Rixey Row.

PORT OF SPAIN, Dec. 28.—The American fleet will sail for Rio de Janeiro tomorrow morning, probably at an early hour, although the exact hour has not been signalled by the Admiral. The battleships have been drilled and given final preparations for the long voyage and are now looking spick and span. The engines, the boilers and all the machinery have been overhauled and everything is in first-class condition for the trip.

Rear-Admiral Evans, on his flagship, Connecticut, accompanied by the Alabama, the flagship of Rear-Admiral Sperry, the Illinois, the Kearsarge and the Kentucky, steamed out into the Gulf this morning to adjust compasses.

They returned about noon, during the stay of the fleet in port considerable time has been devoted to important drills with the big and small guns, torpedo and torpedo defenses.

The news of the Naval controversy in the United States, which has been cabled here, and in which Surgeon-General Rixey and Admiral Brownson figured prominently, is exciting interest among the officers of the fleet, but they refuse to express publicly their views regarding it.

MAKE MANY PLANS AT RIO

Preparations Toward Entertainment
of Officers of Fleet.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 28.—As the day for the arrival here of the American battleships under Rear Admiral Evans approaches, interest in the festivities that will be given in honor of the American officers increases. The preparations are now almost entirely completed.

President Pereira, a number of the officers and Irving B. Dudley, the American Ambassador, at a dinner to be given at the Presidential Palace tomorrow night. The Minister of Marine will invite the Admirals, the commanders and other officers to a promenade lunch" on Corcovado two miles from Rio, and the Naval Club will offer a similar entertainment at the Tijuca Park.

On January 15 Mr. Dudley will give a reception in honor of the visiting officers at his residence in Petropolis.

CHINESE WILL RETALIATE

Bring Suit in Canada for \$500 Dam-
ages, Each, for False Arrest.

SYDNEY, N. S. Dec. 28.—Further developments are expected as the outcome of the recent arrests of 18 Chinese who were charged with evading the immigration laws by entering Canada from Newfoundland without paying the head tax. The Chinese were fined, but appeals were taken and the matter finally settled in the Supreme Court at Halifax, where the Chinese were discharged and their fine of \$1000 was refunded.

Now counsel for the Chinese have notified the customs officials here that proceedings will be brought by the Chinese, each of the 18 arrested claiming \$500 damages for false imprisonment.

INVASION OF GUATEMALA

Force Recruiting in British Hon-
duras, It Is Reported.

PUERTO CORTEZ, Honduras, Dec. 28.—An expedition is being organized at Belize, British Honduras, for the purpose of making an armed invasion of Guatemala, according to advices received here, and General Lee Christmas, formerly of Memphis, Tenn., who has recovered from his wound, received last July during the war between Nicaragua and Honduras, is recruiting a force at Puerto Barrios, an Atlantic port of Guatemala.

Indicted for Conspiracy.

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 28.—R. Flores Magon, Antonio Villareal and Librado Rivera, just ordered extradited from Los Angeles to Arizona, today on the charge of conspiracy to raise military expeditions against Mexico.

Magon was head of the revolutionary junta in the United States at St. Louis and Villareal his chief lieutenant. Villareal escaped a year ago from jail in El Paso.

Would Inconvenience Shipping.

ASTORIA, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—After appointing a special committee to investigate the plan of moving the office of the Federal quarantine officer to Fort Stevens, the Astoria Chamber of Commerce has adopted resolutions opposing the proposed change. Copies of these resolutions have been forwarded to Senators Fulton and Bourne.

Objections to removal of the station are based on the ground that it would be an inconvenience to shipping interests.

Should Enter Politics.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 28.—In a statement given out today J. H. Walker, of Danville, president of the United Mine Workers of Illinois, advises miners to enter politics. He attacks the state legislature for holding up legislation which he says would decrease the number of fatalities in mines.
