### GREEKS TOLD TO LEAVE

RAYMOND LABORERS MEET AND SERVE NOTICE.

Millowners Requested Not to Employ Swarthy Foreigners—Mass Meeting Largely Attended.

RAYMOND, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—A mass meeting of the laboring men of the town was held last night to devise a plan to rid the city of a number of Greek laborers without resorting to violence. A committee was appointed to confer with the millowners and request that the Greeks be refused employment, while another committee was appointed to interview owners of houses in which the Greeks are residing and endeavor to have them elect the latter and refuse to longer rent houses to them. Although

the Greeks offer to work for \$1.50 a day, every plant in the city, thus far, has refused to employ them, preferring to pay higher wages to other workmen.

### DALLAS GOAT SHOW CLOSURE

Large Crowds Viewed Polk County's Splendid Exhibit. DALLAS, Or., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—The ninth annual goat show for Oregon, held during the past three days in Dallas, by the Polk County Mohair Association, closed last night. Record crowds were in attendance during the entire show, special trains being run from various neighboring towns on the last day. Representatives from the leading agricultural periodicals of the Northwest attended. Over 150 animals, mostly registered stock, were exhibited. No cash prizes had been offered for unregistered animals and their exhibit was comparatively small. The Cotswold sheep from the Koser farm

at Rickreall and Gilliam's farm at Bridgeport were exhibited. C. L. Hawley, of McCoy, showed two pens of thoroughbred Lincolns. Fred Koser, of Rickreall, exhibited several pens of blooded Berkshire swine, and S. D. Steffy two pens of Poland Chinas. Judges in the unregistered class were E. L. Naylor, of Forest Grove; E. Van Evans and J. I. Reasoner, of Dallas. The judges in the registered class were G. F. Boothby, of Mouth; M. M. Nickell, McMinnville, and S. F. Zysset, of Thomas. The largest prize winners in the registered class were D. E. Naylor, Forest Grove; W. A. Ayres, Dallas; S. E. Guthrie, Bridgeport. In the unregistered class L. A. Guthrie, Bridgeport; G. W. McBees, Dallas. Winners of sweepstakes were E. S. Naylor, first, on best doe; U. S. Grant, first, on best buck in registered class; L. A. Guthrie, first, on doe, and J. J. McBees, first, on buck in unregistered class.

### SHOW JOSEPHINE PRODUCTS

POULTRY, STOCK AND FRUIT MEETING AT GRANTS PASS.

Rogue River Farmers Will Convene for Three Days' Programme. Much Interest Manifest.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—Great preparation is being made among the poultry raisers of Josephine County for the Rogue River Valley Poultry Show to be held here January 30 and February 1. This is the first instance in which a competitive exhibit for poultry has been attempted in this valley. About 40 special prizes will be awarded. More than a local interest has been manifested and many business houses have readily come forward to contrib-

ute prizes. Every fowl will come in for his share of attention, from the little bantam to the well-groomed Rhode Island red. Considerable space will be devoted to turkeys, geese and ducks. Besides awards for birds and fowls, prizes will be offered for different classes of eggs. The express company has given special rates to those who desire to ship poultry to the show. One part of the room will be exclusively devoted for the display of incubators, brooders and other poultry supplies. The farmers and raisers of fowls will be given an opportunity to see the many modern methods now in use for hatching and protecting the little chicks. Elmer Dixon, of Oregon City, who is licensed by the American Poultry Association, has been secured to judge the exhibits. Professor James Dryden, of Corvallis Agricultural College, will superintend the exhibits. Following the poultry show, the Stock Breeders' Association will hold their meeting. ### LOGGING ROAD UP WYNOOCHEE

Montesano Millowners Announce Plans for Construction.

MONTESANO, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—It was reported here last night that the Laska Brothers, the Lamb Timber Company, and Dan McCrimmon had formed an agreement for the building of a logging railroad up the Wynoochee River from this place. All of these companies have large holdings of timber north of this city and the agreement was made in order that each might use the road. The proposed road will run from the Chesalis River up the Wynoochee to Black Creek; it will also have switch connections with the Northern Pacific Railway. This new road will open up a large

section of new timber and will add much to the logging industries which have their base at Montesano.
