

DATE WAGE THAT PAID ON LUMBER

Wheat Handled by Railroads Returns Double Revenue for Same Distance.

FACTS FROM THE RECORDS

Washington Commission Expert Reports Results of Investigation Made Last Summer at the St. Paul Headquarters.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Washington wheat-growers pay the Northern Pacific more than twice as much per ton mile on their wheat as the lumbermen pay on lumber.

At an expense of many thousand dollars the commission has secured tables showing in detail just what freight movement the Great Northern and Northern Pacific handle in this state, what proportion of each class is handled solely within the state and the proportion moved interstate, whether via rail or water, and other pertinent facts.

Ono may find in the figures given grounds for basing many contradictory contentions. For instance, the average rate per ton-mile received for grain hauled within the state was 1.47 cents, while the rate per ton-mile on interstate lumber shipment was 4.71 cent.

Less than 21 per cent of the total of lumber hauled was for points within the state, nearly 80 per cent going interstate. The average lumber hauled within the state was 113 miles and interstate 1488 miles.
