

PADEREWSKI IS A MAN OF THE WORLD

Great Musician Is Not Effeminate Nor a Dreamer, but a Man of Flesh and Blood.

PROBABLY one of the most interesting personages among the musicians who will visit this city this season is Ignace Paderewski. A shaker from the strong right hand of Paderewski dissipates all previous notions of any physical weakness. The foremost pianist of the age is not a dream man, nor is he a mere pulse. His grasp would be a fortune to a politician, and his manner would make distinction for a diplomat. Most decidedly he is of this world. He is a man of it, and witty. We dare say he is witty in five languages, for he commands that many, but he talks one at a time, and never leaves it without a cue. He talks in level paragraphs unscarred—there are no italics.

Paderewski upon the unlit concert stage is not more impressive than when you see him in the parlor of the hotel, or in his private car, and when you separate him from his music, he impresses you probably as a man of big bones, and a strong nervousness and magnetism. The pink hair of the recital stage becomes almost asburn in the light if the morning, and it is loose rather than long; it scrawbles waywardly all over the head and half over the ears, while an echo of it falls on the upper lip.

Away from the dress suit of evening, the morning clothes cover him like a well-ordered citizen, and you realize that you have lost the musician, but you have found the man. He makes you feel at home and puts you at ease; he is a real host, so delightfully different from what you have expected. You anticipated an older man, but then you must remember he began early in this rustling, bustling musical world.

He is interested in music to a great degree, he wants to know about your orchestras, your composers, your managers, your theater orchestras, your cafe orchestras. He is looking for information concerning America and its people. He is looking for the country that pays the money for what? Imported music, when they should have a music of their own; but all these items of interest all these questions and answers, will be more fully understood when you meet Paderewski during his forthcoming visit to this city, and know him not only as a musician, but as a man as well.

The Great Western Musical Bureau, through our local managers is introducing Paderewski to the public for the first time since he began to visit the Pacific Coast.

In future, if the licensing proposals which are now being drafted are carried into law, the rates to be levied will be much on the same lines as the present rates for ordinary public houses. That is, it will be a sliding scale of charges, according to the valuation. In most of the big clubs, the business done in the drink line is on a par with almost the ordinary trade, and in many cases in the purely social clubs, particularly many of the so-called workmen's clubs, it far exceeds the sales in very many of the public houses. A large amount of revenue will be tapped in this way.

PARIS ART AMATEUR DEAD

Camille Groult Guarded Treasures With Great Zeal.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Camille Groult died a few days ago at the age of 75, from the result of a fall which broke his thigh. He had never been ill once before in his life. He was one of the best-known modern art amateurs, and one of the most curious figures of Paris society. His collection of Watteaus, Pragonards, Nattiers, Gainsborough, Hoppers, Thomas Lawrences, and also Turners is magnificent, and valued at over \$400,000. He was jealous of his treasures and not everyone could see them.

KING PLEASSED WITH ORDER

Will Prevent Repetition of "Berensford-Scott Scandal."

LONDON, Feb. 8.—(Special)—At the council which the King held at Buckingham Palace on January 23, his Majesty signified his formal approval of an admiralty order which will prevent any repetition of the foolish, mischievous and very undignified proceedings at Portland in connection with the so-called "Berensford-Scott scandal."

LIVES IN CHARNEL HOUSE

Girl Cooks and Sleeps in Room With Dead Body.

BERLIN, Feb. 8.—(Special)—A grisly tragedy has come to light at Leipzig. Since November 17 nothing has been seen of a bookseller named Paul Giegler, who had a business in the Goechenhausen street. A young woman named Minna Doell, who lived with him, at first informed the inquiring neighbors and relations that he was traveling in Italy, but later altered this version to the indiscreet statement that he was in a Vienna hospital. Investigations in the Austrian capital failed to reveal any news of the missing man, and heightened the already aroused suspicions of those connected with him.

On Saturday last they decided to attempt forcible entrance to his dwelling. Before, however, they had got the door open the Doell girl jumped from the window and took to her heels. The police, who searched on Sunday by the police, who found Giegler's corpse hidden beneath the tidily-arranged covering of a bed. The body was in an advanced state of decomposition, and was discolored almost to blackness, but it still bore unmistakable signs of violent strangulation. It was evident that the girl had cooked and slept in the same room with the dead man. She had made off with \$250, but has since been arrested at Halle.

SELL KAISER POSTAL CARDS

Pictures Drawn by German Emperor Reproduced for Charity.

BERLIN, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Three picture postcards by the hand of the Emperor have just been published in a series planned by the late Queen Carolina of Saxony, in aid of the charitable fund. One is a reproduction of a picture of a sea battle painted in 1895. Then there are two scenic designs for the Burggraf of Nuremberg tower, in romantic style, signed "Wilhelm R. L. architect, 4-7-1892," and a couple of designs for regatta prizes. All bear autographic descriptions by His Majesty. Large orders for these cards are said to have been received from England.

Another proof of the Emperor's many-sided activity will shortly be laid before the German public in the form of photographs of Corfe Castle, taken by His Majesty during his recent residence in England. They are to be shown on a screen at a lecture by the architect, Bodo Ehardt, on English and German castles.

REFUSES PAY FOR TWINS

Servant's Lawyer Raises Fine Point in French Court.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Having promised his servant girl \$3 a month when her child was born, a doctor at Neuilly refused to pay more when twins appeared. In the court the girl's lawyer likened the doctor to the sportsman who blinds a gamekeeper in one eye, for which he has to give the man a pension. Afterward the gamekeeper, owing to the injury, becomes totally blind, but merely, asked the lawyer, the sportsman does not expect to get off at the same cost for one eye as for two.

For the doctor, it was contended that French law recognized no liability of the father in such a case. He had agreed to pay the girl \$3 monthly to help her with the burden a child entailed, but did not bargain to have to pay for twins. The accident of birth was no reason why he should pay twice \$3, as contended by the mother. The judges adjourned their decision.
