

BLACK HAND THUGS PUT TO ROUT

Banker Defends Property and Shoots Robber Full of Bullet Holes.

ATTEMPT IS IN DAYLIGHT

Thief Enters Bank and Announces Intention of Killing Proprietor. Latter is Quicker With Gun and Opens Fire at Once.

NEW YORK, March 7.—(Special.)—A daylight attempt at the Black Hand to rob his bank today at the point of a pistol, Pasquale Patti, who conducts a large banking and exchange business in the Italian quarter, in Elizabeth street, in a pistol duel in which his son-in-law, Louis Cartier joined, shot Francesco Pellatro, alias Giuseppe Sapio, who is dying tonight in a hospital with five bullet wounds in his body as a result of his attempt to hold up the bank. A second man, Micaelo Dogostino, whom the police believe is an accomplice of Pellatro, was arrested while running from the bank after the shooting.

After 14 years, Patti told the police, he was constantly receiving Black Hand letters, and only a month ago the front of his bank was blown out by a bomb and \$10,000 scattered in the street, which was saved by prompt work on the part of the banker.

The closing hour of the bank was near at hand today and the streets in the neighborhood were teeming with people returning from a half holiday's toil when Pellatro entered the bank.

DRAIN THE ATHLETIC FIELD

Pacific Students Spend Half Holiday With Pick and Shovel.

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Forest Grove, Or., March 7.—(Special.)—Thirty after-noon 75 robust students assembled on the athletic field with shovels to drain and level the grounds. The half-holiday granted by President Harkin to the cause of athletics was made good use of. Nearly a half mile of ditch completed the work. Two parallel ditches encircling the entire athletic field make the football and track grounds dry.

This improvement has made Pacific University the possessor of the driest and the best track in the state. The grounds are thoroughly netted with tile so that long-distance men can hereafter train the entire school year. Nearly every man in the University donned working clothes and assisted in the work. Captains C. D. Mason of the track, and H. P. Humphreys, of football, were leaders in pushing the work.

PLANT NEW NUT IN YAMHILL

Fifty California Pistachio Received at McMinnville.

McMINNVILLE, Or., March 7.—(Special.)—The Walnut Club of this city, has received through its secretary, W. H. Latourrette, a present of 50 pistachio nut trees from the Government experimental farm at Chico, Cal., for distribution to the members of the club, and a meeting has been called for this evening for the purpose of making the distribution. The pistachio is a native of Western Asia, but is grown in England and France. It is believed that the similarity of the Willamette Valley climate to these two countries will insure the successful growing of the nuts here. The nuts are very high-priced, and are used principally for flavoring the more expensive confectionery.
