CHINESE FIGHT FOR LIBERTY.—Roger E. Sinnott has been retained as legal counsel by Chin You and Leong So, Chinese, who are charged with being in the United States unlawfully. The man and woman make no defense to the charge of an unlawful entry into the country but explain that they are merely on their honeymoon and are on their way to Victoria to take the steamer for China. A telegram was received Friday from San Francisco requesting the arrest of Leong So, the woman, on a charge of theft in that city, but the immigration officials decline to surrender the custody of the prisoner until the alleged violation of the immigration laws has been settled. The woman was formerly a slave girl in San Francisco and the charge of theft is believed to be only a ruse to effect her return to her former vocation. Attorney Sinnott has advised that he will use every effort to enable the woman to return to China when the present case is settled.

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THE PROTECTION ASKED FOR.—The two pulp clubs of Montavilla, the Sixth Precinct and the Montavilla Improvement Board, with the Center Addition and Mount Taber improvement associations have petitioned the Council for suitable fire equipment for several sections of the city have built up rapidly within the last few years and must be provided with some equipment other than the Sunnyside engine. Chief Campbell says the necessity for this is urgent and called attention to it in his annual report. Center Addition and Mount Taber are districts of homes, while the Sixth and Sixty-five precincts cover the business center and practically all of Montavilla. These people have been patient and now after paying city taxes for three years, think they are justly entitled to make their homes safe. They have secured sufficient ground for a full regulation fire station, free of charge to the city.

ROMBERG ISLAND SHANNON DEAD.—Robert Beattie Shannon died last Monday, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. N. Scott. Mr. Shannon was born 39 years ago. His early boyhood was spent in Columbia, Mo. Later he became a pioneer of Iowa, removing to Oregon in 1881. In 1885 he was married to Eleanor Adams Cleaver. Two daughters survive, Mrs. W. R. Malloy, of Chicago, and Mrs. H. N. Scott, of this city, with whom he has made his home.

CHARGES AGAINST McCANN.—Charges against Richard M. McCann, newly elected prospector of the Multnomah Bar Association, have been filed with the State Bar Association. It is charged that Mr. McCann is unlawfully retaining \$2 being offered to Guy Ritter, a convict at the penitentiary. In defending Ritter, Mr. McCann is said to have received \$102, \$59 being appropriated for legal services, \$5 being given to a money lender on an order from Ritter and the other \$2 being retained. J. A. Beckwith sets out that he has demanded the money from Mr. McCann on behalf of Ritter but that it was not given him. Mr. McCann saying he would hold the money for Ritter until the young man got out of the penitentiary.

FRANK T. PAYNE DEAD.—Frank T. Payne, a business man of East Portland in pioneer days, died yesterday at his home at 24 Taylor street, aged 38 years of age. In the early days of East Portland he conducted a foundry and machine shop on East Oak and Third streets. He was also engineer in charge of the fire engine company. About 12 years ago he moved to his farm at Scappoose, which proved to be very rich in iron ore. He is survived by his widow, L. C. Payne, of Portland, is a son, who left last night for his father's home. The body will be brought to Portland for interment.
