Oregon Humane Society Does a Good Work

Report of President Cake Reveals Fact That Many Cases of Cruelty to Animals Are Punished.

The following annual report of H. M. Cake, president of the Oregon Humane Society, reveals the fact that many cases of cruelty to animals are investigated and punished. The Oregon Humane Society, which has become one of the indispensable institutions of our city, was organized in 1872, mainly through the efforts of W. T. Shanahan, who has been corresponding secretary during the period of 35 years. The past year has been one of great usefulness. Many have been the calls upon our officers for help, and much good has been done in relieving brute creatures from cruel treatment. An examination will show how urgent is the need of our existence as a society, as well as the prompt and effective manner in which that need has been met. And the work we have done by way of prevention is probably greater than the relief afforded by prosecution and punishment, yet we must continue to be watchful and prompt to relieve, as well as to punish, without the facts justify it. For it is by punishing one that we deter many others from committing the like offenses, and so

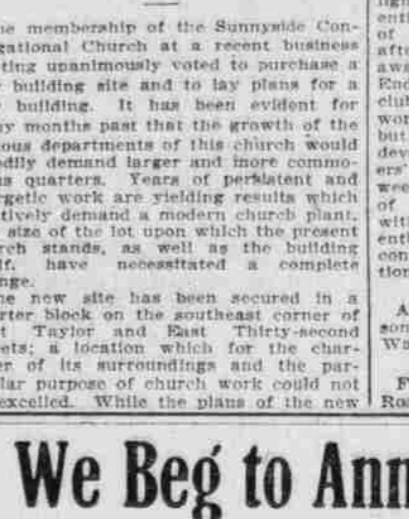
Church to Have New Home
