





If Desert Claim Is Lost, Another May Be Entered-Right of Entry

BURNS, Or., April 18. - (Special.)of the passage of two land laws which are of considerable importance to this section of the state. One refers to the entry of a second desert claim where

section of the state. One refers to the entry of a second desert claim where the first one has been lost in any way and reads as follows: That any person who prior to the passage of this act has made entry under the desert land laws, but from any cause has beat, for-felied, or abandoned the same shall be en-tilled to the benefits of the desert land law as though such former sentry had not been made, and any person applying for a second desert land entry under this act shall fur-nish the description and date of his former entry. Provided, that the provisions of this act shall not apply to any person whose for-mer entry was assigned in whole or in part or canceled for fraud, or who relinguished the former entry for a valuable consider-ation.
