JOSEPHINE COUNTY FRUIT Damage by Frost Night of April 24 Reported to Be Slight.

GRANTS PASS, Or., April 30.—That water in water pipes became frozen and that there was a cold spell so severe as to freeze vegetation and to kill 25 per cent of the fruit in Josephine County, as stated by The Oregonian's correspondent in yester-day's issue, is a statement not warranted by the facts, and has done a great injustice to the fruit industry of this section of Rogue
