

BOARD ANNOUNCES TEACHERS' NAMES

OREGON G. A. R. WILL MEET ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT AT NEWPORT THIS WEEK. Reports Will Show This State Is One of Few in Which Organization is Growing. The Department of Oregon, G. A. R., will receive reports from the commander and his official staff at the coming annual encampment, which opens at Newport next Tuesday, which will show that the organization in this state is one of the very few throughout the country that show an increase in membership instead of a falling off. At almost all state gatherings throughout the United States this summer, members of the order will be apprised of the extent of the growing march of the years the Civil War veterans keep dropping, one by one, from the ranks and the different organizations are gradually being depleted because the old soldiers are called by the final muster. But in this state the Grand Army organization shows a creditable increase in members and strength during the year that ends this week. A number of new posts have been formed throughout the state and existing posts have recruited members outside of the order. The annual address of Commander S. F. Blythe and the report of Adjutant-General C. A. Williams will show the department in an exceedingly healthy condition. Few other state departments have even held their own during the year. The encampment at Newport will be attended by not less than 1000 old soldiers and members of the auxiliary women's organization, the Women's Relief Corps and the Ladies of the G. A. R., who hold annual conventions at the same time and place as the Grand Army. Special coaches will be attached to the Southern Pacific train leaving Portland Tuesday morning at 8:15

o'clock, and passengers will be sent through to Newport without change of cars. Many will go from this city. The business sessions of the G. A. R. will be held at the Casino at Newport, while the general reception and campfires will be held in the skating rink. The W. R. C. will meet at the opera-house and the Ladies of the G. A. R. will use the Presbyterian Church for their meeting place. Abe Lincoln Corps, W. R. C., of Toledo, will give a reception to Department Commander Blythe, G. A. R., and Department Commander Mrs. Cora M. Davis, of the W. R. C., and their official staffs at the Log Cabin, Nye Creek, Tuesday night, June 23. There is a lively contest between different cities of the state for the next annual encampment and the election of officers for the coming year will be a feature of the session.

BERLIN, June 20.—(Special).—Miss Gertrude Wentzel, 17 years old, and the daughter of rich and respected parents at Targau, has been sentenced to three months' imprisonment for having committed a large number of burglaries in Switzerland, and for firing six shots from a revolver at the policeman who arrested her. About seven weeks ago the girl ran away from a fashionable boarding school at Potsdam in search of adventure, taking with her as a servant a man of 39, Emil Harden. The couple went direct to Switzerland, where the girl declared her intention of becoming a lady burglar and committed a number of the most daring burglaries which ever baffled the Swiss police. Having been caught at Lucerne, she at first refused to tell anything about herself, but after a few days in a cell she broke down and told everything. Her accomplice was sent to prison for two years.
