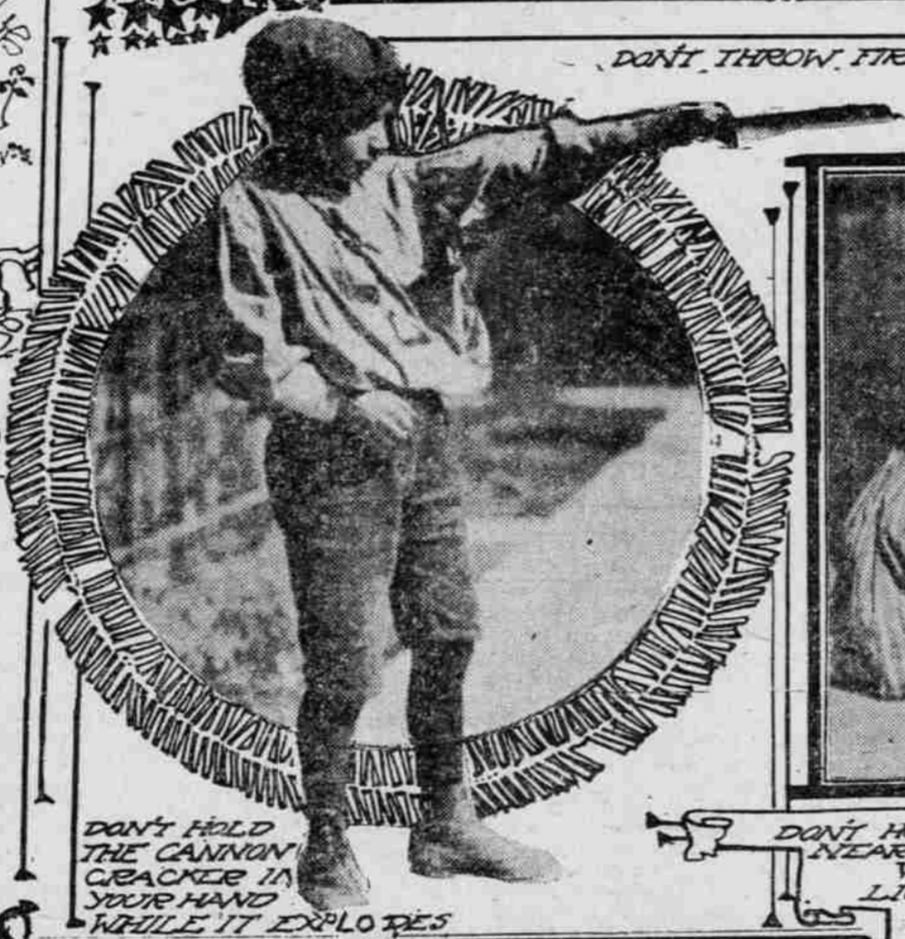

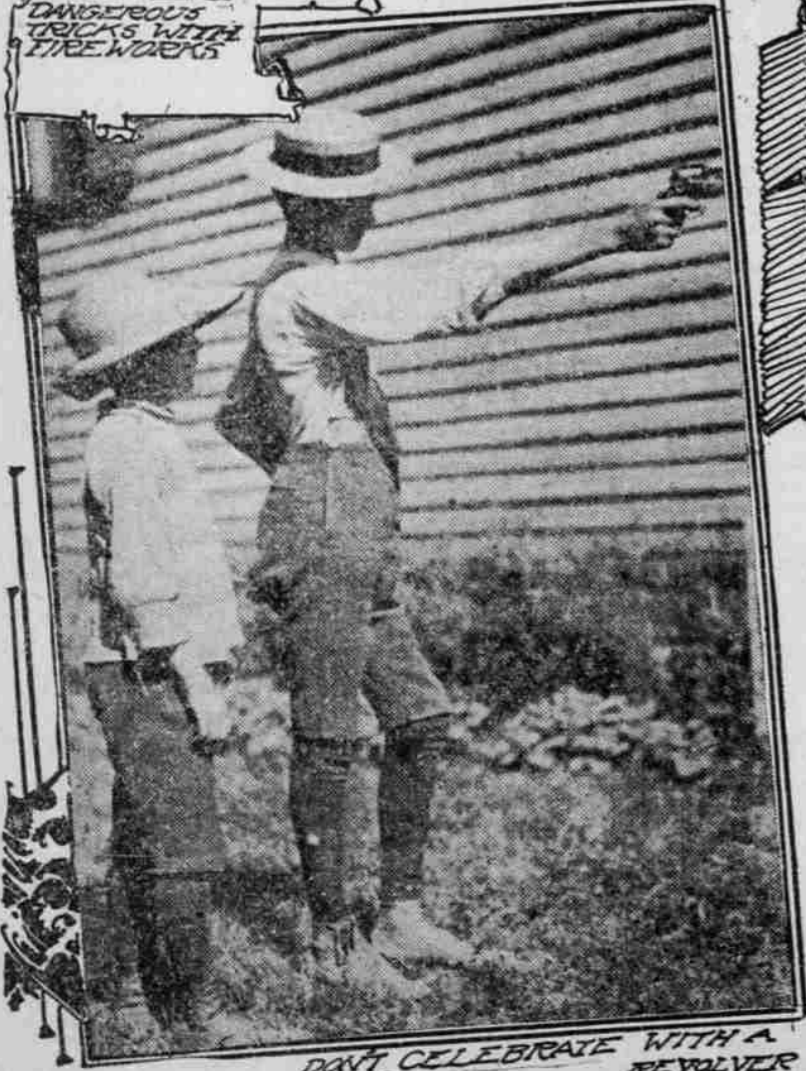

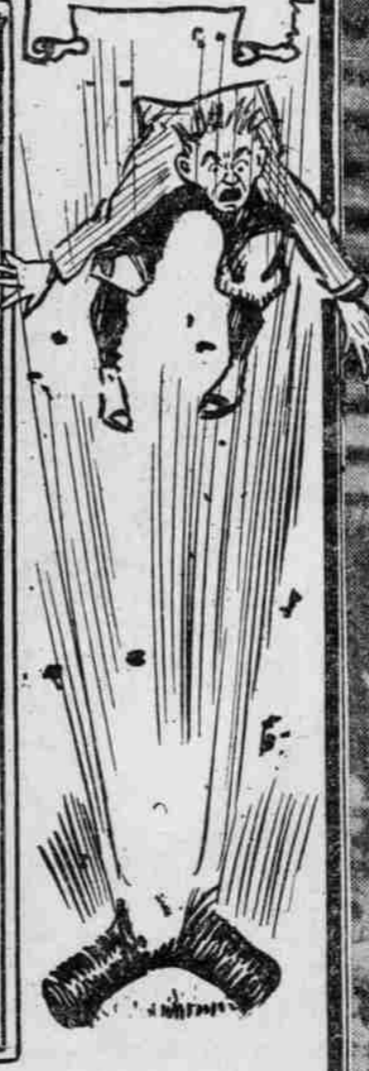

HUNDREDS of boys and girls will suffer much Saturday from the careless way they handle fireworks. Some will die from the terrible injuries they will receive while celebrating the great National holiday. The fatalities each year are appalling. So many are the accidents that the police authorities in many of the large cities now are forbidding persons from celebrating the Fourth in many dangerous ways. This is looked upon by many boys and girls as an unkind act, and only done to prevent them from having

a really good time in celebrating the one great day of the year. Not so! It is only to prevent you from having so many chances of losing a finger, a hand, your eyes and possibly you killing yourself. Here are a number of photographs made especially to show you how not to handle fireworks. There is a lesson in each, and their careful perusal may prevent many painful accidents and possibly save lives sometimes lost by the innocent little careless tricks which make July the Fourth dreaded in every

hospital of the land, and the result of sorrow in many homes. Look at each picture carefully and remember on the Fourth: Do not look into a Roman candle which you think has gone out after you have once lit it. Do not think of holding those powerful cannon crackers in your hands

while they are exploding, any more than you would think of holding a stick of dynamite, for the explosive in the cannon cracker is often nothing more than dynamite wrapped in paper. Do not throw fireworks at persons or try to scare sister by throwing them at her. She may be crippled for life thereafter. The revolver is the cause of many

bad accidents on the Fourth. The loaded cartridges somehow nearly always get mixed with the blanks, and some one is hurt. "When you teach children to avoid kissing, swapping gum and eating half baked foods and to be clean you will be doing something to prevent tuberculosis," declared Dr. S. A. Knopf, of New York, at the recent convention of the American Medical Association in Chicago.
