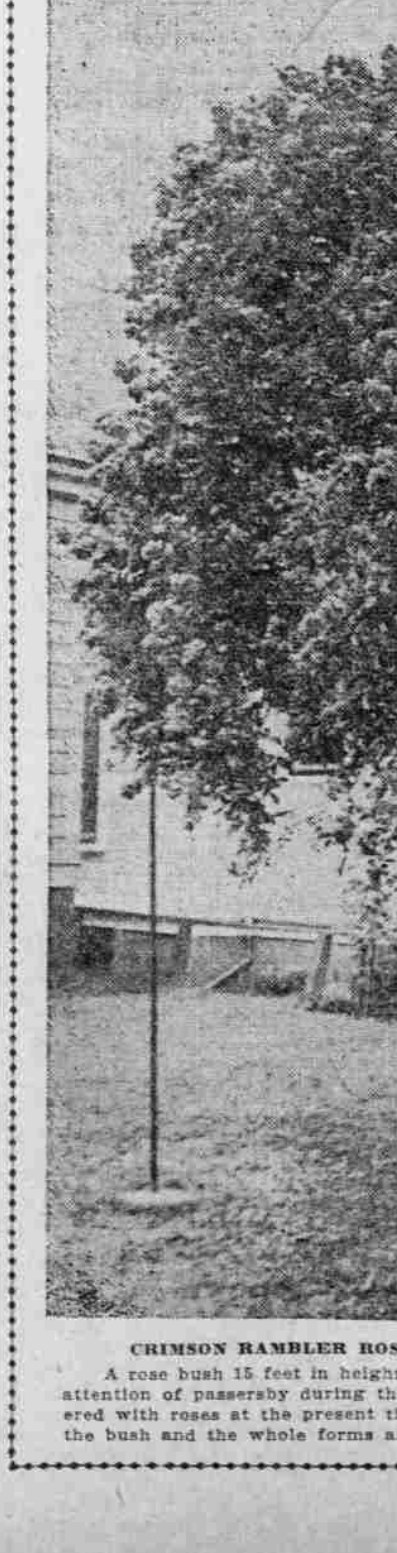
WOODMERE PLANT DEMOLISHED.—The old Woodmere water pumping station, which stood on the Mount Scott railway, is being demolished.
