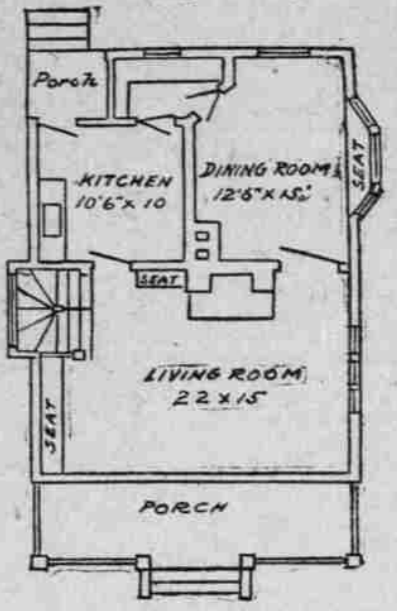
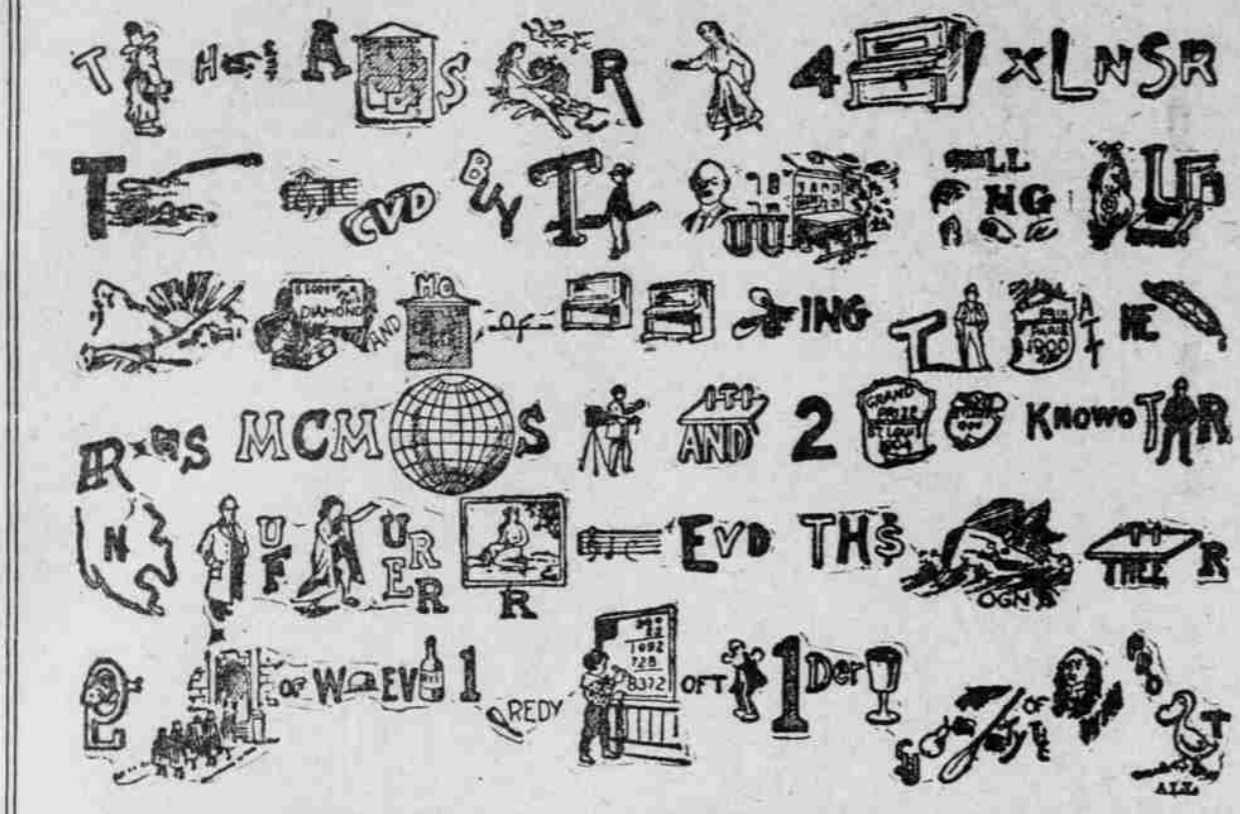


WE WILL GIVE AWAY A COTTAGE BY THE SEA In Gearhart Park

CREATE THEIR OWN MODES
Italian Women Tired of Following Fashions Set by Paris.

ROME, July 18.—(Special.)—With the approval of Queen Helena herself, a great emancipation movement is being organized among Italian women to shake off the tyranny of Paris and London fashions. At the head of the movement is Signorina Falco Lombroso, daughter of the famous sociologist Professor Cesare Lombroso. A women's congress is shortly to be held in this city to discuss the whole matter of women's fashions and an attempt will be made to find means by which Italy will in the future create her own modes. Thousands of women in all parts of Italy are supporting the movement enthusiastically.

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
