It has been our good fortune in Portland to know one of the most eminent of living American artists, not only in some of his best works, but in so many pictures of different periods as to illustrate the phases of his development and enable us to understand the underlying spirit of his art as isolated examples could hardly do.

George De Forest Brush was born in Shelbyville, Tenn., in 1856. He studied in Paris under Gerome, whose sound academic training and careful technique were at that time a valuable discipline for our young American student, a discipline by which none has profited more than Brush.
