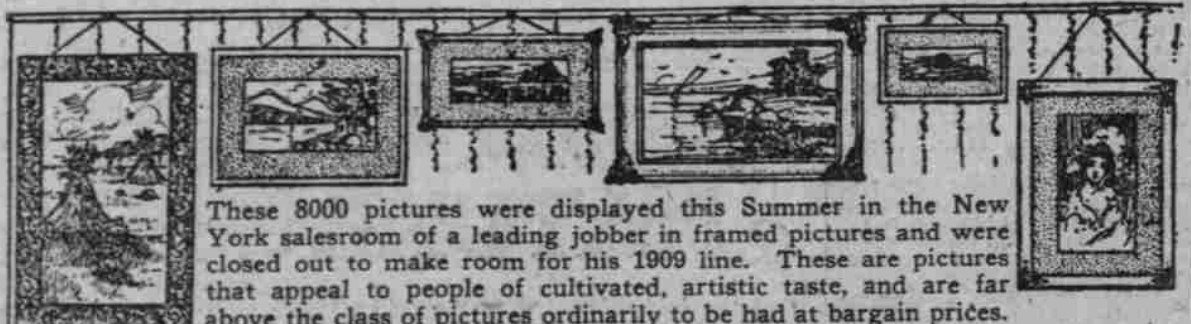

LARGENY CHARGE AGAINST WATTS

Lawyer Arrested on Complaint of Dr. W. T. Eisen, ex-Danish Vice-Consul.

OUT ON BONDS OF \$2500

Eisen Declares Watts Is Guilty of Theft of \$1300, Including \$1000 Deposited as Bail—Watts Sues Eisen for Attorney's Fees.

John F. Watts, a lawyer, was arrested by Constable Lou Wagner yesterday morning on a warrant issued upon a complaint signed by Dr. William T. Eisen, formerly Danish Vice-Consul at Portland, charging larceny by embezzlement in the sum of \$100. Watts appeared before Justice of the Peace Olson during the afternoon and asked that he be given a speedy hearing, but owing to the crowded condition of the docket, the case was fixed at 2 P. M., September 28. Watts is at liberty on \$2500 bonds given by John Rometsch.

While the complaint on file in the Justice Court charges the larceny of \$100, Dr. Eisen declares that Watts is guilty of the theft of \$1300, and that he will prefer charges on account of the theft of the remaining \$1200 tomorrow. Eisen says that Watts gained entrance to his office in the Alaska building and stole receipts for \$1000 cash which had been deposited with the Clerk of the Circuit Court as bail for Dr. Eisen in the case of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, on which he was convicted. While Dr. Eisen was in Los Angeles last January he says, Watts took the receipts to the Clerk of the Court, found two men whom Eisen does not know who gave a bond for the \$1000, and Watts then secured the cash from the Clerk of the Court and kept it.

Eisen charges that on another occasion Watts raised a check on the First National Bank and secured \$200 on it. Watts had asked for \$20 or \$25. Eisen gave him a check instructing Watts to fill in the amount, either \$20 or \$25. Eisen says when he got the check back from the bank he found Watts had made it out for \$200.

Late yesterday afternoon Watts filed suit in the Circuit Court to recover \$1000, which he says is due him from Eisen for attorney's fees. In the suit are sensational charges against the former Danish Vice-Consul, and it is revealed that Eisen's license as Vice-Consul were revoked following his conviction for embezzlement in the criminal operation on Jennie Sighers.

According to Watts' complaint, \$15 is due him as a fee for engineering a compromise of a threatened criminal prosecution of Dr. Eisen for performing a criminal operation on one Z. White. This is alleged to have occurred in June. Watts asserts that there is a balance of \$56.49 due him on a \$1000 bill for defending Eisen on the Jennie Sighers' case; \$250 for advice concerning that case; \$55 for appearances before the State Medical Board when they attempted to revoke Dr. Eisen's license as a physician; \$50 for advice concerning a suit for damages against the State Medical Board; and \$100 March with the Danish Consul at San Francisco concerning the revocation of Eisen's Vice-Consulship.

Dr. Eisen last night laughed at Watts' suit and expressed the conviction that Watts will leave town while he is at liberty on bail. The \$100 which forms the basis of the larceny charge was paid yesterday, it is alleged to have been collected by Watts from a man named Peterson, whom Watts sued for Dr. Eisen. He is charged with having taken the money, charged with having told him he had not received the money from Constable Wagner, but when Eisen saw the Constable he learned that the money had been paid to Watts.

BROTHERS' SCHOOL OPENS

Classes Resumed at Blanch Institute, Fifth and Mill Streets.

Studies were resumed at the Christian Brothers' School, Fifth and Mill streets, the past week. An unusual number of new pupils have entered this year on account of the splendid facilities that will be afforded them at the new college nearing completion. Two new classes have been opened and the teaching staff has been increased by the addition of three Brothers from California.

The full staff for the year is as follows: Brother V. Andrew, F. S. C., president; Brother Linus, F. S. C., vice-president; director of preparatory department; professor of bookkeeping, shorthand and mathematics; Brother Luke, F. S. C., director of commercial department, professor of shorthand, commercial law, mathematics and calligraphy; Brother Fidelis, F. S. C., director of grammar department, professor of English, civics, history and modern languages; Brother Adrian, F. S. C., director of preparatory department, professor of English, typewriting and penmanship; Professor Lambert Morrin, A. M., assistant teacher, professor of modern languages, history, mathematics and instructor of evening classes; Edward E. Lee, professor of business penmanship and ornamental writing; Frederick W. Goodrich, professor of piano and voice culture; Augustus E. Wirt, professor of violin, mandolin and director of college orchestra.

Besides this regular staff of teachers prominent business men have been engaged to deliver lectures from time to time to the advanced students on the business affairs of the day.

The new college will be ready for occupancy in November. It is to be a thorough commercial college, fully equipped and modern in every detail. The dedicatory services will be conducted by His Grace, Most Rev. Alexander Christie, D. D., Sunday, November 22, at 2 P. M.

Two Men Crushed by Engine.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 12.—Four men walking on the track of the Lake Shore road at West Twenty-eighth street today were struck by an engine. Two fell under the wheels and were horribly mangled, dying almost instantly. Another died while being taken to a hospital. A fourth man escaped serious injury. It is said all the men were from Buffalo and were looking for employment.
