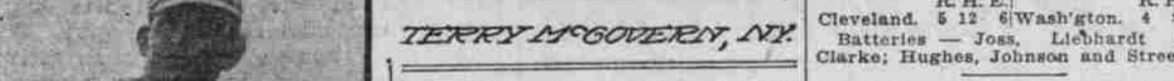
NEW YORK PLAYERS AND SCENE AT POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK CITY



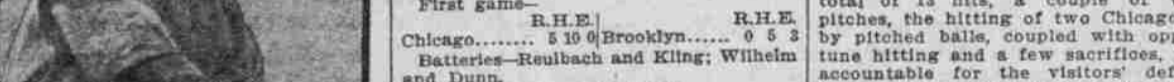

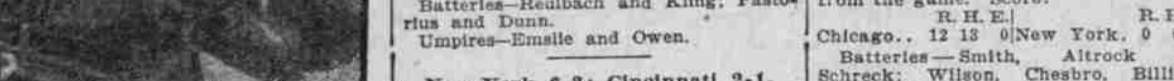
