PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 26.—The danger of tuberculosis infection from milk and how to prevent it was one of the principal subjects taken up today at the closing session of the International Conference on Tuberculosis.

A commission of seven, headed by Dr. Robert Koch, of Germany, was appointed today to inquire into the danger of tuberculosis from milk infection.

What the Red Cross Society is doing in the crusade against tuberculosis was presented by delegates of that body.

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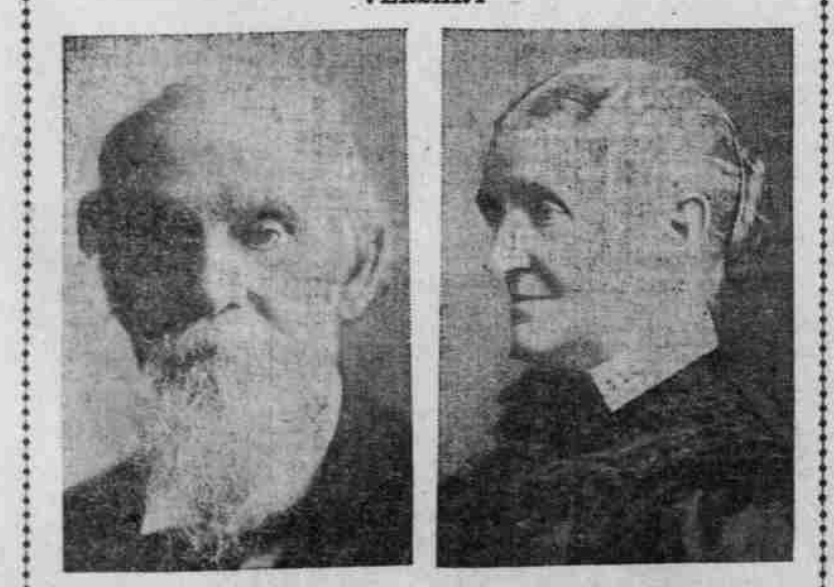
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PIONEERS CELEBRATE SIXTIETH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY
