

REMAINERS WILL BE DEATH IN OCEAN

Balloon Hergzell Picked Up in North Sea, Occupants Missing.

ONLY FATALITIES IN RACE

Disastrous Contest for International Cup, in Which Two Balloons Burst and Six Descend in North Sea.

YARMOOUTH, England, Oct. 17.—The German balloon Hergzell, has been picked up in the North Sea. There was, however, no sign of the occupants and the two are believed to have perished.

The balloon races that were started at Berlin on Sunday and Monday of this week have been characterized by a series of mishaps, but the Hergzell is the only airship to end its flight with death to its pilots.

A total of 50 balloons started in the two races, the first for the international cup and the second an endurance contest. Two of them, the American Conqueror and the Spanish Montano, burst in the air, the first at a height of 4000 feet and the second at a height of 6000 feet, and their occupants had miraculous escapes from death.

BIG BOND HOUSE IN DEEP TROUBLE

Accused of Secret Assignment to Defraud Its Creditors.

MILLIONS ARE INVOLVED

E. H. Gay & Co., of Boston, Thrown into Involuntary Bankruptcy. Defaulted in Interest on Power Bonds.

BOSTON, Oct. 17.—(Special.)—Millions of dollars are involved in the involuntary petition in bankruptcy filed in the United States District Court today against the big bond house of E. H. Gay & Co. by creditors.

"That on August 8 the firm made a general assignment to John P. Reynolds, Jr., for the benefit of creditors, and that the concern conveyed and transferred to Reynolds the whole or part of its property with intent to hinder, delay and defraud."
