ROSENBECKER TO CONDUCT

The event will follow more closely the paths so successfully marked by the big musical festival at Worcester, Mass., and Cincinnati, Ohio.

Arrangements for the coming music festival here were completed at the Heilig Theater last night, at a conference attended by Manager Charles Beach, of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Heilig Theater management, and William H. Boyer, the conductor of the Portland chorus.

The holder of these 2000 season tickets after they have each paid their \$1 can afterward have the seats so taken reserved for them at \$2 a seat, and some for \$1 a seat, extra for the season. It is a simple plan, it will stop to think it out, and will quickly solve the financial end of the matter.

After the seats blocked off on this plan and no more will be sold except at the regular concert prices.

Mr. Beach will bring the Chicago Symphony Orchestra here with his 27 members, and he says it is better than ever. The personnel of the vocal quartet will be somewhat changed, and in addition to it another attraction will be Myrtle Elyon, the great pianist, who will make her second American tour this season.

The Chicago Symphony Orchestra has already arranged to give concerts at New Orleans, La., through Texas, at the University of California, Stanford University, and other cities of California, and this city. Mr. Beach left last night for Seattle and Tacoma to arrange for concerts the other portions of the tour.

Mr. Beach had decided that the musical selections to be rendered at three of the five concerts will be: Sullivan's "Golden Legend," Gaudi's "Holy City," and Rossini's "The Barber of Seville." The other selections will be afterward announced.

A meeting of the Portland vocal chorus for the purpose of forming an organization will be held shortly, and this time it is hoped to organize a big chorus of 500 voices. INDIANA IS SAFE FOR TAFT

LETTER TO PORTLAND MAN IS EXPRESSION OF CONFIDENCE.

Charles B. Moores Receives Review of Political Situation From President State Bar Association.

Charles B. Moores, of this city, has received a letter from his cousin, Merrill Moores, of Indianapolis, Ind., in which it is confidently declared that Indiana will cast its electoral vote for Taft in the coming election.

"I started in August 15 with the work of organizing the county precinct committees, conducting revival meetings with the workers in counties after counties. Between the organization meetings I have been haranguing voters in every part of the state. As to the public speaking, all was done in the winter and spring. Our meetings have been largely attended and that the people seem to be greatly interested. Nobody leaves a meeting and the people are enthusiastic. From the organization meetings I can get a pretty good idea of how the condition appears to the precinct committees, and I have had many meetings and talked with individual committees in every part of the state. As to the National ticket, conditions were more favorable in 1904. We carried the state by a plurality of 52,944 for Roosevelt and 44,364 for Governor, with about 87,000 for the rest of the state ticket. This was far in excess of our expectations, and we only know that about 30,000 Democrats must have voted with us who had been absolutely silent as to their intentions. In 1906 we carried the state by 39,000 to 32,000. This year the indications are that every Republican in the state will vote for Taft. I am absolutely confident of election anywhere. That means at least 40,000 plurality and it may be much more, as we have no more indication from the Democrats than we had in 1904."

"Things, however, are very different in the contest for the state office. The Republicans have declared for and the Democrats against county local option. Both parties have nominated clean and able men for the Governor. There is no looking for a split at all as to the character of the nominees."

"In the cities throughout the state, the liberal element in the Republican party is not only enthusiastically at work for the Democratic state ticket without in any way abating its support of Taft. In the country a vast majority of Democrats are supporting the cities the preachers are enthusiastic. Most of the local option, and the women are working very hard for the Republican state ticket—but in the cities of the state the local option, for all states, is an official courts to decide. I think all the state Republican candidates except the Governor will be safe, and the Western element will be safe, and wholly on the side of Taft's plurality. The Legislature is in grave doubt and depends on district courts, which will probably elect a split ticket."

"Contingent upon a vote of the membership, the Arlington Club is to occupy a building of its own. A special meeting of the club was held on October 20 at 8 P. M. to vote on the question, and in addition cards have been sent to members of the club, asking them to indicate their choice of proposed locations."

New quarters have been a matter of consideration by the board of directors since August 1 of the year. A circular was issued to members recommending that necessary property be purchased and a suitable building be erected. It was also suggested that the cost of the proposed investment be \$300,000, including the ground, and that sum be raised by the issuance of 5 per cent first mortgage bonds, maturing in 25 years.

A special committee of the board was appointed to solicit subscriptions to this bond issue, and on October 22 the board notified the membership that \$134,000 had been subscribed and \$20,000 more would be taken in addition by those who have already subscribed. The board thereupon reports that it feels justified in saying that the whole amount of \$300,000 can be raised.

BOY SHOT WHILE HUNTING

Arthur Linden Is Accidentally Wounded in Leg.

Arthur Linden, 17 years of age, of Kalamazoo, Wash., was the victim of a serious accident yesterday while hunting with several companions of his own age. He is now a patient in the Good Samaritan Hospital, suffering from an ugly wound in his leg unintentionally inflicted by one of his friends. Linden was brought to the city last night and removed to the hospital owing to the danger threatened from blood poisoning. He may lose his leg.

The wound was caused by a load of bird-shot fired at close range. Besides losing a great hole in the calf of his leg, the charge shattered and carried away a portion of the bone. The accident occurred near Linden's home. The
