Hahn-Ramsdell.

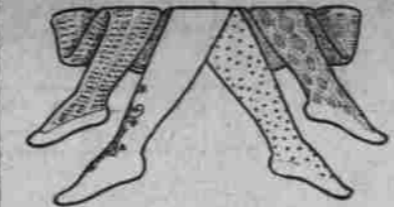

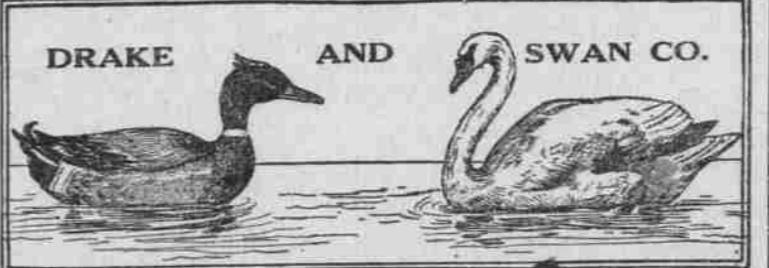
