REV. C. C. POLSON RETURNS—Rev. C. C. Polson, pastor of the Second United Evangelical Church, Kerby and Fargo streets, returned yesterday from a two-month visit in the East. He has not yet resigned as president of the Western University, at La Mar, Ia, but will do so in December, as he has made up his mind to remain permanently in Oregon. Dr. Polson will occupy his pulpit today morning and evening.

MARRIAGE LICENSES INCREASE—Portland seems to have settled down to a steady gait in the marriage license industry. The total number of certificates issued during the month of October, Clerk Fields is 223 as compared with 214 for September. The increase is but two marriages. Mr. Fields' report, to be issued Monday, will show that 23 notary commissions were issued, 22 notary certificates, that 21 articles of incorporation were recorded and two sets filed, that one dental license was issued and one license to sell opium.

QUARRY ACCIDENT UNAVOIDABLE—That the death of Charles Bruce on the Canyon road, Wednesday, was an unavoidable accident, was the verdict brought in by a jury impaneled by Deputy Coroner Dunning yesterday afternoon. Bruce was working in the county road quarry, and a large stone fell on him when a blast was set off, fatally injuring him. The funeral arrangements have not been made.

WOMAN GRANTED DIVORCE

R. L. Ticer Does Not Prove Contentment Against Wife.

Della Ticer and R. L. Ticer each fought for a divorce from the other all day yesterday in Circuit Judge Morrow's courtroom. Mrs. Ticer was the original seeker for application of the judicial knife to the troublesome matrimonial knot. But Ticer was in the contest in earnest. He sought to prove Mrs. Ticer from getting a decree—but only that he might receive the coveted document. Mrs. Ticer finally won. Mrs. Ticer said he abused and alighted her with great frequency during the 25 years of their married life. Ticer retailed that his wife was fond of other men, and named Jap Anson, of Oklahoma, and Gammons Atchison, of Oregon City, as two of her admirers. After much testimony had been given in corroboration of the evidence presented Friday by the couple, Judge Morrow decided that the woman was the offended party. He said the charges against Mrs. Ticer were totally unproved. It was shown that Ticer had furnished a large part of the money with which to build the family home in Portland. But since the title was in the wife's name, the court held that he could not very well lay claim to any part of the property. Mrs. Ticer was represented by Attorney John F. Logan and Ticer by Attorney Walter Hayes.
