BIG REUNION TO BE HELD

VETERANS OF COMPANY G. WILL CELEBRATE.

Members of Famous Military Organization to Observe 25th Anniversary Friday Night.

Members of the original Company G. Oregon State Militia, and members of that organization subsequently and until it was merged into the Second Oregon Regiment in 1898 will assemble at the Danmore Hotel Friday night, November 20, to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the organization of the company.

Two objects are sought to be accomplished at the reunion, organizing a veteran corps and re-establishing interest of the company members which formerly prevailed when annual reunions were held.

Company G. Oregon State Militia, was organized November 15, 1883, and its membership included the flower of Portland's young manhood. A formal application for the formation of such a company was prepared and submitted to the officers of the state militia.

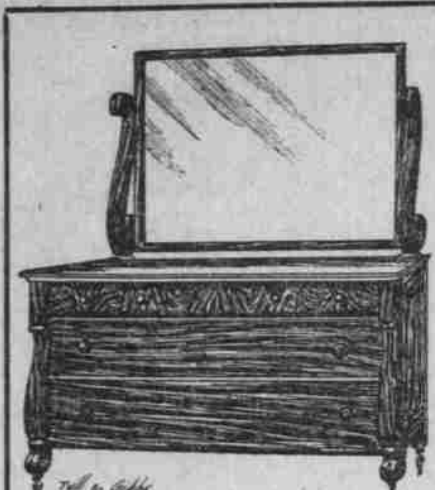
It was signed on November 1, of that year, and signed by the following: L. F. Farrar, A. J. Coffey, Jr., A. L. Warner, H. C. Johnson, M. E. Eberly, Frank Leighorn, Edward Dekum, George W. Buchanan, R. E. Davis, D. A. Shindler, D. D. Shindler, C. C. Smith, H. M. Hathaway, T. P. Davidson, W. M. Fiske, Thos. Oldendorf, C. H. Hale, Charles V. Cooper, W. W. Boughton, George F. Meacham, W. F. Keen, H. W. Nickerson, Jasper Crane, G. T. Willett, W. S. Lombard, E. P. Walte, C. H. Clark, Ralph K. Lee, F. S. Dearborn, James B. Kahn, A. H. Erwin, Joseph R. Whalen, W. J. Gibson, W. A. Eberly, D. L. Lowndale, C. S. Russell, A. E. Graham and M. W. Marsh. Two weeks later the men who signed the application met at headquarters and were mustered into Company G by Judge H. H. Northrup, Major and Assistant Adjutant-General.

At that time officers were elected as follows: Captain L. C. Farrar; First Lieutenant, A. J. Coffey; Second Lieutenant, H. C. Johnson. One week later the company held its first drill.

Only a few months were required to transform the company from an organization of awkward citizen-soldiers into a company which, for military appearance, routed all competitors. The men displayed an interest in the organization, and became adept at military maneuvers. The result was that cash prizes and medals offered for competitive drills invariably were carried away by Company G.

Most notable among the performances of the Portland company was its defeat of the Seattle Rifles in a drill in this city December 11, 1888. The visiting organization was the crack military team of the Sound City, but it was excelled at every point in the competitive drill. 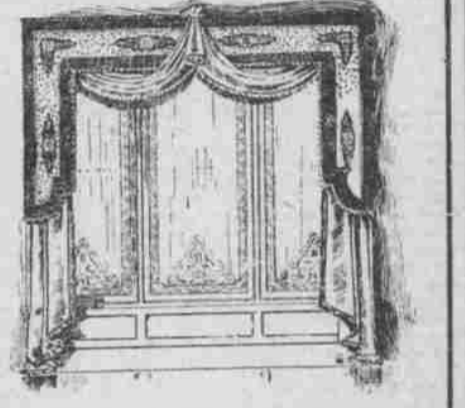
