## **BIG COMMITTEE** JOBS ARE OPEN

Recent Defeat of Numerous Senators Leaves Many Enviable Places Vacant.

PLUMS ALL JUICY ONES

Important Changes Will Be Made in Both Senate and House When Congress Again Organizes for Work.

changes in the organization in the Senate
and House of Representatives will be
made when the next Congress organizes.
Several big chairmanships will be filled
in the Senate, and many of the promiment Republicans in the House will not
appear in the Sixty-first Congress.

The chairmanship of the appropriation
committee in the Senate will be filled this
Winter, and the chairman then chosen

Winter, and the chairman then chosen will serve during the coming Congress. Long Leaves Vacancy.

The defeat of Senator Long, of Kansas, makes vacant the chairmanship on the committee of census. This position will probably go to Senator Hopkins, of Illinois, if his State Legislature is kind enough to return him, he being the successful candidate in the recent state pri-

many.
Should the Oregon Legislature carry ent the instructions of the votors of that state. Senator Fulton will retire from the chairmanship of the committee on claims and be succeeded by Senator Burnham, of New Hampshire, unless the latter should prefer his chairmanship on the committee on Cuban relations, in which event Reed Smoot, of Utah, would receive the chairmanship or the claims committee.

The committee on interoceanic canals will not be as important as it has been to the past, but will need a new chairman because of the defeat of Senator Main because of the defeat of Senator Hop-pins, of Illinois, is in line for this chair-manship, but would probably prefer the chairmanship of the committee on census, because of the fact that the new census will be taken in 1910, and the chairman of this committee will have unlimited patronage at his disposal. Therefore, the caual chairmanahip will go to Senator Flint, of California.

#### Place on Irrigation.

The defeat of Senator Ankeny, of Washington, makes vacant the chairmanship of the committee on irrigation. Senator Carter, of Missouri, is in line for this position, and will be chosen.

The fact that Senator Hale will become chairman of the committee on appropriations makes that position fall to Senator Perkins, of California.

Chaincey Depew is in line for the chairmanship of the committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico, because of the fact that Senator Foraker, present chairman, will not be re-elected. When Depew retires two years later this chairmanship will go to Senator Piles, of Washington. In the House of Representatives but one committee is likely to be organized in the special seasion, the committee on ways and means, which will draft the tariff bill. That committee will remain as it is at the present, with the exception of two new appointments made necessary by the defeat of Representative Bourne, of Colorado, and the retirement of Representative Walson, of Indiana.

### Increase Membership.

There is a probability that the Speaker III increase the Republican membership norder to insure a committee report in conformity with his own views on the tariff question, but as the Republicans now have a majority of five, such an increase is not probable.

Robert G. Cousins, of lows, one of the most capable, but also one of the laxiest men in Congress, did not run for re-election. That make vacant the chairman-ship on the committee on foreign affairs, which would have gone to Representative Laudis, of Indiana, but for his defeat. The next man in line is Representative Perkins, of New York, who is likely to succeed to the chairmanship.

### Repburn's Place to Fill.

A New Yorkeman was chaltrman of the committee on Indian affairs in the last Congress. James S. Sherman, now Vice-President-elect, and another New York man. Representative C. L. Knapp, is the legical appointee in the next Congress. He is the third number in rank. The second, Mr. Marshall, of North Dakota, left the House to run for the Senate.

The defeat of Representative Hephurn, of lows, makes vacant the chairmanship of the committee in interstate and foreign commerce, the third most important committee in the House, and in late years the most active. Representative Wanger.

Representative Wanger, of Pennsylvania, is in line for this chairmanship, but Wanger is not a particularly big man, and it is quite possible that Congressman W. R. Mann, of Hinois, will succeeds Hepburn, as he is next in line to Wanger. Mann is easily the most competent member of that committee, aside from the present chairman, and naturally the best-fitted man for that chairmanship; as he has always that chairmanable: as he has always been a stanch supporter of Speaker Cangon, he will no doubt come into his reward when the House is fully organized.
Representative Jenkins, of Wisconsin,
was charged with having stifled the bill regulating interstate salpments of liquor. It was that which prevented his renomination to Congress, and his relirement makes vacant the chairmanship of the committee on judiciary, which will go to Representative Parker, of New Jersoy, the next in line.

### New Jersey to Get Another.

New Jersey to Get Another.

New Jersey will get another big chairmanship if the semiority rule is followed, the committee on postoffice, now held by Representative Overstreet; of Indiana. The defeat of Overstreet leaves Representative Gardiner, of New Jersey, ranking member of the postoffice committee, and the probable appointse.

The one remaining large chairmanship in the House abids is likely to become vacant is that of rivers and harbors. This place is filled by Representative Burton, of Ohio, who has been re-elected to the next Congress, but it is not at all probable that Burton will serve long in the

House. If he is not elected to succeed Senator Potaker, his close relationship with Mr. Taft would seem to mean his appointment as Secretary of State in the next Cabinet. In the event of Burton's retirement from the House, Representative Alexander, of New York, would susceed to the head of the committee on rivers and harbors.

In addition to the appointment of chairman, Speaker Cannon will have a number of important committee places to fill, notably a vacancy in the committee on rules, caused by the election of Representative Sherman as Vice-President. This committee on rules is the leading force in the House, and membership on that committee on rules is the leading force in the House, and membership on that committee is worth more than any other chairmanship. Who will be chosen to succeed Sherman has not been made cooking.
