

MEMBERS OF FACTORY SUNDAY SCHOOLS HERE WITH THEIR NAMES

In the Fall of 1848, when the present site of Portland was little else than a wilderness, and when only a few scattered buildings marked the presence of civilization, the first Taylor Street Methodist Sunday School was organized by J. S. Smith, who had been sent to Portland as pastor by the Methodist authorities. The location of the Sunday school was the west side of First street, near Morrison, the building was of logs, and was used during the week as a cooper shop, and on Sundays the pupils and teachers of the school maintained by sweep, brush, and the shavings, build fires and make the place an orderly one for the holding of services. After occupying the cooper shop for a while, the school changed its quarters to a new log house on Second street, near Stark, from which it again removed to the new frame schoolhouse just then completed on First, between Oak and Pine streets, where they remained until the Spring of 1850, when the Methodists completed their new church on Taylor street, and the second year the school was reorganized under the superintendency of Rev. J. H. Wilbur, with a number of Indian children among the scholars who were sent to the school about 1848. Father Wilbur remained in charge as superintendent of the school until the Fall of 1852, when he left Portland, and his place was filled by C. S. Kingsley, who, with the assistance of Mrs. Kingsley, continued in charge until the Fall of 1854. During this period the church was enlarged to accommodate the growing school.

John Cullen, who was a minister in the California Conference, is now retired and lives on a farm near Hillsdale. Martha Kelly, a sister of Maria and Plympton, is now the wife of Dr. O. P. R. Plummer, of Hillsdale. James Corwell Carter both died several years ago. Julia, who married Congressman Joseph Smith, was the mother of Mrs. H. Y. Thompson, of Portland. Frank Hill died several years ago. William McNamee, a brother of Adam McNamee and of Mrs. E. J. Northrup, is a Methodist minister living in the city, and has been an invalid for many years. Her brother, S. T. Doane, is now in Spokane, and another brother, O. L. Doane, resides at Astoria, Ore. Several of Old Guard Survive.

Of the officers of the Sunday school at the time this muster roll was printed, only a few remain. J. P. Caples was superintendent, and during his lifetime one of the most loyal workers in the interests of the church. He died July 11 last. With his death passed away one of the most faithful members of the church, who went affectionately to designate as "The Old Guard" about 1848. The remaining ones are: J. P. Jones, Captain, and J. P. Jones, Jr., Secretary. Capt. and Mrs. J. P. Jones, Mrs. Bascom Bennett and Lot Taylor.

I. M. Sparrow, who was assistant superintendent, died in Seattle several years ago. Corwell Carter was treasurer of the Sunday school, died four years ago, and his widow resides at Alexander Court. Fred Matthews, the librarian, is still living in the city. He was superintendent, the chorister, died four years ago. His wife, who was Miss Emily Southard, resides here in Portland. There were 27 classes in the Sunday school at that time, besides an infant class with over 100 names enrolled, comprising nearly 1,000 souls in lack of space. Class No. 1 was in charge of Mrs. J. E. Jones, whose death occurred two years ago in this city. Her husband still attends Taylor Methodist Church, and is one of its most faithful members. An amusing incident relative to the establishing the position of superintendent of the school, which Mr. Jones, coming from his Eastern home in the early '70s, and used to Eastern customs, he informed the members of the church that they should have an usher. Being asked what an usher was and in what capacity he would serve the church, Mr. Jones informed them that the duty of the usher was to receive the people, seat them and make them welcome, and offered his services for this position. The members thought it a great joke, and so satirized the idea by electing a post, which of course became a permanent one, and which place Mr. Jones has retained for years.
