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AMUSEMENTS.

WHITE RIBBON VOICES EAST.—There has been unusual activity among the temperance folk the past week. The state headquarters of the Woman's Christian Union has been the meeting place for various organizations of representatives of the Anti-Saloon League, the Prohibition party and the W. C. T. U. Plans are already on foot to inaugurate a vigorous campaign to place Oregon in line with other progressive states in the matter of the abolition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating drinks.

LODGES MAY CONSOLIDATE.—A movement has been started in North East Side to consolidate the three Oddfellows lodges—Industrial, Harmony and Wood-laws—into one strong lodge, and then erect an Oddfellows temple in that portion of the city. Committees of three members each have been appointed from Industrial and Harmony, which meet in Albina, and these committees will attend the meetings of Woodlawn Lodge the coming week and set before the members the consolidation plan. The two former lodges have heartily approved the consolidation plan, and it only remains to secure the approval of Woodlawn to make it an assured success. Union of the three lodges would make one large and strong one with over 300 members, able to erect a temple similar to the one just finished in East Portland.
