The selection of Mr. Knox as Secretary of State is of vast algorificance, in that it will probably mean that most of the men now in the Cabinet who have figured as great Rooseveit supporters will lose out in the final framing of the personnel of the Taft Cabinet.

The President-elect is frank in his statement that he will depend on the counsel of Mr. Knox more than on the advice of sity other man. This is taken to mean that the chapters of Gifford Pinchot's being Secretary of Agriculture and James R. Garfield being Secretary of the Interior are reduced to a minimum.

When Mr. Knox arrives at Augusta, within the next week or so, Mr. Taft will submit to him for his inspection and approval the list of names he has selected.
