AS A RULE the holiday season, with its obligations to families and friends, does not militate with social functions other than those confined to the home-comings and dinner parties, with a few small dances. Miss McGunagle has been traveling abroad and in Eastern States for several months, and has only recently joined her father at the Barracks.
