JULIE HERNE FOLLOWING IN FAMOUS FATHER'S STEPS

Daughter of James A. Herne, Author of "Shore Acres," Is Winning Name for Herself on Stage.

IT ONLY requires a glance at Miss Julie Herne, who will appear at the Orpheum this week, to show that she is far superior to her father. Her face is indicative of her mind, and her thought toward the stage is toward the dramatic, and perhaps to some degree emotional, all being requisite for such creative work as play-writing. Miss Herne's traditions are entirely theatrical. Ever since she could remember, her father was writing or acting. The family lived always in a theatrical atmosphere, even when down on the farm. Today Diety Bell is doing Herne's famous old play, "Shore Acres." In the role of Uncle Nat, around which the memory of Herne clings so tenaciously. Mrs. Herne, widow of the late actor-writer, herself rehearsed Bell in the role.

The writer asked Miss Julie if the work of rehearsing the old play did not awaken memories in her mother's mind. "Yes," she said, "it awakened very sad memories. Good Materials Essential for Results in Making Good Bread

First Article of Series Dealing With Preparation of the Staff of Life.

THE bride's first loaf-of-bread joke is one that rivals in popularity and hoary antiquity even the venerable mother-in-law and tramp jests. Like bread itself, it is found in varying form in every country; but here in America it seems to reach its maximum of pliancy in regard to the amount of undeniable truth underlying it. Now, why should this be? If it is true, as a well-known authority asserts, that "the more intelligent a people the better bread they make," and if, as is universally believed, the American girl is the most intelligent in the world, whence comes all this poor American bread that one both meets and hears about?

"Yes," said a mere but experienced man with whom the question was being discussed, "but you forget we were speaking of bread, not of intelligence. You say that a class of previously inexperienced school girls usually gives an average of 95 per cent of successful loaves at their first independent attempt, and that the remaining 5 per cent is rarely really bad. That may be true of schoolgirls, who are, or ought to be, intelligent. But a bride, and as such, is not to be considered a normal intelligent human being. She has so much to distract her—wedding clothes, fuss and feathers; flowers and "showers"; a new house and a new life; and she is advised from friends and relatives, to say nothing of a husband. A bride may be adorable, beautiful, conspicuous, delightful, charming, fascinating, graceful, handsome, and so on all through an alphabetic list of flattering adjectives; but "intelligent" is too much to expect in a bride, and is besides a somewhat prosaic epithet."

I give his remarks in full, not because I entirely agree with him, but because they offer food for thought. Agree with them or not, the fact remains that many women—brides and otherwise—might with advantage study the gentle art of breadmaking; and here I offer a few suggestions which may be helpful to the beginner.

First study your materials. What are the "must-haves" and what are the "may-bes" in American bread-making? The essentials are (1) good wheat flour, (2) good fresh yeast, (3) liquid—water or milk or both, (4) salt. The non-essentials are (5) shortening, (6) sugar, (7) potatoes (usually a source of trouble to beginners), (8) eggs.
