GRANGE SHOWN TO HAVE GREAT GAIN

J. J. Johnson, State Lecturer,
Tells of Work Accomplished
and Aims of Order.

NEW BUILDING IS OPENED

Evening Star Grange Dedicates New
Hall and Elects Officers—300
Members Listen to Exposition
of Aspirations Set Forth.

The "opening day" of the new hall and the annual meeting of Evening Star Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, on the Section Line road, was attended yesterday by 300 members of the order. Visitors were present from Multnomah, Clackamas, Columbia and other counties of the state. Although not entirely completed, the hall was much admired for its large and best arranged of any in the state. In preparing plans provisions were made for a banquet hall that will seat 300, and also a juvenile game room.

J. J. Johnson, re-elected master for the fifth time, and who is state lecturer also, delivered the principal address, reviewing the work of the year, not only of the local Grange, but of the order at large, showing that throughout the country there had been a gain of 10 per cent in membership. He complimented the members of Evening Star on their new and handsome building, now valued at over \$6000. Continuing, Mr. Johnson said:

"The Patrons of Husbandry have had an exceptional gain in numerical strength during the past year, the membership having increased 10 per cent. The interest and activity shown among the members bespeak a much greater growth during the year 1929. According to the report of the National Master at the last session of the National Grange in 1928, the order has shown the greatest increase in new subordinate Granges in any year for 20 years. It has left the experimental stage and is resting upon a safe and tried foundation, and has launched forth in new fields, bringing joy and encouragement to our brothers and sisters who till the soil, and to those noble-minded men and women in other professions whose interests are in harmony with ours. The strength and benefit of this combined ability and energy has developed in the Grange the most potent factor for good to the farmer and his best interests that was ever known."

Gain of 10 Per Cent.

"I am sure that we all appreciate the great purpose of our organization is the uplifting of our whole people, and the protection and encouragement of the agricultural and producing classes by all just means in our power, and further, that to accomplish this great purpose to any satisfactory or material degree, and to place the people engaged in these various vocations in a position to be successful and to compete with all other lines and callings, can only be brought about by teaching us all fully to realize our true position or relation to one another in the business, educational and social world, and to instill into our minds that most necessary ability to study as best we can all questions, great and small, which affect our well being and which will come before us in our homes, in our schools, in our county, state and National Government."

Uplift Whole People.

"Inertia, or lethargy on the part of the masses in the study and understanding of the manipulations of other interests in the ever-changing conditions of business and government questions is exactly what the unconscious of our people desire, and therein lies the greatest drawback to our universal prosperity and the certainty of future freedom of American institutions. We should be alert and active in all matters pertaining to our welfare and the betterment of the great masses of our people."

Activity Is General.

"This activity and interest should be

general and not confined to a few. Hence the great mission of the Grange is to educate the farmer everywhere to a realization of his duty, his responsibility, and his strength."

"Our order at large has been fortunate in securing results through our National legislative halls and some of these bear good fruit. In our affairs the benefits to be derived depend very largely upon our individual efforts in taking advantage of the opportunities afforded. One of these is the benefit of free denatured alcohol for light. I am pleased to be able truthfully to say that every Grange in our county is making strides in the matter of procuring proper hall accommodations and that soon all, or nearly all, will be the possession of commodious and well-lighted halls."

CHASE FAMILY CELEBRATES

OREGON CITY COUPLE OBSERVE GOLDEN WEDDING.

The bride and groom were the recipients of many beautiful gifts in memory of the occasion. At 8 o'clock Santa Claus was announced and distributed the gifts from Mrs. Chase's tree, which held something for all. FINCH HEARS HIS DEATH SENTENCE

February 5 Set as Date for
Execution of Fisher's
Murderer.

PRISONER BREAKS DOWN

Sinks Helpless Into Chair When
Judgment Is Pronounced and
Lawyers for the Defense
Burst Into Tears.

James A. Finch, lawyer and murderer, must be strangled to death at the end of a hangman's rope in one month and two days from today. The death sentence was imposed by Circuit Judge Bronaugh yesterday morning. And the idea of bringing Finch to full retribution for the murder of Ralph Fisher with as little delay as possible was followed by the court in passing judgment. Friday, February 5, was set as the day of execution. Brooding aside the maze of technical objections interposed by Finch and his lawyers, the court made but one concession to the doomed man. He allowed him two hours to prepare a legal document. Judgment was to have been imposed at 9:30 o'clock, but Finch was given until nearly 11:30 o'clock. For the first time Finch arose in his cell in his own behalf, reading a lengthy document demanding arrest of judgment.

Rises to Hear Sentence.

When the various legal objections had been ruled down, Finch was ordered to stand up. He stood with set jaws, his face pale and drawn, as Judge Bronaugh went through the form of ordering him hanged. When the tragic order had been made Finch's four lawyers, Lord, Campbell, Pigott and Holcomb, gathered about him and wept. Tears came to Finch's eyes but he did not show the grief that marked his legal defenders. Seemingly they realized for the first time that the law is sternly determined to take Finch's life without the usual course of delay.

Finch is now alone in the death cell at the County Jail. Sheriff Stevens has detailed a death watch who is at the cell day and night to see that the man does not harm himself. Last night the condemned murderer was knee deep in legal papers and documents trying to figure out some new means of delaying the coming of death. He has several brief hopes yet. Motion for a new trial has yet to be argued, then preparation of a certificate of probable cause for the Supreme Court. If these things are unfavorably passed upon and he gets no appeal to the highest court of the land, then there is no way for him to escape the fate prescribed for him yesterday.

When the man was taken into court for sentence a motion in arrest of judgment was presented and ruled down.

"Have you anything to say why judgment should not now be pronounced upon you?" the court asked.

Finch Reads Long Defense.

Finch arose to read through a lengthy document recording alleged error in the course of the trial. He made one point of the fact that Judge Bronaugh left the bench during the course of the trial in order to testify. Judge Bronaugh was called at the instance of the defense on that occasion. Finch cited these things in support of his objection to the passing of judgment.

"The objection will be denied," said Judge Bronaugh, and then he proceeded to sentence the man to death. "You have been indicted," said he, "and tried by jury, and the jury has brought in a verdict of guilty. The time now comes for court to pronounce judgment. The judgment of this court is that you be remanded into the hands of the sheriff and within 20 days from this date that you be taken to Salem, Or., and delivered to the superintendent of the Penitentiary, and that you be confined there until Friday, February 8, 1930, when you will be taken to a place provided therein and there, in the manner prescribed by the law, you will be hanged by the neck until you are dead. And may God have mercy upon you."

Two Hundred in Courtroom.

Although the courtroom was packed with a jam of 200 persons, the place

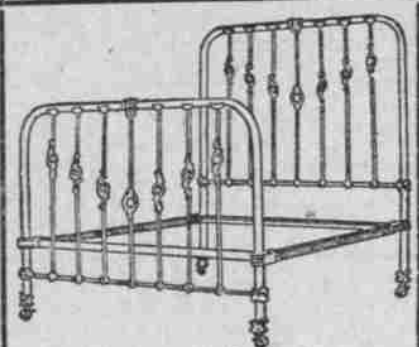

could not have been more silent if empty as the court ceased speaking. The tense quiet continued several seconds until Finch, standing as if transfixed, finally sat down in a bewildered manner.

Another motion was then presented for arrest of judgment, and when it was ruled down Finch's lawyers broke down and cried. Motion for a new trial was at once presented, although the prisoner has five days in which to present such a motion.

Finch's invalid wife and aged mother were with him nearly all afternoon in his cell. In order that Finch might talk with his wife alone, except for the death watch, the mother withdrew, patiently waiting another chance to see him late in the afternoon. The mother, a fine old Christian lady, accepted the situation with forbearance. "What is to be must be," she said. "I have not long to live myself, and it crushes me as to this terrible sorrow has come. But I am prepared for the worst—only it seems they are a little hard on my boy."

BLACKSMITH GETS 25 YEARS

Alexander Shipplehaute Is Sentenced in Circuit Court.

Twenty-five years in the penitentiary was the staggering sentence dealt out by Circuit Judge Cleland yesterday to Alexander Shipplehaute, a blacksmith, whose bringing up of his little daughter was such as to brand her for life. Shipplehaute pleaded that he was following out his own theories of the proper instruction of the jury which tried him returned a verdict of guilty under a most detestable charge. The fellow nearly fainted when he heard the order of the court, which was equivalent to a life sentence, since Shipplehaute is already past 40 and in poor

health, and he will be a tottering old man if he lives out the long sentence.

Whitney Asks New Trial.

Dr. G. B. Whitney, a young dentist lately sentenced to spend five years in the penitentiary for contributing to the death of Miss Mabel Wirtz, his fiancée, appeared before Circuit Judge Cleland yesterday to ask for a new trial. Insufficient evidence to warrant conviction, and error in the course of the trial were made the basis of the appeal. Judge Cleland took the matter under advisement. There is a growing feeling at the Court-house that Whitney was made a victim of public sentiment and that a new trial might serve to lighten the penalty almost imposed. Much sympathy is expressed for him, for he is a very young man and has suffered much because of his misconduct.

Employment Agent Arraigned.

B. F. Gorman, promoter of a swindling information bureau and employment agency, was arraigned in the Circuit Court yesterday afternoon on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. He was given until Tuesday to enter his plea.

Heavy Docket at Montesano.

MONTESEANO, Wash., Jan. 2.—(Special.)—The docket for the January term of the Chelan County Superior Court is very heavy, there being 24 cases already set for trial during the month.
