SILVERWOOD PARK PURCHASED—The City Council yesterday morning passed an ordinance authorizing the Park Board to purchase 15 acres of ground located in Silverwood just south of the Oaks, for \$50,000. This is the piece of property recommended by the Board. It was voted for by Councilman Willis, to a large extent, as an excellent tract for public purposes. It was the property of W. H. Morehouse. The Council also passed an ordinance appropriating \$50,000 for the purchase of property, paid for by bonds, and playgrounds, this being money belonging to the regular park fund and that raised by a bond issue.

HAVE YOU SEEN THIS MISSING GIRL?



MISS LOUISA RICE.

There are reasons to believe that Miss Louisa Rice, whose mysterious disappearance from her home, 717 Gilliam street, has baffled the entire police force, has carried out her threat to end her life. Detective Hawley received information yesterday upon which he is working and which may lead to the discovery of the young woman's remains.

However, the report was so meager that the detectives have been unable to discover a tangible clue. They will begin early this morning to follow out the line upon which they are working. If the information they have received is correct, the young woman has already committed suicide. However, they will be unable to ascertain definitely until the investigation is completed today.

FUNERAL OF MRS. MARY S. WEST—The funeral of Mrs. Mary S. West, who died Thursday, January 7, was conducted yesterday from the family residence, 544 East 14th street, and was largely attended by the relatives and friends of the family. Mrs. West was the daughter of Mrs. Mary A. Stone, a pioneer woman, and sister of Mrs. S. E. Joseph. With her husband she came to Portland in 1888, and was united in marriage to Captain F. H. West, a distinguished pioneer engineer, in 1888, in Trinity Church, and had lived in Portland continuously except when her husband was in charge of the locks at Oregon City. Her husband, Captain West, died about a year ago, and since then Mrs. West had not been in good health. Her age was 37 years and 11 months. Two sons survive her, W. C. and F. S. West, of Portland.

W. B. STEWART, president and manager of the Portland-Florence Mining & Leasing Company, operating a lease on the Florence mine at Goldfield, Nev., informs Secretary McKee, in a letter received yesterday, that if he had a machine drill, he would be glad to let it be used by the company. He is confident the company could make it a steady producer within a month. At present, for lack of funds, Mr. Stewart has reduced his force to 15 men, whereas 30 should be at work. The drillers are now making only about two feet per day, but with a machine drill six feet would be an easy matter. "If our stockholders would put up \$25 each," Mr. Stewart says, "we would have all the funds required, and now that we are at the door of the treasury vault, these families with our prospects are most anxious that we have not all the cash we need. The stock of the company," it is declared, "is well worth \$1 per share, though the price is now 10 cents. With \$250,000 in hand at the time machine drills would be installed, and the company would be milling its ore within 30 days, whereas, as at present, it takes three months to produce one ton of ore. This cannot be accomplished by anything near that time." Mr. Lockhart, owner of the Florence ground, from whom the lease was secured, says that "the people of Portland and elsewhere, who own this stock, are certainly standing in their own light if they do not at once supply all the funds necessary to carry out this work." Secretary McKee urges all who are interested to make immediate response to Mr. Stewart's call for more funds. It is the one way by which they may receive tremendous profits on their investments within a few weeks at most.

BELL THROUGH

Entire West to Acclaim Relic on Way to Portland.

"MILLION CLUB" INDORSES

San Francisco Organization in Sympathy With Plan to Send Liberty Bell Through Itinerary of Coast—Seattle Approves.

Indorsement and support of the "Million Club," of San Francisco, in the effort to secure the Liberty Bell for a Pacific Coast tour, is looked upon by the Portland Rose Festival as the clinching nail in one of the greatest exploitation movements ever undertaken in this part of the country. President Hoyt of the Festival, feels that no event of contemporary history—save only the triumphal voyage of the Albatross—will mean as much for the Pacific Coast, and he expects the entire section of the United States west of the Mississippi River to join hands in arrangements for a notable series of receptions and ovations for the great trophy of American freedom all along the way.

The Portland Rose Festival is satisfied that this movement means the greatest individual advertising feat that the Northwest has yet devised, and Mr. Hoyt declares that the entire western half of the continent should have the opportunity of greeting the honored relic. The idea of a Pacific Coast tour of the bell originated with the Rose Festival, and Portland is bound to get the bulk of the advertising value of the projected trip.

"But," said President Hoyt last night, "let the entire West join with us in extending a welcome to the treasured token of our Nation's liberty. The assistance of the 'Million Club,' of San Francisco, in this effort will probably mean that the Liberty Bell will be on a tour of a month on up here. It will be easy to enlist the efforts of Los Angeles, San Francisco and other prominent Coast points in the campaign to make the trip from start to finish as comfortable as possible. It will be the trip of the great American fleet of battleships."

"Let the bell visit California and then come to the Rose Festival, let every city, town and hamlet get busy and plan to accord it a welcome befitting its monumental significance. It will be the easiest thing in the world to arrange for the bell to visit every city, town and hamlet. With the co-operation of all the Coast states, it will be possible to so distribute the expense of bringing the bell out here, so that no particular section need feel that it will be a burden."
