PLANING MILL DESTROYED

CLARK & WILSON PLANT AT LINTON DAMAGED \$50,000.

Entire Town Threatened by Flames and Saved by Work of Portland Fireboat.

Fire that is supposed to have been caused by a hot box in the engine-room of the planing mill of the Clark & Wilson Company big plant at Linton yesterday morning completely destroyed the planing mill and a large quantity of lumber, entailing a loss of approximately \$50,000. But for the heroic work of the company's employees and efficient work of the fireboat George H. Williams the entire plant and portions of the town might have been destroyed. The loss is covered by insurance. Engineer Henry Morgan discovered the cause of the fire at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, when he opened a small door of the engine-room to glance at the machinery. As he opened it, flames shot out almost enveloping him. He quickly closed the door, and rushing out of the building, notified Foreman Albert Olson. The foreman hurried to the sawmill and by means of the whistle sounded the alarm of fire. The entire force of 175 employees and many residents of the town formed a volunteer brigade and began a desperate fight on the flames. Half a dozen lines of hose were attached to the water tank on the hill and a few minutes after the discovery of the flames were sending streams of water to check them. A strong wind from the southwest threatened danger to the sawmill and other property. The fireboat George H. Williams made the run to the plant and rendered assistance. The flames were confined to the single building and prevented from reaching the sawmill and other adjacent buildings. "The loss, I think, will probably be

FUN IN COASTING ON SKIS

Kalama, Wash., Takes Kindly to Norwegian Snow-Sport.

KALAMA, Wash., Jan. 8.—(To the Editor.)—Coasting on skis is all the rage in Kalama. The first day of snow two Norwegian skiers came down the principal street and so skillfully did they handle them and so apparent was their pleasure that other lads set about constructing skis. Now there are some 20 pairs of skis, and the same number of skiers slide. The real Norwegian ski is made of wood, resembling our hickory, thin, light and strong, but a very practical ski can be made from one-inch flooring, 19 or 12 feet long. For about a foot in the center the board should be of the original thickness. Shave from this to the ends, as thin as convenient, about one-half inch, making the forward end to turn up slightly. Soak the wood in boiling water for one or two hours, and then place it so that the ends will curve up. Weight down the pieces and by morning the ski will be properly curved up in front. Fir or cedar will do, although hickory or oak is better. A strap should be nailed across the thick place left in the center to go across the foot. A gait in the heel of the shoe helps to keep the foot in place. Two sticks, some six or seven feet long, are used to steer with and to propel on level ground. These are made of fishing-pole bamboo. Any lad can make a pair of skis, and if there is in his neighborhood a long, sloping hill he can have more fun than by coasting or skating.

SNOW STRANGE TO OREGON

Chicagoans Say Portlanders Do Not Know How to Enjoy It.

"It is easy to see that you Portland people are not used to snow," said J. H. Thompson, a prominent Chicago lawyer, who is registered at the Nortonia, "for if you were all of the sidewalks, especially in the downtown districts, would be clear of snow.
