

PIONEER DAY AS FESTIVAL EVENT

Effort Being Made to Change Date to Fall on "Home-Coming Day."

SECRETARY HIMES AGREES

Will Send Out Circular Letters to Members of Association—Expense of Liberty Bell to Be Divided With A.-Y.-P. Fair.

Chief among the features of "Home-coming day," which will open the annual Rose Festival week in Portland, June 7-12, next, if the plans now on foot can be perfected, will be a rising ground-up, rally and reunion of Oregon's stalwart old pioneers. The regular "Pioneer day," which brings the members of the Great Pioneers Association and their families together every year, is June 16, but it is now planned to have this date changed to June 7, the opening day of the festival, so as to make this reunion a feature of the programme.

Change Pioneers' Day.

Secretary George Himes, of the Pioneers' Association, has already taken steps toward bringing about the change of date of the annual reunion. President Ralph Hoyt, of the Festival Association, and several friends, including of Camp Scout Young, of the United Spanish War Veterans, in charge of the programme for "Home-coming day," called on Himes a few days ago and interested him in the plan for having the pioneers' rally made a part of the programme. Mr. Himes has agreed to send out circular letters to the members of the association and their families. These letters, about 1500 in number, will be sent out soon.

Director-General L. A. Nadeau, of the A.-Y.-P. Exposition, at Seattle, will be in Portland the coming week to take up the matter of defraying the expense of bringing the Liberty Bell from Philadelphia to the Pacific Coast for the Rose Festival at Portland and the fair at Seattle. The management of the exposition desires to have the bell in Seattle for two or three weeks, and it is to be in Portland during the entire festival week. Mr. Nadeau will confer with the festival management as to the proportionate share of expenses, and arrangements will be made for a settlement in accordance with the length of time each city keeps the bell.

Many Cities Want Bell.

Since the announcement of the plan to bring the Liberty Bell to the Coast, many cities along the coast have become interested, and numerous inquiries have been received by the festival management, asking about the proposed arrangement for the bell. A number of cities, through their mayors, have sent requests to the Mayor and Common and Select Councils of Philadelphia, asking that the bell be granted, so that the bell can be loaned along the line with entertainments and parades in which the school children of the different cities can participate.

William Stewart, superintendent of float construction, and Anton Truckenbrodt, modeler and paper artist, expert, announced yesterday that they are ready to begin the drawings and designs for the 16 electrical structure floats which are to appear in the "Golden West" float parade. Both these experts, long experience in construction of the magnificent floats, have helped to make the "Golden West" float parade, at St. Louis, an attractive occasion, year by year. According to Superintendent Stewart, who has visited most of the important float cities, the float parade in Portland has, in the Manufacturers' buildings on the Lewis and Clark fairgrounds, the finest "den" he has ever seen, from the standpoint of convenient arrangement, room and light.

Portland Has Good Festival.

"From the views I have seen of the parade and floats of the last festival, since my arrival Friday, I feel free to say that Portland ranks with any of the festival cities. I have never attended in the past a float parade of such a high standard of artistic and floral display," said Mr. Stewart. "From what I already know about the natural advantages of Portland, it should be an easy matter for this city to gain and maintain a position of high eminence for the greatest and grandest float festival of this or any other city."

GREAT WATER-DAMAGE SALE

Store Flooded by Recent Thaw and \$50,000 Worth of Goods Slightly Damaged—Must Dispose of These Goods at a Tremendous Sacrifice

STORE FLOODED

Damage estimated at \$20,000 was caused the stock of Shanahan's big store last night through a flood that came through the roof when the evening thaw was well under way. The Shanahan store has a 50-foot front that is but a single story in height, and when this great bank of snow started to melt it had no outlet because the escape pipes were frozen. The result was that the load centered on the weak spot in the roof and then came through on the goods in the front of the store, the most valuable goods in stock.

The front wall of the store is some three feet above the level of the roof and this served as a dam that backed up the water from the melting snow. Not only did the water spoil the goods on the top floor, but the backing flood, went on through the basement and, finding no way of escape there, formed a lake as big as the basement and constantly deepening.

CHINOOK CAUSES FLOOD

\$50,000 Worth of Dry Goods Damaged in Shanahan's Big Third-Store Store. The sudden thaw that came on yesterday morning played havoc with Lawrence Shanahan's big stock of dry goods on Third street. The severe frost from the water pipes and eave troughs, and when the chinook wind came the pipes did not thaw and the water, as they were covered with a thick coat of ice. The consequence was that the water, not only in the eaves troughs, but the second and first floors and into the basement, where the immense stock is kept. About \$50,000 worth of cloaks, suits, ladies' underwear, hosiery, gloves, sheeting, blankets, comforters, lace, men's underwear, calicoes, ginghams, percales, lawns and other goods were damaged more or less, and the staff of clerks had an exciting time removing the stock as best they could to places of safety.—Journal.

SHANAHAN'S FLOODED.

Big Stock of Dry Goods Damaged by Snow Water.

The eaves troughs of the building on Third street, occupied by L. Shanahan, the dry goods merchant, were frozen during the late cold spell and when the thaw set in the water was unable to run off through the eaves troughs, and the result that it soaked through the ceiling and damaged a large part of the stock on both floors and basement. Mr. Shanahan said that about \$50,000 worth of all kinds of goods, or less damaged.—Oregonian and Telegram.
